During the days after the recent Presidential election I was watching TV and the protest marchers brought me back to the time of the Vietnam War when I joined others in protest. Sometimes it was peaceful and sometimes not, depending upon the police, the army and the protestors each shares some responsibility for both. But, I remember a photo from the Rutgers University newspaper that annoys me to this day. Rutgers University, for only the third time in its then 210 year history, including the Revolutionary War, had cancelled classes to discuss the War in Vietnam and its students' protests. The reason the photo still so annoys me is that it is of students boarding busses to leave town and go home. How childish, how selfish, how cowardly! Before you criticize me for demanding of others that they step into violence, let me tell you how I spent the majority of my protest day. I went door to door in Highland Park New Jersey, my assignment, and spoke to people about why we were protesting the War. I am proud of my activities, proud of my fellow students and proud of the difference we made in

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - December 2016

**“Who is rich? One who is content with his portion.”**

I have been participating in the Temple Beth Emet's book club, organized by Fran Bourne Johnson. The book club meets on the last Tuesday of the month to discuss books with a Jewish connection. Recently we read the second volume of the three-part series Rashi's Daughters, by Maggie Anton. We read and discussed the first volume two months ago and will conclude the series in January.



Rashi was a medieval French Rabbi, scholar, and Rosh yeshiva (headmaster) who lived in the 11th Century. He is well known for his commentaries on the Jewish Bible (the Tanakh) and the Talmud. “Rashi” is an acronym for his title and name, RAbbi SHlomo Itzhaki. He had three daughters, and although it was considered controversial, he taught his daughters Talmud. Each volume of Rashi's Daughters is the fictionalized story focusing on one of the daughters.

The epigraph to the second volume is from Mishnah Tractate Avot: “Ben Zoma said: Who is wise? One who learns from everyone. . . . Who is strong? One who conquers his yetzer [our human impulses]. . . . Who is rich? One who is content with his portion.”

Let us look at the answer to the last question -- are we content with our portion? Most of us, but not all of us, have all that we really need and much of what we want. Talmud tells us that we are rich if we are content. Yet we continue to acquire and we are constantly bombarded with messages telling us we need more, that we deserve more, and that what we have is not good enough. Too much stuff complicates our lives and obscures our vision of what is really important and what is really of value. But if we can stop and take stock of our lives and our stuff, we might find we really have everything we require to be content. When we do that, we can appreciate how rich we really are.

We need to be mindful of this concept of being content with our portion, especially around this time of year when we are bombarded with visions of beautiful shiny objects. This year, Hanukkah starts on Christmas Eve. The approach of Hanukkah is going to get caught up with the crazy materialistic feeding frenzy of the December holiday season. I'm not saying we shouldn't enjoy shopping for, giving, and receiving gifts, but if we can be content with our portion, the real gifts of the season will be the love and friendship we give each other.

May we always be open to learning from each other, may we have the discipline to control our impulses, and may we find contentment and satisfaction with our lives.

May the secular year 2017 C.E. be a good year for us, for our country, and for our world. Happy Hanukkah and Happy New Year!

### **Remember to Connect**

I do a great deal of walking, mostly on a local lakeside trail, alone or while pushing my grandchild's stroller. I have recently been struck by the number of parents who are also pushing strollers while engaged in lengthy conversations on their cell phones. This is so common that, several days ago, I observed a mother pushing a stroller and actually talking to her child; it made me want to run up and give her a hug! Why do so many parents seem to ignore their children and pass up the opportunity to interact with them, engage them in conversation, and teach them about their surroundings? Why do they choose cell phone contact over eye contact with their child?

All parents want to provide their child the best possible education. Most think of early childhood education as the function of preschool. Indeed, a school setting can impart social skills, but going for a walk with your child can be another kind of learning experience. You might just be trying to get exercise or fresh air, but your child is taking in the environment with all of her senses. She is seeing stimulating sights, which may include people, houses, digs, trees, weeds growing out of the sidewalk, ducks floating by, birds and planes overhead, lights, flowers in yards, sunshine, falling rain, or snow - just to name a few. Your child is hearing and smelling these things and much more. She needs someone with whom she can share these new sensations and who can give names to them. She needs someone to validate and appreciate her newly discovered world. She needs to learn joy and gratitude, emotions that will make her strong and stay with her for life.

