"Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry And that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? When thou seest the naked, that thou cover him, And that thou hide not thyself from thine own flesh? Then shall thy light break forth as the morning, And thy healing shall spring forth speedily; And thy righteousness shall go before thee. The glory of the LORD shall be thy reward." (Isiah 58:7-8)

At this time of the year, when we are rereminded by the Maccabees' struggle for
rededication to Temple and to our people and
what it means to us today, may I say Thank You to those
who have contributed to helping our Temple members who
have been in difficulty. Your commitment through food,
clothing and contributions for housing them has been greatly
appreciated. Those of you who I have reached out to
personally, and responded to my pleas, let me further say,
"Yesher Coach," (may you be made stronger through your
Mitzvoth).

The Maccabees fought a struggle to maintain our way of life. The Greeks, Syrians and even fellow birth Jews saw, the Greek life style as more to their liking. The words of Mattathias still ring out. "All who are for G-d and country follow me." We at Temple Beth Emet have as part of our manifesto the words, "All that is right in the eyes of G-d." So, what does G-d see as right? The Prophet Micah says. "Do justice, love loving mercy and walk humbly with your G-d (6:8)". If you see injustice, right it, if you are a merciful person, make it a part of your being. Love the action of being merciful. Normally, we discount infatuation as being false love. Not with mercy, be infatuated with doing merciful acts. As infatuation does not let you think of anything but the person to whom you are infatuated, being infatuated with mercy means not doing anything but showing mercy to people. On a practical level, even if you doubt the truth of the sadness of the situation shared, listen with a merciful ear. Let your soul take over and go to the place that says," You will love your neighbor as yourself." Ask yourself, "what would I want people to do for me if these things had happened to me?"

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - December 2014

Hanukkah begins at sundown on Tuesday, December 16. I invite you to join us each night of Hanukkah at the Burbank Town Center on the third floor just outside of Burlington Coat Factory as we light the hanukkiyah. There will be a different activity each evening as we share our celebration with our neighbors. This is a wonderful opportunity to showcase our Temple family -- please participate!



How did Hanukkah turn from a minor festival, not even mentioned in the Bible, to something that, as *Time* magazine reported in 2011, "the most celebrated Jewish holiday in the U.S.?" I had always thought that the elevation of Hanukkah coincided with the rise of the suburbs. Jewish families were no longer living in Jewish neighborhoods and were suddenly surrounded by the lights, sounds, cheer and,of course, presents associated with Christmas. I surmised that Jewish parents amped up Hanukkah in an attempt to keep their children from feeling deprived. It turns out that the increase in importance of Hanukkah in the United States started a century earlier.

In her book, *Hanukkah in America: A History*, Dianne Ashton, a professor at Rowan University, explores how the observance of Hanukkah in the United States has evolved from the earliest day of the country to the present day. The increased interest in Hanukkah began in earnest in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> Century with increased interest in the Maccabees themselves. They became the center of debate regarding who, if anyone, would be the official Jewish religious leadership in the United States. That debate evolved into a disagreement between reformers and traditionalists as to the nature of American Judaism itself. Reformers stressed the themes in the Hanukkah story of the struggle for freedom, while traditionalists stressed the need to turn away from assimilating influences and return to traditional Judaism as the Maccabees had led the people away from Hellenistic influences culminating in the rededication of the Temple.

As the Reform movement grew to dominance in American Jewry, groups such as the Young Men's Hebrew Association organized spectacles with music, drama, and speeches. By the close of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century the Reform movement especially had embraced Hanukkah as a means to keep Jewish children engaged in Judaism. Hanukkah celebrations at that time were largely centered in the synagogue and later in Jewish communal organizations. The realization soon grew in both reformist and traditionalist circles that by emphasizing communal celebration, the value of domestic rituals was being diminished. As the home celebration of Hanukkah gained attention, the tradition of gift giving as we know it developed.

The transformation of the celebration of Hanukkah did not develop in a vacuum, but paralleled developments in Jewish communities world-wide. It also developed as a reaction to the evolution of Christmas into the American holiday it has become -- sometimes borrowing or imitating aspects, and other times emphasizing the need to maintain a separate Jewish identity.

