

"May the children of the Stock of Abraham, who dwell in this land, continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other Inhabitants; while everyone shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig tree, and there shall be none to make him afraid." (George Washington, Letter to Touro Synagogue 1790)



This year, due to the convergence of the Jewish and Secular calendars, Purim and Presidents' Day are both found in February. In an earlier American Calendar, there was Lincoln's Birthday and Washington's Birthday, not a single day devoted to all Presidents of the United States. This is the February I remember from my childhood. To me, February is the real American month, when we think of George Washington and Abraham Lincoln. I still remember classrooms adorned with Red, White and Blue and stories galore of colonial America and Civil War America.

This brings me to the differences and, surprisingly enough, the similarities between Shushan and the United States. In the Book of Esther it states, "And King Ahashuerus who reigned from India to Ethiopia, over a total of one-hundred-twenty-seven provinces." (Esther 1:1). The King ruled himself over all the states and all the people. Differently, two American quotes, come to mind, "We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union," (Preamble to the US Constitution) and "With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in". (President Lincoln's Inaugural Address 1864).

Here begins the difference between our two experiences. In ancient Shushan, one ruler rules, while in America, we the people are responsible for our provinces (states). Let us see how this has affected us. In Shushan, a leader was chosen by the king to lead the government. Out of anger over an act of what that leader perceived as disrespect, he chooses to destroy an entire community, Ours.

I am, of course, speaking about Haman and Mordechai and their interface. The king agrees with Haman's portrayal of us, "There is a nation scattered and separated among the nations throughout your empire. Their laws are different than everyone else's, they do not obey the king's laws, and it does not pay for the king to tolerate their existence", and utters the decree to kill us all. (Esther 3) We are eventually saved, but that comes later. In early America, a similar event occurred. A group of 23 Jewish refugees from Brazil landed in New Amsterdam, later New York, and were greeted by Governor Peter Stuyvesant, who sought to expel them because they were not of the prevailing church. It has been said that in each generation a Haman would arise to annihilate us, perhaps Gov. Pete was such for his generation. Like Haman, Stuyvesant was blaming innocent people for what he perceived as an insult to his beliefs and station. The leader of the Jewish immigrant community, (in my research, I found out there were other Jews in New Amsterdam, as well as the magnificent 23). Isser Levy did what his ancestor Queen Esther did 2,000 years before, he pleaded the case of the community to be treated fairly and with respect. His response from the Dutch East Indies company to Governor Stuyvesant, while not as deadly as King Ahashuerus' to Haman, was just as powerful, "Therefore after many deliberations we have finally decided and resolved to apostille [annotate] upon a certain petition presented by said Portuguese Jews that these people may travel and trade to and in New Netherland and live and remain there, provided the poor among them shall not become a burden to the company or to the community, but be supported by their own nation. You will now govern yourself accordingly." We are to be treated fairly and we are to be responsible for our community.

Thus began the difference of America and Shushan to our people. What began as a letter of rebuke to a modern day Haman, set the tone for a whole country. When Great Britain conquered New Amsterdam and it became New York, they found a community of equal Burghers (citizens) providing for themselves and OTHERS in the city and this situation became the basis for "We the people...." some 120 years later. Shushan (Iran) would remain a monarchy and fragmented always and, finally, in 1979, another Haman would seek to destroy our people. Thank G-d, many escaped to the United States, but they still find hard, 30 years later, how much we as American Jews or Jewish Americans embrace the concept of 'malice toward none, charity toward all'. And now I ask of you to as President Lincoln did, 'to finish the job', that is to' bind up the nation's wounds,... to care for him who has borne the battle and...(the) widow and (the) orphan and to do all which may achieve a just and lasting peace'. We may interpret this passage in many different ways and call each other to many different actions, but our celebration of Purim brings me to an activity we all can take part in. It sometimes gets overlooked in the panorama of Masks and Groggers and Megillahs, but it is of great power and beauty. It is called Shalach Manot, and it means the giving of portions. We are commanded to bring a portion of our sustenance to others. Usually, a plate of goodies. That's fulfilling the commandment on a simple level. But we can give to others from the great storage silos of our unique gifts. Some of us are great orators, speak up for the needy. Some of us are great artists, paint beautiful, luscious landscapes for those who only see barreness in their lives. Some of us are great singers and musicians, compose arias and symphonies which carry those who cannot travel to distant shores and forests. Some of us are excellent cooks, create gastronomical feasts for those whose nourishment is at best simple but often non-existent. And some of us are excellent huggers, with permission, translate verbal expressions of caring into physical actions. No matter how we do it, let's give a portion of ourselves to others. Let us do it in honor of Esther, Mordechai, George, John, Thomas, James, John Q., Andrew, Martin, William, Zachary, Millard, Franklin, Abraham, Ulysses, Rutherford, Chester, Grover, Benjamin, Theodore, Woodrow, Warren, Calvin, Herbert, Harry, Dwight, Lyndon, Richard, Gerald, Ronald, George, George W. and Barack. And may our actions always be a blessing (Barak) for the Jewish people and the American people.



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
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
