

"I do therefore invite my fellow citizens ... to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens (to) commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers... and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the



full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union." (Abraham Lincoln, Thanksgiving Day Proclamation 1863)

This November we are going to be part of an event that has never happened before and will not happen again. I am, of course, speaking about the first day of Hanukkah being on American Thanksgiving Day. This is because the last time this happened was in 1861 and President Lincoln did not make the fourth Thursday of November Thanksgiving Day until 1863. But there are some other commonalities here as well. All three events, the struggle of the Maccabees, the Puritans coming to America and President Lincoln's Presidency all had to do with countries in the midst and aftermath of Civil War. Yes, the Maccabees' struggle was not only against the Seleucid Greeks who ruled over Judea, they fought against those Jews who would leave Judaism in favor of the more worldly Greek philosophy. These Hellenists thought Judaism was old fashioned and out of touch with the modern culture. Mattathias' simple, yet profound, call to arms, "all who are for G-d and country follow me" envelopes the two main foundations of Judaism, G-d and

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

President's Message – November 2013

Some latkes with your turkey?

There is an unusual occurrence at the end of the month, and by now I am sure you are aware of it. The first day of Hanukkah is November 28 - Thanksgiving Day. Hanukkah starts the evening before. This will not happen again until the year 79,811 C.E. (we should all live and be well). Whether it has ever happened before or not is the subject of some discussion. Prior to 1863 there was no national day of Thanksgiving so it could not have happened prior that year. On October 3, 1863 President Lincoln issued a proclamation establishing the last Thursday of November of that year as a day for "Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens." Thanksgiving was proclaimed to be the fourth Thursday of November by President Franklin Roosevelt in 1939 at the behest of retailers seeking a longer holiday shopping season in those years when there were five Thursdays in November. It was formally established as the fourth Thursday of November in 1941 by act of Congress.

Many commentators have observed that from 1863 on the first day of Hanukkah never fell on Thanksgiving Day, but they were using the fourth Thursday of November as Thanksgiving. If you look at the dates when Thanksgiving actually was observed on a fifth Thursday, then the first day of Hanukkah fell on Thanksgiving in 1888.

The internet is full of suggestions on how to commemorate this once-in-many-lifetimes convergence, which many have dubbed

"Thanksgivukkah." Since Thanksgiving and most Jewish Holidays revolve around food, there are recipes of course, for things such as latkes with cranberry applesauce (maybe), Manischewitz-brined turkey



(pass!), and sweet potato bourbon noodle kugel (that actually sounds good).

I urge you, however, to celebrate each holiday separately albeit concurrently. Each deserves to have its own traditions and messages observed. Hanukkah celebrates the victory of religious freedom over tyranny. Thanksgiving is an opportunity to express gratitude for our blessings.

If you absolutely must combine your Thanksgiving and Hanukkah celebrations, I can not think of a better way than to join us at the Burbank Town Center, where again this year we will be lighting the giant hanukkiyah on the third floor near Burlington Coat Factory and having different events each night. A list of the activities and times for each night will be publicized as soon as preparations are finalized. Come down after Thanksgiving Dinner! Macy's is opening most stores at 8:00 pm (I haven't been able to confirm if Burbank is among them yet) so you can celebrate Hanukkah, get some great deals, and walk off some of that turkey dinner.

However you celebrate Thanksgiving and Hanukkah, I wish you all happy and healthy holidays, and I want you to know that of all the things for which I am thankful, my Temple Beth Emet family is at the top of the list.

the people of Israel. The Maccabees fought a long and costly war to preserve their freedom and the freedom of our people to worship as they desired. Antiochus sought to prevent such things as holy worship in the Temple and circumcision and was supported by members of the Jewish people. The Puritans (also called the Pilgrims because of their journey to the new Promised Land) were also involved in a Civil War. This was in Great Britain. They fled the fight, first to the Netherlands and then to Massachusetts. All so they could worship in Freedom. Abraham Lincoln became president of a country about to be split by war into two Americas. His presidency and the freeing of the slaves cannot and should not be ever separated.

Unfortunately, there is one more similarity all these Freedom "fighters" have in common. Once they came into power, they sought to persecute other members of their communities. The Hasmoneans (the Maccabees real name) did not want to give up power once the civil war was over. Previous to the Seleucid take over, there had been a balance of power between the priestly families and the "secular" leadership. Being that the Hasmoneans were a priestly family, the Power of the Temple was theirs. But it was not enough; they wanted to be kings as well. They persecuted the opposition and a further civil war broke out only to be quelled by Pompeii and his Roman legions. We all know how that ended, exile and slavery for our people. The Puritans ruled the Massachusetts Bay Company with an iron fist, stocks and a funeral pyre. To be practicing any form of religion other than that deemed appropriate by the elders of the colony was

punishable by humiliation, whipping, stoning, and even death. The United States that emerged from the Civil war was not as President Lincoln had imagined it. People wanted revenge. Carpetbaggers streamed to the South, unscrupulous land speculators took advantage of a south devastated by war. Brother fought brother, father fought son and it took 100 years for the 13th Amendment to truly be the law of the land. The words "Let us die to make men free" ignored the fact that the defeated Confederates had a right to be free in the newly re -united United States of America. Preachers preached that the races still had to remain apart and physically enforced that until 1954, where Brown Verses Board of Education struck down "separate but equal." Now, how could, no should, we celebrate this convergence of freedoms? Here are my suggestions. Feel free to choose 1: First, we need to make sure that now that we have power, personal or communal, that we do not seek to increase our power at the expense of others. We must include others in our discussions. Allow for new ideas to enter our community. An open transparent exchange of ideas, or as a former Temple member once said, "unlimited arguing privileges," is a basic tenet of Judaism. We must empower those who are powerless, the poor, the orphan, the widowed, and the stranger. The Torah and the Talmud are clear. If we are to be free, we must ensure that others are free as well. Further, we must make a conscious effort to be inclusive. Many of us live very demanding lives. Still, it is imperative that we bring others into our community. For those who feel they have no one to share their pain, their anguish and, even their joy, we step up and be their sharers. Share ourselves with them and they will feel included in our lives. Give of ourselves and they will give

physically spiritually or uniquely, we will become for them their "*candle of hope*," never to be extinguished. The Eternal light was built in the desert so people would know where the Taberry

We must become a beacon guiding others to us for prayer, counsel, friendship, and love. Each day during Hanukkah choose a different person and place them in your heart with a prayer. Be the shoulder to cry on or the "hugger par excellence." Caring, sharing, breathing, meeting, loving, turtle doving, however you enable that other person to be free, you will be their Maccabee. And truly, "a great miracle will have happened here" and we will be Thankful for it.

Our next meeting will be November 3rd, 10am. All Temple women and interested men are invited to join. We need you and you will enjoy being a member.




Dear TBE Family,






