Just before Passover, Mina and I received the news that we had long been hoping for. Our older son, Shahriyar was engaged to be married. Some of you long-time members may remember Shahri as a pre-teen leading Kiddush and then as a teacher in our school before he left to study in Israel in 2000.

As is often the case, news of great joy brings with it its own stress and tension. Mine was that even though Shahri's natural father and I had only met once, it was amidst great anger and violence. Thank G-D it was only verbal but still quite virulent. Mina wanted the whole family to meet Shahri's intended, Adinah, and so she arranged a rather fancy engagement party. Those of you who know my family, know that Persians do not party halfway but are the originators of "party hearty" if you get my meaning.

As the day of the engagement party drew closer, it had long been established that Shahri's natural father would be invited along with his family, my fear and anger grew. I steeled myself to prepare for whatever game the Forouzan family would try to play and in my mind scenarios presented themselves with some insult leveled at Mina or myself or Joshua, and as a result there would be a brawl either physical or verbal.

Finally it was Sunday, the day of the engagement party. But before the party, Shahri had arranged for a “friends get-together” to meet and greet both he and especially his fiancée, Adinah. People kept meeting and greeting and so we, Mina, Joshua, Shahri, Adinah, Adinah’s parents and myself were an hour late to the engagement party. As we walked into my sister-in-law and brother-in-law’s home, the Forouzans were all standing in a line. It reminded me of a line in the sand. In any event, Mina led the way and as I shook hands with Shahri’s aunts and Shahri’s biological father, it struck me. Whether justified or not, the anger of both families needed to end. Twenty-four years of attacks and sarcasm and verbal abuse heaped upon each other needed to cease immediately.

Being a rabbi and the “Pop” of the groom has its advantages, and when I was called upon to lead a “L’chaim” to the bride and groom, I saw this feud in its wider context. The Holocaust has forever altered the nature of Jews and Judaism. I told all who were there that this war needs to end. “After the Holocaust,” I said, “there are not enough of us to go around. Therefore, we must all make the effort to come together as one. One people, one tribe, one family.” And because I practice what I preach, I spent the rest of the evening offering friendship and camaraderie and inclusion to “the other side.”

Truly, I did it for my son, for his fiancée, for my wife and most of all for me. How liberating, how enlightening and how invigorating it is when you can remove yourself from the anger matrix. When I physically and mentally stood back from the party, all I saw were people trying to have a good time and when I ventured back into the crowd with my hands open to be embraced, I felt my soul, my neshama, my essence come alive with the love that comes spontaneously from “mitzvoh giving,” the giving that asks nothing in return. This is pure love, this is life, this is invigorating joy. To my son, Shahri and his fiancée, Adinah, thank you both for so many joys you have given us already, especially this one, the joy of release of anger. To my wife, thank you for all your efforts of love, MOTHER-IN-LAW, (she hates that). To all my congregants, like a harness that binds you and constricts your movement, release your angers, let them fly from you as you move with the freedom that only a loving soul can bring. Embrace those whom you deem un-embraceable for then your soul will be embraced by the En Sof, the infinite loving-kindness of G-D.

### **Advice About Teens by Michael Josephson**

Here are three suggestions for parents of teens, all learned through my own mistakes:

First, with emerging demands for independence, worries about peer acceptance, pressures of school and extracurricular activities, and a continuous search for self-identity, adolescents are on a physical and emotional roller coaster. Like every generation before them (including yours), teens are often arrogant and over-confident about their knowledge and your ignorance and deeply insecure about most other things.

They're going to make mistakes, behave badly, and be thoroughly self-absorbed. Although they want you to be less involved in their lives, they actually need you more. And despite continual battles, if you're open, you'll experience glorious moments that all of you will cherish your whole lives.

Second, be firm but choose your battles carefully. Don't back down when dealing with important principles, but don't make every issue a hill you're willing to die on either. Be content to lose occasionally and give in graciously.

Third, don't belittle or underestimate the importance of their feelings. It may seem like they're over-reacting, but teens feel emotions like embarrassment, loneliness, insecurity, frustration, and love intensely. It's disrespectful to minimize or discount these feelings with useless advice like "You'll get over it" or "Everyone feels that way." Nor is it helpful to dismiss or invalidate an emotion by saying "You shouldn't feel that way."

Teens can be hard to love, but be patient. Soon they'll be the parents of your grandchildren.
