

"Talmud Torah K'Neged Kulam" (Study of Judaism is a protection against all else) Misnhnah Paeh 1:1

This past June, the Supreme Court ruled in favor of ending a discrimination that has existed in America since its inception and it got me to thinking. How could we, as a



congregation, end discrimination in the Temple Beth Emet community? As I pondered this during the month of July, I conducted two Adult B'nei Mitzvah (plural of Bar or Bat Mitzvah) ceremonies and I saw what we could do. Judaism teaches that all of Judaism, when possible, should be opened to everyone, including the "stranger in your midst." To put it mildly, the B'nei Mitzvah ceremonies were magnificent, not because the students weren't well prepared; they were, as are all of our students. We take pride in our synagogue, our school and our students, but the magnificence came from the students themselves, as each expressed the desire to be a "full member" of the Jewish Community. Truthfully speaking, one can be a Bar or Bat Mitzvah by attaining the age of 12 for a girl and 13 for a boy. The age when, physically, boys become men and girls become women. So for B'nei Mitzvah, who conduct the Shabbat Service, the actual preparation and completion of the "B'nei Mitzvah" program must have meaning for them. I agree. It is meaningful, to be given a goal of learning what Judaism is, what its roots are, what it represents today, what our relationship with G-d is, why we do the things we do; and to become conversant with these ideas, learn Hebrew and lead the congregation, is monumental. Several adult B'nei Mitzvah have expressed that now they feel, "completed as Jews."

We are now, in the month of Elul, at a time when we begin to draw closer to G-D, ultimately reaching the zenith of closeness on Yom Kippor, the Day of AT ONE MENT (Atonement) with G-D. I want an uncomplicated way to accomplish that goal. What better way than to bring others closer to G-D? Those who have been rejected by Judaism, or those who have not found a place in the Jewish community, or those who were unable to complete their studies will now find acceptance. For too long the Jewish community has looked at the nuclear family as the "only" family. We must bring those who seek us into the fold. Then we must make them feel at home, so they will stay with or "gender" reasons (i.e.; girls don't need a us. The fabric of Judaism is unraveling. We need to repair, no, *improve* the Judaic weave of our congregants, utilizing the golden thread of opportunity which will bind us all together with the success of the complete Jewish experience. We are the people who believe in the collectiveness of G-D and the Jewish People, (Eloheinu, OUR G-D and Emanu OUR PEOPLE). Friends, let us end this discrimination in our congregation. Wouldn't it be great if all who wanted to feel complete

about their Judaism had a facility that would allow them to do that? Wouldn't it be wonderful for those who were not able to take part in this educational process, when they were young, were able to do so now? Just think, if *all* were given the opportunity to complete what is considered to be the watershed of American Jewish Life, how much stronger would we be as a community? Wouldn't it be wonderful if people, who had been denied access to Judaism, suddenly found themselves welcomed with open arms to a class of fellow seekers?

I believe, each of us knows someone who has not had a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. Whether it was for financial, educational, physical, fear Bat Mitzvah, but boys must have a Bar Mitzvah), it does not matter. All that matters is a fellow Jew who feels lacking in their Judaism. Nudge, no, *push* them to join us. message with your name and telephone number. If not, just call the Temple office and mention that you are interested in the "B'nei Mitzvah" class. We will do the rest. We will contact you. Also, the Adult B'nei Mitzvah class is not just geared towards leading a Shabbat Service. It is aimed at truly making each student a "son or daughter of the commandments," meaning you will be discussing all aspects of Judaism. There will be a textbook. I can hear the groaning, "Will there be tests and quizzes, papers to write, essays to give?" No, but there will be homework. Readings on Judaism will be assigned and a diary kept, so you can ask Rabbi questions on the material. It keeps me on my toes and makes it less stressful on the students. By the way, this is the method I use with my "Jews by Choice" students, so the class is open to those who want to more formally embrace Judaism. It will be open to anyone who wants a Bar or Bat Mitzvah Then, when we say to these new students, "Barukeem Haba'eem," we are saying to them that they have given the congregation great blessings by wanting to learn. Learning is the highest form of Judaic endeavor and they have given us the ability to perform the Mitzvah of Talmud Torah (learning Judaism) to another person. We have the power, the ability and the desire, the Supreme Court only just reminded us of what we need to do to end discrimination here at Temple as they did for America.
