No, I am talking about the 11 o'clock news, which starts out with a car chase, a shooting, a hit and run, etc. How can I be a positive influence on people when everyday my soul gets bombarded? And no, I can't just turn off the TV. Thank G-d, people still talk to me and ask for help. The problem for me as for all of us is that this world is becoming so overwhelmingly disrespectful.

How do I keep from falling into the depths of despair? Let me relate two stories about how children saved me.

When I was a freshman at Rutgers, I fell in love with a wonderful young lady. When I realized, not only did she not love me, but I believe she used me to make her "serious" boyfriend jealous, I was devastated. For days, I was inconsolable. A good friend of mine, Joseph Pawlick, told me about a volunteer program that met every Saturday afternoon. All we had to do was be with these "special education" students and help them achieve what they

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - October 2016

How shall we approach the High Holidays? We may have been taught that the Days of Awe are serious, solemn, fearful times when our lives over the past year are carefully measured and our fate for the coming year determined. Maybe we see it as a cleansing time, when we settle accounts with God and others, and go forth with a fresh slate.



Let us consider another vision of the Days of Awe, as a time for a mutual reconnection between the Holy One and the holy spirit within each of us. In 1955, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Hershel published a book God in Search of Man: A Philosophy of Judaism. I have to admit that it has been too long since I read the book to recall all the content. I found my copy from college, and after doing some repair to the paperback binding, I am putting it in line with the other books I intend to read or reread. Additionally, there is a phrase contained in Gates of Prayer for Shabbat and Weekdays, our former prayer book, that speaks of the synagogue as "the sanctuary of Israel" and pronounces, "Let all the family of Israel, all the who hunger for righteousness, all who seek the Eternal, find God here -- and here find life!"

God in search of humanity, humanity in search of God. We reach out and embrace each other during the High Holidays. We reconnect and reconcile. We ask and God grants forgiveness. pardon, and atonement. God asks and we commit to being ethical, charitable and humble, and to do acts of loving kindness. We ask God to take care of our souls, and God asks us to take care of God's creation, including the Earth and its population.


I like this vision because it illustrates the mutual obligations and responsibilities of humanity and God -- I guess it appeals to my legal training. It also makes it easier to make the commitment to follow God's teaching when we realize that God has also made a commitment to us. Judaism is founded on the Covenant made at Sinai. That Covenant was bilateral. We are partners. Each party benefits and depends on the other to do their part.

So when we gather on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (and Sukkot and Simcha Torah) and we greet each other and say, "It's good to see you again!" and ask, "How have your been?" and promise, "Let's not let it be another year before we reconnect with each other," let us be mindful that these are not things we are saying only to each other, they are things that we, individually and as a community, are saying to God, and God is saying to us.

Let's keep in touch.

On behalf of the Temple administration as well as my family, I wish you I'shanah tovah tikatevu, may it be a good sweet year for all of us.

wanted to achieve. One Saturday, a spry 9 year just wanted to throw a ball and have an adult get it and bring it back to her. For one whole hour that is all I did. I still can see the look on her face of empowerment. No longer was she powerless. Her laughter and joy spoke volumes, not only of her empowerment but of showing me that I could mean something to another human being.

In 1995, it became obvious that if I stayed teaching Middle School, a real tragedy would occur. As you all well know, I love to tell jokes. The only bad joke is the one that hurts another Human being. That was where my humor was going. I had lost the capacity to love children.

I had been doing Summer school at a Spec. Ed. Center, a euphemism for school for Severely Handicapped children. They had an opening, so I transferred. After 6 years there, I had learned to love children again. I learned sign language so the children who were non-verbal could communicate with us and with each other. We took them swimming so legs atrophied could be used to help young bodies float and children could feel the freedom of weightlessness. We walked together to restaurants so our children could feel empowered to choose and order food. Simple to us but monumental to them. We all built together a monument of love for each other, physically, spiritually and uniquely.

At that school, we would say, "Here, after you have given all you can give, you give love." The love those children gave me still fills my soul. The debt I owe them is priceless.

Empowering another Human Being Empowers oneself. Empowerment can be as unique as that person is. As we sit in shul, feeling sad and inadequate and needy, let us all vow to find a person whom we can empower. And as the V'ahavta says, let us do it, physically, spiritually but most definitely, uniquely. Because we are unique and they are also unique. The act of loving is an act of T'shuvah for G-d wants us to return to Him/Her and empower as he did Adam and Eve.

As they were charged with the guardianship of all of Earth's creatures, so may those who will be empowered through our love and adoration, know they have ownership of a portion of our souls

We had quite a few families re-register their kids for Religious School and a couple of the mothers joined Sisterhood for the first time. We had a few new Temple members who also joined Sisterhood. I thought we did quite well for the day. Even though we are a social group and enjoy getting together, our fundraising efforts seem to eventually go to the good of the Temple. 
We are selling our annual Honey Boxes from Rosh Hashanah through Yom Kippur. A form is on Page 10 of this issue of the Chai Times, where you can indicate how many boxes you would like to purchase and to whom, if any, you would like mailed for you. The Sisterhood has voted to keep the prices the same as last year; a box for \$13, and a box mailed to whomever you designate, for \$20. I mailed boxes to the military on behalf of the Sisterhood, so if you would like to make a donation to the Sisterhood by purchasing a military box, the Sisterhood would greatly appreciate your donation of just \$13 a box. Even though many of our military have been called back home, there are still many of our servicemen and women around the world serving our country. There are also many on bases around the country, as well as in the reserves. There was a call for more Honey Boxes than the Sisterhood was able to provide, so those donations for military boxes are critical in reaching out to Jews who don't have a support system. We want as many Jewish servicemen and women to know that we appreciate what they are doing and that are welcome here at Temple Beth Emet.

Our High Holiday services will again be at St. Jude's this year. The Sisterhood will have a table with apples and honey near the Reception Hall, after each service for you to partake in a sweet New Year. I am looking forward to seeing all of you and hearing our choir. Last New Year's, I started experiencing Teshuvah, the returning to my true self. I am still in the process of living the Jewish life that I have longed to live for some time. I want to thank you all for that.

Every year on the Sunday between the holidays, our local mortuaries sponsor a Kever Avot service to remember the dead, which is a wonderful concept. This gives my mother and me, as well as hundreds of others in the Southland, the opportunity to visit the graves of our loved ones on this day after the Service. The mortuary has not only helped us create another "Mother-Daughter Day," but it has reinforced our responsibility to tend to the graves of our dearly departed.

Tribute Cards


Tribute cards are always in order for happy or sad occasions. These cards are a wonderful way to remember or honor someone.

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
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
