

"If you are silent....you and your father's house will perish". (Book of Esther 4:14)

I have a disappointment with the younger generation. Usually, I praise them, because I see such accomplishments but really this one area upsets me greatly. They have no face-to-face courage. Young people



today perform acts of great courage in the face of many dangers and threats, but here they fall utterly short. They tweet, rather than speak. They type, rather than verbalize. Words are constructed, not spontaneously created. What would have happened to us if Mordechai had emailed the captain of the guard what he had heard about the attempted assassination rather than going forward and speaking up?

Our children are afraid to make definitive statements. When I was their age, 'like' was halfway to love, a bold concept. Now, it is a word of retreat, of fear, of lack of commitment. And what would have happened if Mordechai had emailed the captain of the Guard, " Sir, like these soldiers are like planning a plot like to kill the King"? It would have gotten buried in a mound of like "tips". As it was, his testimony was lost until the King had insomnia.

Students, take a stand, be proud of your ideas! I like it when people are brave enough to speak their minds. What would have happened to us if Mordechai had not confronted Queen Esther and told her about the plot to annihilate us, but instead sent her a text? She might have seen his name, thought, 'my uncle is bothering me again, he's always hanging around the castle'.

And what if Esther had not shown courage in going directly to the King and ... (well, she did waver....) asking for the banquet and then showing courage in directly accusing HAMAN? (I know full caps mean anger, I am angry at him, still, and his descendents, and I do confront them when I see them). All these acts of courage if left to invisible, electronic space would have made us part of invisible history. Don't misunderstand, face-to-face communication takes courage, but bravery must arise when it is needed and inspired. We must teach and constantly reinforce the teaching to the younger generation that speech is divine, that cyber media has no soul., that our vocalizations create on many different levels, while print media only exists on one, that the auditory system is much more profound because it is so subjective and hence so emotional. Vision is objective. It is what it is, especially when it is literary.

During Purim, whenever we hear Haman's name, people will step up and make a great noise. True it is with the intention to blot out his name, but still he gets the creative reaction. Also, our courage in speaking up is easy, Haman is long dead. Let us not forget, Mordechai and Esther both

showed great courage in speaking up in the face of great danger. We must do the same speaking up in the face of what endangers us and doing it directly and verbally. I propose this year, and every year after that, whenever Mordechai or Esther's names are mentioned, especially in the Megillah when they stood up and showed courage, that we do the same. Then we will add the Hebrew, "Kol Ha Kavod" (All the Honor). This way we align ourselves with their acts of courage and add our actions to theirs. Purim "lots", is a festival that commemorates the deliverance of the Jewish people living throughout the ancient Persian Empire from a plot by Haman the Agagite to annihilate them, as recorded in the Biblical Book of Esther (*Megillat Esther*). According to the story, Haman cast lots to determine the day upon which to kill the Jews.

According to the Book of Esther, Haman, royal vizier to King Ahasuerus, planned to kill the Jews, but his plans were foiled by Esther, Ahasuerus's queen. Mordechai, a palace official, cousin and foster parent of Esther, subsequently replaced Haman. The Jews were delivered from being the victims of an evil decree against them and were instead allowed by the King to destroy their enemies, and the day after the battle was designated as a day of feasting and rejoicing.





Temple Beth Emet will celebrate Purim this year with two fantastic events. The first event will be reading the Megillah in several languages on Wednesday, March 7 at 7:30 PM. The second event, a Purim Carnival, including Megillah Reading and Costume March, and Silent Auction, will take place on Sunday, March 11 during Religious School from 9:00 AM-12 noon. Please wear masks and costumes and bring a Purim gragger, also called "ra'ashan" (noisemaker), used when Haman's name is mentioned during the reading of the Megillah, as tradition dictates, to blot out the name of evil. Triangular pastries called Hamantaschen ("Haman's pockets") or Oznei Haman ("Haman's ears") will be served.

A Spirited Discussion, a Comfortable Resolution and the desire to create a Talit By Leslie Nathan, AIA

I, along with my husband, Michael Heiss, am a new member of Temple Beth Emet. At the end of October, we hosted a Friday night Oneg Shabbat to celebrate our 30th anniversary. It was a joy to be welcomed into our new Jewish community; and, I was thrilled to be asked to participate in the blessing of the Shabbat Candles on the bima. I made my way to the podium and stood next to the cantor. Someone rushed to put a talit around my shoulders. To me, this was surprising and a bit uncomfortable.

After services were over and the blessings over the bread and wine were complete, I had a lively and entertaining discussion with Rabbi Sobel. "It is Beth Emet's custom," I was informed, "for both men and women to wear talit on the bima." If women are to be allowed to have equal access to the Torah and it is the custom of the temple for men who read torah to don talit, then it is not only a privilege but a responsibility I believe that women should gladly share. I have only admiration for this custom.

For the mitzvah of lighting Shabbat candles, it has always been my understanding that this is uniquely a woman's task. As such, I responded to the rabbi, it seems that for that task *alone* no talit need be worn on the bima.

How do we reconcile an old custom and a new custom when there are seeming contradictions? We continued our talk with me referencing family tradition, and Rabbi Sobel pointing out the practicality of moving forward and embracing new traditions. Finally, the Rabbi asked me if my grandmothers covered their heads before lighting Shabbat candles. "Yes," I exclaimed, startled by the instant recollection of seeing them use a paper napkin to cover their heads if a scarf was not around. "Well," said the rabbi, "You can use the talit on the bima as a head covering."

That rabbinic solution embraces both old and new traditions in a way that I can not only accept but also applaud. I love this solution in that it satisfies both trains of thought. So now, I want to have my own talit. This is something I have never owned before. I would like it to be special. I plan on needlepointing the prayer on the Atarah along with 4 squares that will hold the ritual fringes. There are many materials that can be used for a talit, but only one way to tie and knot the tsitsit to keep the talit "kosher."

I have found a local woman who has beautiful materials and assembles not only the talits, but also finishes the talit bags that women often make to match the individual talit design. I think it would be a wonderful opportunity for us to get together, socialize sew, cross stitch or needlepoint. Would anyone like to join me in making a talit? If you do, call me and we'll set up a meeting!
