"Oh Mine GrandPa, to me he was so wonderful" (apologies to Eddie Fisher).

In two weeks, it will be Father's Day and I was thinking about one of my fathers, my maternal grandfather, Louis Altman, Aryeh Loeb Ben Avraham. He was born in New York City in 1907, a rarity for my generation, the son of



immigrants from Bessarabia, Romania, near the Ukrainian border and the Caucasus Mountains. My grandfather's family owned a sheep ranch, and an inn near Nova Skitula, also unusual for Jews there, and my great-grandfather was a veteran of the Russo-Japanese War. My grandfather was a true self-made man. As par for the course, he left school at the end of the 6th grade to help his father in the fur business and later built his own retail business in the Bronx. He was a man who shined his shoes every day and went off to work to support his family, which at times was two generations and sometimes 3 (my cousins and I worked in his fur store from time to time, but more about that later). Maybe because he had to leave school at such an early age was why he always valued learning. One Saturday, I didn't come to work with him in the store. The next day when he called me to come over and visit, he only had one question, "Did you stay home from work because of school?" When I told him, "No, I just wanted to go out with my friends," all he said to me was, "I had to open the store an hour late because you were not there to open it with me." I was ashamed because, at that moment, he showed me with his words how valuable I was to the store that he spent a lifetime building. To many today that might sound strange, but let me go back in time about 2 years. My parents split up the Thursday after my Bar Mitzvah. In 1963, that was very rare and terribly embarrassing. Suddenly, I was one parent below my friends. To an eighth grader who was chubby with thick glasses it was like being exiled to (Continued on Page 4.) Outcastville.

But right before the school year began, in September, my grandfather called and my mother handed me the phone. My grandfather asked me," Do you want to come and work for me in my store on Saturdays? I will pay you \$5 a day plus whatever tips you get from the customers." I agreed and from then on my self-respect grew. Especially that first Hanukkah season, when I was able to pay for my gifts to my family, specifically gifts for my little sister, Ellen. Let's be honest, having your own money to do with it as you please is truly exhilarating. Plus, how I earned the money was important too. I had to carry ladies' fur coats that, at the age of 13, were taller than I was; over my head so they wouldn't get wet from rain, snow or dirty slush. Little by little, the chubbiness became the muscleness. Without me knowing it, my grandfather, this epitome of Americana, from his FlorSheim Shoes to his Brooks Brothers suits, to being a Cesar Romero, the movie star of the 1940's, look alike, practiced Maimonides' highest level of Tzedakah. When someone is in trouble you enter into partnership with them. He made me a partner in his endeavors in both his business and love of planting rose bushes. Now, it may seem to some sacrilegious, but his ashes now give nourishment to my rose bushes as his teachings of rose bush planting gave nourishment to my self-image and self-worth as they grew, I grew in stature from his nourishing guidance. My grandfather was fluent in both Yiddish and English, but always struck me as being opposed to Traditional Judaism. He was not one to go to synagogue, except for the High Holidays and then, mostly to say Kaddish for his parents. But he did Judaism. He never turned a shnorrer [a beggar] away from his door. Sometimes, when I am in a Thrift shop and I see a key chain from Israel with the Priestly Blessing on it, I remember the elderly bearded men who would come into his store asking for money for the Yeshiva in Jerusalem and he would give them some gelt, without complaint, without batting an eye, without a frown. And they would give him some trinket in return. They were doing business, not begging. He taught me we take care of those in need, quietly, simply, caringly. One does not make a big deal, one just does. Years later, I found out that during the dark days before the Holocaust, my grandfather signed papers for a cousin to come to the U.S. He was taking responsibility for another mouth to feed even though he and my grandmother had three little children of their own to support in the dark days of the Great Depression. And, in 1973, when Israel was attacked on Yom Kippur, he was so angry that a country would be attacked on their holiest day that he became the leader of the United Israel Campaign in his condominium complex in Florida.

So why was my grandfather so opposed to organized religion? I would not find out about why that was until many years later, sitting with him at our home in West Hills. I asked him what his earliest memory of his mother, my great- grandmother was and he said it was waiting for her to come out of the Mikvah, the ritual bath. I said, "Grandpa, the mikvah? that, you remember, but you're not religious." He said, "My parents were, but I got turned off at an early age." I asked, "How?" expecting the worst. Grandpa said, "When I was a young lad (quaint was his speech), I asked the Rabbi lots of questions, and all he would answer me was 'Ish posht nisht,' it's not for you to know." And so, after a while, I stopped asking and stopped being interested."

Wow! What a further lesson I learned from my grandfather. If you want to stifle Judaism in young, eager, energetic young people tell them not to ask questions, it's for the Rabbi to know and they are not. These are just a few of the lessons my grandfather taught me. I was blessed to have my grandfather in my life for 47 years, Mina and the boys got to know him and know how much he loved them. And I learned so much from him: a) Value education, b) When someone is in trouble with their self-image, offer to give them the opportunity to change their lives, by earning a living or doing a needed activity, c) Remember to remind them of their value to the enterprise, and d) When anyone has a question to ask, explain to them, talk to them, and make sure you consider it important that they know the answer to all questions they are asking.
