Unfortunately, this is not always the case.

From time to time when there is a divorce and remarriage or even a death, the members of the first family (not the President's) do not actively include the second family in the celebration love or even the mourning love. I have viewed large numbers of guests at a funeral mourning with the "first" family and ignoring the current wife and her family. I watched the expression on that lovely lady's face. In the midst of her mourning, she felt abandoned.

We all have infinite amounts of love to give. Yes, I agree, sometimes it is difficult and confusing to tell who belongs to whom. So what!!! Better to err on the side of name then to err on the side of inclusion. I remember my mother being called Anne Sobel in front of her second husband several years after she and my natural father were divorced. A Spirited Discussion, a Comfortable Resolution and the desire to create a Talit

I, along with my husband, Michael Heiss, am a new member of Temple Beth Emet. At the end of October, we hosted a Friday night Oneg Shabbat to celebrate our 30th anniversary. It was a joy to be welcomed into our new Jewish community; and, I was thrilled to be asked to participate in the blessing of the Shabbat Candles on the bima. I made my way to the podium and stood next to the cantor. Someone rushed to put a talit around my shoulders. To me, this was surprising and a bit uncomfortable.

After services were over and the blessings over the bread and wine were complete, I had a lively and entertaining discussion with Rabbi Sobel. "It is Beth Emet's custom," I was informed, "for both men and women to wear talit on the bima." If women are to be allowed to have equal access to the Torah and it is the custom of the temple for men who read torah to don talit, then it is not only a privilege but a responsibility I believe that women should gladly share. I have only admiration for this custom.

For the mitzvah of lighting Shabbat candles, it has always been my understanding that this is uniquely a woman's task. As such, I responded to the rabbi, it seems that for that task *alone* no talit need be worn on the bima.

How do we reconcile an old custom and a new custom when there are seeming contradictions? We continued our talk with me referencing family tradition, and Rabbi Sobel pointing out the practicality of moving forward and embracing new traditions. Finally, the Rabbi asked me if my grandmothers covered their heads before lighting Shabbat candles. "Yes," I exclaimed, startled by the instant recollection of seeing them use a paper napkin to cover their heads if a scarf was not around. "Well," said the rabbi, "You can use the talit on the bima as a head covering."

That rabbinic solution embraces both old and new traditions in a way that I can not only accept but also applaud. I love this solution in that it satisfies both trains of thought. So now, I want to have my own talit. This is something I have never owned before. I would like it to be special. I plan on needlepointing the prayer on the Atarah along with 4 squares that will hold the ritual fringes. There are many materials that can be used for a talit, but only one way to tie and knot the tsitsit to keep the talit "kosher."

I have found a local woman who has beautiful materials and assembles not only the talits, but also finishes the talit bags that women often make to match the individual talit design. I think it would be a wonderful opportunity for us to get together, socialize sew, cross stitch or needlepoint. Would anyone like to join me in making a talit? If you do, call me and we'll set up a meeting!
