

"You are Holy because I am Holy" (Leviticus 19 and Yom Kippor Torah Portion)

I have a confession to make. As I sat in the Sukkah Joshua, Mina, and I built after Yom Kippor, I realized that I wanted to share with you my thoughts on active holiness. When most people say, "Be holy", they think that we



should only have pure thoughts, stay calm, never come out of the shell of solemnity and live lives of suffering for the sake of G-d. One of the reasons we tell people if they are in pain to sit down during services is because I don't believe holiness involves suffering. We are taught to love G-d for all the gifts G-d has bestowed upon us, not endure pain for the sake of our beliefs.

Holiness is an ongoing active positive activity, that imitates G-d. When we act as G-d does, we are holy. What was G-d's first act? To create order out of chaos, to enlighten out of darkness, and to make things grow where there was barrenness. I remember Rabbi Kramer would tell me that where there was confusion due to lack of planning or too much ego or hurt, he loved to step in and "create". I have never known anyone who didn't appreciate, nee love, Rabbi's creations. They were all built on order out of chaos; enlightenment removing darkness, whether of thought, idea or action; and a harvest of love where there had been barrenness. We can do the same. We can MAKE order out of chaos. When there is argument, we can bring people together and our spirit can hover over the pandemonium, enlightening both parties, creating new realities out of old scenarios. Truly, we will see that it is good. But it is not enough just to create new living spirit entities. Now, we must actively seek to maintain these entities. Each moment of every day is new. No two are the same. The challenges to life, spirituality and holiness are great. We cannot allow the others' flame holiness' spirit to be extinguished or even minimalized. Therefore, we must act to build upon what was holy (alive) before and feed, nourish, love and caress what we have

created so that they will live and flourish. This is not some passive action. People and souls need tending to. Deuteronomy says it best, " If you have the choice between life and death, choose life" (Chapter 30). Our active maintenance of life will preserve life for the future, our lack of activity will be death for ourselves as well as others because we too are created in holiness and as holiness. To me, holiness means preserving life. A life that is given to us whether plant or animal, small or large, ancient or new, must be preserved. We are to feed it, nourish it, take care of it and make sure it continues to live and flourish. Further, we are to protect that life. This is understandable in a physical context, but what about a spiritual context? How do we preserve the life of a spirit? Maybe it's easier to see our spirit as the precious

pearl preserved by a body. The body is the vehicle for the spirit. Just as when a body is injured in a trip or a fall, the spirit can be just as injured. Our harmful words and actions as seen and heard by the eyes and ears go directly to the soul. Thankfully, the compliments and praises given one to another, also touch the Neshama and can and will help lessen the injuries. Greater acts of love and caring even heal the greatest of wounds. The holiness of G-d involves creation, maintenance and preservation of the spirit. How can we, as those created in the image of holiness, do less than create holiness together, nourish each other's holiness and preserve the holy spark in each other? When we have done all this, constantly and actively, then we will indeed be holy.

BY -LAWS OF TEMPLE BETH EMET OF BURBANK

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Regular Members. A person may be admitted to Membership by the Membership Committee in accordance with such rules and regulations as the Board of Directors or Membership from time to time shall have promulgated.

Section 2. Regular members shall pay dues and charges in such amounts and upon such terms and conditions as shall be designated by the Board of Directors subject to ratification by the General Membership. Changes in Membership Fees must be ratified by the General Membership at a regular or special membership meeting.

Section 3. The purchase, lease or sale of Real Property shall be approved by the Board of Directors and ratified by a majority vote of the Membership at a regular or special Membership Meeting.

Section 4 (a). Members of the Congregation in good standing shall be entitled to the right and privilege to use and enjoy the facilities and the services of the Congregation upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Directors from time to time shall prescribe.

Section 4 (b). A Member to be considered in good standing shall be current in financial obligations to the Temple unless other arrangements have been made with the Committee on Membership. This refers to dues, fees, tuition and other charges that the Member may be obligated for to the Temple.

Section 4 (c). Membership dues are payable in advance. They may be paid on an annual, semi-annual, quarterly or monthly basis, at option of Member. New members shall pay dues starting from the first day of the month following that in which they have joined.

Section 4 (d) (1). A reduced annual rate may be extended to members who are unable to pay the regular membership rate, and adjustment, deferral, or forbearance of dues may be allowed members, upon the determination of the Committee on Membership.

Section 4 (d) (2). Partial or complete scholarships may also be extended upon recommendation of the Membership Committee.

Section 4 (e). Religious School fees shall be recommended by the Executive Committee for approval by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. Members Not in Good Standing. Any member delinquent in the payment of any dues or charges who shall continue in default for more than three months from date of billing, where no arrangement for adjustment, deferral or Forbearance of same has been made with the Committee on Membership, shall not be in good standing. Members not in good standing shall not be accorded the privilege of membership, including voting rights, attendance in Religious Schools, nor permitted to act as an Officer or Board Member.

Section 6. Application for membership shall be in writing, and shall be referred to and passed upon by the Committee on Membership.

Section 7. Each and every person now being or hereafter becoming a member of this Congregation agrees to abide by the provisions of these By-Laws and resolutions, which have been or hereafter may be enacted.

Section 8. Resignations must be submitted in writing and shall not relieve a member from liability for the payment of any dues or charges which may have accrued or become payable prior to the effective date of any such resignation

Section 9. Honorary Membership. Honorary Membership shall be conferred upon the Rabbi and such other individuals as the Board of Directors may recommend and Membership shall ratify.


