"Enter with a History, Leave With a Future." (Delancey Street Foundation)

Twenty four years ago when Mina was pregnant with Joshua and we were adding on to the house, I had only one request, that we carpet the bedrooms. I had been working as a Special Education Teacher for several years, and had seen what happens to babies that fall out of bed and onto hardwood floors. Our floors are ¾ inch oak. Mina agreed, and our floors



were covered. About 6 months ago, Mina came to me and said, "our baby is almost 24 years old, so can I have my floors back?" Of course I agreed and said, "Happy 25th Anniversary", and we began to interview floor specialists. (Don't worry, I have a few other 25th anniversary gifts in mind for her.) The conversations went well and we prepared for the remodeling. The only problem was in order to do the floors we would have to clear out the house. So, I went looking for movers to move our furniture, and after 30 years we had a lot of furniture. So I asked the members of our Temple Board for their recommendations and Molly Blumberg gave me the name of an unusual group, The Delancey Street Foundation. Formed in 1971 in San Francisco, it is a "residential self-help organization." Its residents are substance abusers, ex-convicts, the homeless and other needy individuals. The residents are trained as contractors, teachers, craftsmen, sales people, and, of course, furniture movers.

During the first few minutes of my conversation with the Delancey Street Foundation, I realized Molly's opinion of these men was right on. The man who took my call was professional, efficient, helpful, and knew a lot more about the process than I did. We made an appointment and two men showed up in shirts and ties. They were clean cut, soft spoken and took time to go over every detail. As with all homemakers, Mina, was concerned with breakage. The men, Adam and Bobby, assured us that

they would take the utmost care. We were not disappointed. On the day of the move, Bobby returned. I liked that. He knew how much our furniture and other possessions meant to us. But he also brought 3 other conscientious, persistent, hard working men with him, Daniel, Eduardo, and Jeffrey. From the time they arrived (at 10:15, 15 minutes late, and after two phone calls telling me they'd be 15 minutes late from Downtown LA) they went to work. They padded, shrink wrapped, bundled, carried and gently placed everything into our garage and the storage PODS. And, when we had empty space in the garage and PODS, they asked Mina if there were any more boxes she needed have help with. Mina and I showed the men extra things, not in the large furniture category, but they didn't care. They were to help us clear our house for the remodeling. Mina and I both spoke to the men about their families, their lives, and their dreams. But, of all the conversations we had with the men as they worked, one stands out in my mind. The men shared that a large part of their day was taken up with studies. Some had never finished High School and so their goal was to learn. A GED was the first step. Then they intend to go on to study towards a college degree, while staying at Delancey Street and as in our case, continue moving peoples' furniture.

I have never recommended an enterprise in this column, but I am now. If you need furniture moved, this is the organization for you. If you are looking for the highest level of Tzedakah this, too, is for you. As Maimonides says, "The greatest level, of which there is no greater is to support a fellow... by... entering into a partnership with him, or finding employment for him, in order to strengthen his hand until he no longer be dependent on others." (Mishneh Torah) On that one day, Mina and I were able to fulfill the highest level of Tzedakah, physically, spiritually, and in our own way. I hope all of you will be able to do the same. It is true, 'if you give a man a fish, you feed him for a day, if you teach him to fish, you feed him for a lifetime, but if you teach him to organize a fishing company you feed many lifetimes.'

Elisa Gallay was born in Budapest, Hungary on April 24, 1921. She grew up during a time of economic strife, when extreme left and right wing politics were fighting for control of early 1930s Europe.

As a young, talented star, Elisa was not yet distracted by the rise of the fascists in Hungary. She studied piano for 12 years at the Royal Academy of Music, dance at the Royal Opera House Ballet Studio and music at Hungary's most prestigious school, the Royal Franz Liszt Music Academy. Her studies came to an abrupt halt in early 1943 when schools were forced to expel their Jewish students.

As the Nazis occupied Hungary and continued to persecute the Jewish population, Elisa and her mother moved into her aunt's apartment on "Dob Utca" (Drum Street) which was within the walls of the newly created Jewish Ghetto. Although the Jews were only allowed out between the hours of 5 and 6 PM, Elisa would often sneak out after dark to search for food and fuel. She was continuously chased and shot at by the



"Arrow Cross" as she raced across rooftops on her way out and back to the (relative) safety of the ghetto. She kept a bullet-ridden shoe as a physical reminder of the circumstances.

Elisa and other young girls were taken out of the ghetto, daily, to clean the homes of the Arrow Cross soldiers. One day, when a torrential storm hit, she and the other girls were locked, overnight, in a windowless basement so that the soldiers wouldn't have to deal with transporting them back to their homes in the downpour. From withstanding freezing water up to her neck throughout the night, Elisa was paralyzed when the soldiers opened the door the next morning. As others who shared her experience were sent from the basement to the concentration camps, Elisa was miraculously ordered onto a stretcher and carried – by her chosen comrades - back to the ghetto. Due to her high fever and, eventually, rheumatoid arthritis, doctors allowed her stay in the apartment for an extended period. She explains the extraordinary circumstances that saved her life with a continual "G-d loves me."

When the Russian Army advanced on Budapest in the fall of 1944, Elisa became a greater target for arrest and deportation to a death camp. The liberating soldiers continually ransacked the homes in the ghetto. They stole everything in sight – food, clothing, dishes, a harmonica, an accordion - but they couldn't find anyone to carry Elisa's beloved piano out of the apartment. The soldiers ordered Elisa to perform and, in an effort to appease them, she played the Russian songs "Katyusa" and "Ejejuhnen." The soldiers, in their delight, then left the apartment without further harm.

Elisa's aunt's husband, who was not Jewish, worked hard and arranged to get "safe papers" from Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg (who saved hundreds of thousands of Hungarian Jews). Elisa and her mother were eventually placed in a Swedish "safe house" in Budapest.

After liberation, as part of the healing process and for her survival, Elisa began entertaining in re-opened nightclubs and performing in theater variety shows and on radio. In November of 1956, she escaped the communist regime by walking and crawling through the forested areas between Hungary and Austria until, after six days with no food or water, she reached the border of Vienna. She was rescued at the border and immediately contacted relatives in New York City who sent her a visa and flew her to America.

Elisa found work in New York as an accompanist at ballet classes while moonlighting as an entertainer in Hungarian nightclubs and restaurants. She married a young Cuban émigré' with whom she had a son, Dan. She recorded four LPs and, in 1962, opened her own nightclub, "Music Espresso," which was frequented by many American and Hungarian celebrities, most notably the Gabor family. She and Dan moved to Los Angeles in 1966 where Zsa Zsa Gabor introduced her to television personality Woody Woodberry. She was introduced to the camera at that time, when she became a guest artist on his local variety show.

Elisa entered a new stage when she was persuaded to audition for commercials in 1990. She immediately began landing regional and national spots for products such as V-8, Pacific Bell, CVS Pharmacy, AM/PM Mini-Markets, General Electric and more. She continued to perform live, for mostly Hungarian audiences, in Los Angeles and New York venues and eventually gained roles as a guest star on television series including "Malcolm In The Middle," "Picket Fences," and "Primetime Glick." She was then cast as Lottie, the cook, opposite Andy Garcia and James Coburn in "The Man From Elysian Fields" and as Anya, mother to Kevin Pollack's Hungarian mobster character in "The Whole Ten Yards."

Elisa died today - April 19, 2013. Along with her sweet smile and her impish laugh, her star will eternally shine.

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
