Last month's column was written before the trip to Israel, due to publishing deadlines, so now I get to tell you about the trip. Fourteen intrepid travelers ranging in age from 24 to 70+ spent 11 days going from the far north of the Golan Heights to the south of the Red Sea (Eilat). We saw ancient monuments, the Kotel (Western Wall) and modern memorials, the Ilan Ramon (Israeli Shuttle Astronaut) center at Mitzpe Ramon. We toured relics of war and centers for peace. Centuries old synagogues and modern Jewish centers. But, as I prepare for Purim, which we celebrate on Wednesday March 23 with our multi-lingual Megillah reading, I am remembered some texts from the Megillah. Haman says, "There is a people spread out and scattered... who obey their own laws". I can tell you Israel is the living, breathing, picture of that statement and while Haman meant it negatively, Israel is showing the world how one tiny country, smaller than New Jersey, absorbed and continues to absorb, those who need a home. We met Jews from Argentina, France, Ethiopia

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - March 2016



It is not unusual for religious communities such as ours to be divided between the families with school children and "everyone else." Parents have specific concerns and interests. They advocate for their children's needs and work to enrich their children's experience in the community. They socialize together and tend to be in similar stages of life, with more related interests.

The "everyone else" tend to be more focused on the institution as a whole, but they still are often divided among themselves. Some are mostly concerned with religious observance and worship. Some seek a social experience. Some prioritize *tikkun olam* - repairing the world - and are involved in social causes.

Many people's interests bridge across groups and these two main groups and subgroups tend to cross paths from time.

I have always thought that our community is enriched when we interact more often and more fully. My involvement at Temple Beth Emet started as a religious school parent. My son was friends with the son of one of the directors whose father was a long-time board member. Of course, we hung out together during religious school. As I became more aware of concerns that were facing the temple, I decided to go to a board meeting and let the board know how I felt. Either they were interested in what I had to say or they smelled "fresh meat," but it wasn't long until I was a director, and the rest is history. My work with the Temple community, all parts of it, has been very rewarding and enriching. I encourage everyone to become more involved in their Temple.

As with most families, sometimes some of us feel that others of us are not being supportive of our interests and sometimes some of us feel that we are being put upon or carrying more than our fair share of the load at Temple.

For example, except for the Family Service the first Shabbat of the month, attendance at Shabbat services is spotty. The Sisterhood will put on programs that should appeal to everyone, yet participation is limited. The Religious School parents plan events that the rest of the congregation fail to support. A call for volunteers to help with Family Promise goes largely unanswered.

We can all do better. This month the Religious School is putting on its annual Purim Carnival. We may not all want to play the games, but we can show up and have a snack, enjoy the company of our children, and show support for our parents. The Sisterhood will have a Purim potluck and costume party. Our rotation with Family Promise is coming up this month. We can help one evening making and serving dinner and sharing some time with families in the program.

We are a family. I know that we all have demands on our time. I know that sometimes activities don't seem planned with our needs in mind. I know that sometimes we may even annoy or hurt each other. Sometimes family members get on each other's nerves or step on each other's toes, or just seem like an additional demand on our lives. That is what a family is all about, isn't it? Along with the annoyance and hurt and aggravation and exhaustion, there is a bond between family members. We share simchas and sadnesses, we stand together against challenges, we forgive each other and we love each other.

Remember, the Children of Israel were of 12 tribes, but we all marched together as we journeyed from Egypt.

and Great Britain, non-Jews from Eritrea and Japan. All were welcomed and able to practice their religion as they saw fit. When you meet one of the "Magnificent Double 7," ask them to show you the videos of the Baptism at the Jordan River or ask me about the youth choir singing on Ben-Yehuda Street.

But now, as I prepare the Megillah for Purim, I am reminded of another quote. Mordechai begs Esther, saying, "If you don't help us, our help will come from someplace else." There was one very serious incident on the trip, one of our members tripped and broke her ankle. I say it proudly that, after a bit of grousing, our group came together in unity and support. We all worked so that the injured member took part in all the activities she chose and we muddled through together. As Queen Esther, in spite of her fears, did the right thing, our group did the same.

Now I need all of us to look again at Mordechai's comment but on a deeper level. You see, if we do not help Israel, now, I don't think our help will come from another place. Israel is being attacked, not just by the PLO, Hamas, Hezbollah, ISIS and Al-Qaida, but by those who would remove all forms of aid to her. Divestiture is as deadly as a bomb that destroys businesses in Tel-Aviv, a boycott as fatal as a rocket from the Gaza Strip. We must stand up and be counted. And once we stand up, let us walk to LAX and go VISIT Israel. Tourism, facing our security fears, just like Queen Esther, and speaking openly against those who would harm us, will get us the same reaction she received. As Ahashuerus loved her, we will know how much we are loved and cared for, by Israelis, by fellow Americans and by the right thinking people of the world. If we lead, they will follow. Then they will see what we saw in Jerusalem and throughout the entire country, an international land open to all and helping all to open themselves to growth, growing in safe and loving ways. Then we will be doing as Mordechai did, "Seeking what is good for our people, and speaking peace for all future generations."
