As you all know, one of my favorite activities

with our students is called trivia. At opening assembly, I ask them a question about the Torah portion for that week, a holiday or a fact of Jewish History. Interested students come to the study after school and when they answer the guestion correctly, they get a prize. At the first session of this year, weeks before the New Year, I asked the students what was the next Jewish holiday? The answer they gave was Rosh Hashanah and they won a prize. On the way home I thought to myself, if they had said Shabbat, they would have been at least, equally or even more, right. A holiday is defined as, "a day of festivity or recreation when no work is done." Shabbat. Friday night to Saturday night, is Biblically ordained to be a day of rest from work, so it fits the latter part of the definition. The problem for many people is turning it into a day of festivities. On that score, the kids were right! Rosh Hashanah is much more festive than Shabbat ever is. How does one make Shabbat more festive or more recreational? Coming to Temple aside, we need to make our homes more "Shabbat like." During the week, how many of us get to sit together with our families for one complete meal? How many times are we running off to do business, answer the phone or photocopy a document? Our spouses and our children are growing before our eyes and they, too, have business to take care of. Would it be so hard if we made a rule in our homes that for one Shabbat meal, the phone, radio, TV, DVD player, etc. stayed off and we talked WITH each other? Maybe we would find out that we have a lot in common, same joys, same sadness, same fear, and same confidence. These young people are our prodigies as we are our parents' students. And when we have rediscovered the stranger sitting

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - January 2015

One of the first people I met at Temple Beth Emet was Norm Goodman. When it came time to enroll our son, Jonathan, in religious school, TBE seemed like a natural choice. I am Jewish and my wife, Diane, is Protestant. I knew a Reform congregation would accept all of us as a family. We saw an advertisement for an open house in the newspaper (people read newspapers back then) and went down one evening.



Norm and his wife, Naoma, were taking us around, and rushing down the hall was Rabbi Mark. He stopped and we were introduced to each other. He dropped to one knee and gave Jonathan a hug, saying "Jonathan -- gift from God!" Today it would be Jonathan who would have to reduce altitude to hug Rabbi, but then it was just the thing to make me know we had found the right place.

The Goodmans knew what they were doing. Maneuvering us into the Temple office, we found ourselves cornered with a membership application in front of us. They did not let us leave without getting a check. This method was completely foreign to Diane, and it took some time for her to recover, but we have remained active at TBE almost 20 years now, and I think people are more fond of her than they are of me. With good reason I suppose.

Norm, at that time, was a Past-President, and Naoma was President. After about a year they decided that I was the kind of young blood the board needed, and so I became a Director, later a Vice-President, and then President. When I was installed, Norm grasped my hand and said, "You're one of us now!" What he meant was that being a Temple President was not only an honor, but a responsibility that would not expire with the term of office. Norm felt that a Past-President had an obligation to continue to support and work for the Temple.

Norm was old-school Temple Beth Emet. He would tell stories of the Temple's past. Sometimes he would remark, "If Hank Blum had been alive he never would have allowed" this or that. Other times he would go down the list of Past-Presidents with a critique of each one. When he saw something going on at Temple he didn't like, he would tell you. Norm was a straight shooter, you knew where you stood with him on things. He was loyal and expected loyalty as well. He was a proud man, and he took care of himself physically. He would always remind me that he could kick my ass, and I always agreed. I'm sure he was right, too. Norm was also one of those people where a handshake always led to a hug and it was a genuine and affectionate hug.

We lost Norm last month. A memorial service will be help on January 18, 2015 at 2:00 PM at the Temple.

When something like this happens I start thinking about all the wonderful people I have known at TBE who are not here any longer. Many have been gone so long that their names are unfamiliar to many currently part our Temple family. Sometimes it makes me wistful and melancholy to remember the friends and colleagues who no longer walk the halls of Temple Beth Emet, but who did so much to make TBE the kind of place it is. The remedy for these feelings is to visit the religious school on Sunday, or see a class perform on a Friday night, or see a performance of the children such as *Hannukah*, *the Musical* last month. It is not only the children, but the parents, that lift the spirit. The parents (like it or not) will be the next leaders of our Temple, and the children (believe it or not) will some day tower over the parents like my son does to me. Looking toward the future cures the longing for the past. We can never forget, however, what those who came before us have given us, and the responsibility that now rests on us to keep our Temple strong so we may pass it on to future generations.

apart from us is really the life entity we have nurtured to fruition, we may just want to spend more time with them. They (spouses and children) have some pretty wonderful schemes and dreams. We then need to work together to make those fantasies realities, if possible, of course. But the journey together is the most important thing. Travel the bumpy roads and the super highways of life with your children. One of the greatest joys a parent or a child can have is to live vicariously through the journeys of their opposite number. And this mutual journey of parent and child must never end. Up until the week he died, my father was still my coach's sounding board. He listened to me complain over losing seasons and be ecstatic over the winning ones, he knew the blown kicks and the penalty kicks scored. He heard it all from me and I am so glad he took the trip because I needed him and his perspective. And I say it without pause or doubt, his advice made my soccer players the champions they were both as individuals and as a team. I know that he enjoyed the journey, because he told me. And that is the last element of rest and relaxation that should be part of Shabbat, the free and open communication between parent, spouse and child. What is more nerve racking than to guard one's words when speaking to one's loved ones? Nothing! And what is the greatest calm and comfort? Speaking openly and without fence or wall. but just what is in your heart, your soul and your uniqueness. As Rabbi Nahman of Bratslov states, "Make an effort to feel the joy of Shabbat and you will find true happiness."




