

"He shall redeem you from death... and you shall know that your tent is at peace ...and shall miss nothing". (Job 5:20-24)

A few years ago, we buried a temple member who was a veteran of World War II, including the Battle of the Bulge. In my discussions with the family, his son told me that when he (the son) wanted to go camping with his father, his father always said, "No", quite emphatically. Now, I knew the father to be an emphatic person, so I didn't think anything of it until the son continued. "As an adult, I asked my father why he never wanted to take me camping. He told me it was because his most frightening memory of camping out was waking up in his sleeping bag next to his dead friend in a field outside of Bastogne, Belgium, 1944." The initial refusal to go camping was probably done in the 50's or 60's, the explanation in the 80's. How long did that nightmare overwhelm our Temple member? How much joy did

it prevent him sharing with his son? How much hurt did it

cause that family? War is the ultimate evil. Our veterans spend, days, months, and years filled with memories of their time in service. And like all of us who face evil in our lives, we have been given a time of t'shuvah, a time to seek repentance, a time of atonement. Let Veteran's Day be to the person who has served his community in a place of war, be his Yom HaKipporim. As we fast to remember our sins on Yom Kippur; let us help the veteran remember his time with evil, by inviting him or her to join us in reflection. As we ask questions or begin dialogue, we can bring the veteran closure. And of course, as we have moments of silent prayer and reflection on our Day of Atonement, we must allow the veteran his times of silence. My rebbe Zalman taught in times of grief you allow the grieved to speak first. Your job is to sit there and be with the person. If along the way they share, you may guide them to areas you are interested in.

Recently, we buried another World War II vet. He invited me

to his home several times to hear him tell his stories of World War II Navy life. I kept putting it off and putting it off and, when I found the time to go see him, it was too close to the end. I did hear a few more stories, but not all he had and wanted to share. This Veteran's Day, I will be doing T'shuvah, because I did not help my friend to a state of return. The Jewish concept of T'shuvah means classically to return to G-d. I would like to extend it to mean for the Veteran to return to themselves. Our veterans need our help and support, not just on Veterans Day but every day to return to the good, dutiful, positive people they were before evil (war) was visited upon them. Also, even if they themselves did not face combat as both of these two men did, war still affects them. I once asked my Dad, about his friends in the teen-age Jazz band he led, he said," I was the only one who came home." I could see the pain in his eyes and heard the grief in his voice. I, too, lost a good friend in Vietnam. Let us not lose any others to their grief, their sadness, their loneliness. Let us bring them back to themselves with our care, our concern and willingness to be with them. I have one last request of you, my congregation. While November 11 is American Veteran's Day, let us honor through our actions all those we know who are veterans and have seen conflict. For Example, we have Israeli veterans, Russian veterans, Persian veterans, to name a few. Let us as a congregation rename Armistice Day/Veteran's Day, T'shuvah Day as we return our veterans and ourselves to the safety of our loving families and friends.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Have you ever been aware of an upcoming event, but decided not to attend due to the feeling that it might be awkward for you? You have to ask yourself, why do you feel this way? Is it because the people at the event make you feel uncomfortable? We all have had situations like this. The most positive thing to do is to make the best of the environment. It won't help to escalate the situation. Try not to assume that you (and your discomfort) will be the center of attention. Reality is it won't be. So, instead, be a part of the attending community. When you realize this is the way to handle the situation, there is no intimidation involved. Focus on the global aspect of the event.



You may also feel awkward to going to an event because you did not get a personal invitation. If someone does not extend a welcome, albeit by email, phone call, letter, or in person, it may feel like exclusion, but it may just be an oversight. When people get busy, they often get frazzled, too. Try not to take it personally. As for the "frazzled planner," if you want someone to attend an event, extend an invitation to them. Global invitations are like a secondary list. There is little connection. The personal touch can go a long way to making other people feel cared about and welcomed. That is always for the better and, socially, a blessing to the welcomer and the guests.

Here is one final instance; you may find out later that you were missed at the event. Focus on communication. The responsibility for the oversight lies upon the person or people who are in charge of the event. Tactfully reaching a resolution can ease the way for future events, and mend fences, if necessary, so to say.

So here is my message for you; remember to be thankful for your family and friends. It becomes ever more important this time of year.

TBE house of gathering

Two of our own Temple Beth Emet members are headed for Israel and need your help!

The McKinnon brothers, Ian and Sam, were both selected to represent the United States junior baseball team at the 19th World Maccabiah Games in Israel from July 17-30, 2013. With tryouts being held across the country in Los Angeles, Chicago and New York, the McKinnon brothers were two of 16 players chosen. "It's not every day you get this opportunity to play for your country. This is probably one of the most important things that have happened in my life," said lan, a senior who bats leadoff and plays the outfield for Burbank High School. "When I learned of the opportunity it was pretty special. I never thought about the possibility of representing my country. All I've done is played high school baseball and now it's on a much bigger level against different countries and kids from all around the world. I think that is the most special part."

"It's pretty special because so many people say how much they love their country but they never get to go somewhere and show what our country is made of," added Sam, a junior catcher also for the Burbank High School Bulldogs. "Now we get the chance to go and say, 'I love America and we are proving what America is made of.""

Born and raised in Burbank, the McKinnon brothers also excel in the classroom with Ian, 17, maintaining a 4.5 grade point average and Sam, 16, a 4.2 GPA. They have also been annual Torah readers for the temple's High Holy Day services.

The biggest challenge for Ian and Sam will be raising \$8,000 each to make the trip to Israel. They will be a part of ISRAEL CONNECT which is a program that allows them the chance to visit and tour Israel before the games, with the team. For a week prior to the baseball tournament, they will learn more about the Judaism faith, heritage and tradition.




