On Rosh Hashana we read:

And it came to pass after these things, that God put Abraham to the test and said unto him: "Abraham," and he answered: "Here am I."

— Genesis 22:1

Why did God choose to test Abraham? Hadn't Abraham already proven his commitment to and acceptance of God? Not too many pages earlier, didn't Abraham leave his home to go to "the land that I will show you" sight unseen? Hadn't he been obeying God's instructions? Sure, he tried unsuccessfully to bargain with God regarding the fate of Sodom and Gomorrah, but in the end he submitted to God's judgment.

Some commentaries I have read suggest that an all-knowing God doesn't need to test our faith, but we need to test ourselves. I think the point is that we are never done showing our commitment to God. When God keeps calling us, we have to keep answering "Here am I."

This applies to belonging to a community like Temple Beth Emet. We make a commitment to our Jewish community when we join the Temple, when we pay our dues, and when we put our kids through religious school, but we get a lot of other calls, and are we willing to answer "Here am I?" The calls come -- we need help with fixing things in the building. Will you say "Here am I?" We need people to help with the Hanukkah party. Will you say "Here am I"? We need someone to be a committee chair, we need people to come to a service, we need donations for a silent auction, we need people to write an extra check to help keep the doors open. Will you say "Here am I"? Will you reaffirm your commitment to our Temple Family?

As we enter the High Holidays, "we stand on the shoulders of giants." We stand on the shoulders of those who said "Here am I" when asked "Who will help build this Temple Beth Emet?" Ten families with a vision in 1958. Members with hammers and saws who turned a house on Magnolia Boulevard into a synagogue. People who gave of their time, their talents, and their fortunes over the years. Their spirits call to us "Who will keep Temple Beth Emet going? Who will care for the Temple Beth Emet Family?" Will each of us answer "Here am I"? Will we meet the test?

A new year is before us. In 5774 may we answer the call, may we all say "Here am I."

On behalf of the Temple administration as well as my family and myself, I wish you "I'shanah tovah tikatevu," may it be a good and sweet year for all of us.

of the family to be respected, honored and loved. There is the problem, though, now I will have to examine my former actions and I will probably find then less than perfect. What a great month to begin this! Welcome to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. This is the meaning of being one with G-d, (Atone), being able to forgive and love. Moving on is not enough. I moved beyond person. Now, I ascend to a higher place by inviting, no welcoming, her into my heart and if I can do that with her, I can do that with anyone. I look forward to the ascent; I hope you will join me on the "spiritual escalator" of atonement.