Today, Hanukkah has found its place in the greater American holiday season. It appears in advertisement and merchandising. Even the 99 Cent store has a Hanukkah end cap! It is better understood by our neighbors, although from time to time we still have to correct the misconception that it is "Jewish Christmas." It has even evoked jealously from our neighbor's children that our children get gifts for <u>eight</u> nights.

Ashton leaves us with the following perspective of our holiday:

"Hanukkah gave American Jews an annual occasion to ponder the demands of Jewish loyalty, the dangers of dissension among Jews, and the courage they would need to remain faithful Jews during the Christmas season, when their minority status became most vivid. At the same time, as we have seen, Hanukkah also provided a vehicle for reaching the social goals of enhancing familial bonds, educating children, and promoting communal ties. With so rich a capacity to improve and enlighten Jewish lives, Hanukkah achieved a new, more significant place in the American Jewish calendar than it had known in two thousand years of Jewish history."

May we all have a very happy Hanukkah, a joyful holiday season, and a healthy and happy 2015.

#### A LETTER FROM KAL ENGELBERG

Dear Rabbi Mark:

I am writing to you, Rabbi Mark, as the spiritual leader of the Temple, but this letter is really about, and for, so many others. Let me explain. On behalf of my family, including my wife Julie, my son Tony, and my brother Jerry, I want to again thank everyone involved in the planning of the Memorial Service for my brother. I also want to thank everyone who participated in the Service itself, as well as those who helped prepare the Temple, the seating for the Service, the dining area, the very meaningful display in the hallway, and the personalized Kippot. The Temple looked wonderful! I want to thank everyone who spoke about their own personal experiences with Jerry. I know standing in front of any group is hard. It is perhaps even harder to stand before people you know and share something personal. On this day, everyone was so eloquent and so sincere. What I felt from everyone was love for Jerry.

I want to thank all of the people who helped prepare and serve the incredible food that we ate. I ate, and ate to the point that I had to forgo my dinner. My wife will verify, and my waistline will confirm, that I rarely miss any meal, but on that day. . . The food was delicious, and so plentiful! I also want to thank everyone who approached me, my wife and my son while we were eating, and afterward, to share with us how Jerry had touched their lives and their hearts. I want to thank those responsible for the tribute from the Navy. While Jerry's time spent in the Navy was a period of great concern for our parents, it was the springboard for his career in the United States Post Office and a lifetime source of pride. I know I am missing many people who were involved behind the scenes, both in the planning and on the day of the Memorial Service. I want to thank them, too. They know who they are and just how important they were to the overall success of the day. My hope is that you, Rabbi Mark, and the entire congregation praise them, as well as those individuals who may have had a more visible role. I believe Jerry was one of those behind the scenes people for other activities at the Temple. Without these unsung heroes, the Memorial Service would not have been the incredible day that it was, and the Temple itself can not continue to be the kind of place where so many people can be brought together to support, share and to express love.

I must admit that we were overwhelmed by all that occurred that day. Jerry, I think, would have been very appreciative, a little embarrassed, and definitely confused. He would have been surprised and a little embarrassed that so many did so much and said so many nice things about him. We were taught to always try to do what needs to be done to the best of our abilities, and to do it behind the scenes, if possible. We were taught not to seek personal recognition, and that knowing that you always tried to do the right thing, to the best of your abilities, was reward enough. But, and this is a big BUT, in Jerry's case, he did not feel that anyone appreciated what he did. Yes, he was always around, but did anyone even notice that where there once was a burned out light bulb, that now a new bulb burns brightly? He did not think that anyone cared. In the end, he was truly concerned about the viability of the Temple. How I wish that he was physically at the Memorial Service, because what happened that day proved him wrong. We saw that people at Beth Emet do care, and are able and willing to do whatever is needed to accomplish a task. For your role, as spiritual leader of the Temple, I want to thank you, Rabbi Mark, for creating and sustaining an environment where people can and do work together and feel safe in sharing a part of themselves. The great sadness for me is that it only happened after Jerry was gone. So many people came together, each with their own role to play, to make the Memorial Service such a wonderful day. I sincerely hope that everyone was not so busy that they missed the opportunity to see and feel what was happening that day. It is my sincere hope that members of the Temple continue to care about the Temple, and about each other. Our dad used to often say that two simple words can go a long way. The words? "Thank you." So, remember to say those two little words, I want to thank everyone for the little things you do to make the Temple and the community a better place,.