It may be tempting to use the walk with your child to catch up on phone calls and take care of some business, but next time, try turning off your phone and focusing on your child. Point out the sights, sounds, and smells in your surroundings and, in a simple way, explain what they mean. Add the sense of touch by slowing down enough to allow him to touch a flower or leaf, or if he can walk, let him out of the stroller so he can discover those "touchables" by himself. You might be rewarded by a look of wonder, a puzzled stare, or a burst of exuberance as your child experiences the newness and complexity of her world. To a young child, the world is a magical and fascinating place; even its most mundane elements are exciting!

Paying attention certainly applies to your time in the car as well. Safety issues aside, there is a wealth of learning to be done in the car. Child safety seats place the young child high enough to see out of the window. Imagine what your child thinks when a tractor-trailer glides by the window carrying a load of new automobiles or a smelly garbage truck rattles by. There are traffic lights to see, fire trucks, ambulances, and police cars with blaring sirens and flashing lights, motorcycles roaring and bikes whizzing past. Time in the car is also a good time to sing songs together (**MY FAVORITE**) or turn some classical music on the radio of CD player and sing along. Consider this a bonus of time that you spend with your child.

What is the benefit of turning off your cell phone and focusing on your child? The result of positive, sharing, parent-child communication is the strengthening of the relationship. Your child will know that he comes first with you. This provides him with security and self-reliance. You are also performing the act of teaching. You are the focus of your child's mind and heart and his window to the world. As you introduce, describe and explain the world, you are enriching his life and enhancing the natural learning process. You are your child's first teacher. The memories you create with your child are worth far more than the phone calls you might miss!

*I thought this was an important article...actually, a very important article. I have personally watched children trying so hard to get their parent's attention...BUT, the parent was either checking messages or Facebook, or something else on their phone and was totally tuned out to their child. What must that child have thought? How unimportant they must have felt. Please, please, please, turn off your cell phone for part of your day/evening and spend this very precious time with you children. They will be grown up before you know it!*

Dear Members:

Our next meeting will be December 4th at 10:00 AM in Blum Hall. I would like all of you to attend our next meeting. I am sure that there are many of you out there that I haven't met. I look forward to making your acquaintance.



On November 6th, we, the Sisterhood had our Parking Lot Sale. A few of us met the night before at the Temple and organized all of our belongings, including pricing them. On the 6<sup>th</sup>, we got to the Temple very early and started setting up. Our first customers were people who had seen our advertisement on Craig's List (on the internet). We did fairly well until around 10:00 AM. At that point, there were less people walking down the street to attend our Parking Lot Sale. Unfortunately, we could not get any food trucks to commit to our Parking Lot Sale, which I truly believe would have enticed more customers to the parking lot to look through our merchandise and purchase items..

For the Parking Lot Sale, a few of us donated items that were quite expensive; such as fine china or crystal. I did not hear of any of that selling. Most of the items that seemed to sell best were adults' clothes and shoes, and everything we had for toddlers or small children. The week before our Sale, St. Jude's Church staff let us know that they had clothing donated to them (ostensibly for Family Promise) and they wanted to offer it to us to use for our Sale. Hannah Cline, Iris Abrams and I met there one morning and went through three rooms of clothing. The rooms were *full* of clothing that we were able to box up and take to the Temple. Fortunately, the men's fine clothing sold well. At 1:00 PM, we started packing up things that did not sell and, to those shoppers who were still there browsing, we gave away some of the better items. Once our items were packed, Marlene Dreyfuss, Eileen Martin and Naomi Aronoff packed their cars with unsold merchandise and took them to the National Council of Jewish Women-Los Angeles Thrift Shop in Van Nuys. It was a wonderful suggestion on Marlene's part to help another Jewish organization.

Evidently a rule of Family Promise is that their chosen families for each session must stay at a House of Worship with a *bona fide* person who has been certified from hierarchy of that particular religion. With no-one to replace Father Chuck, St. Jude's Church no longer qualifies with Family Promise. Therefore, Temple Beth Emet's agreement to feed the families staying at St. Jude's Church no longer applies. So, Family Promise will notify us regarding where the chosen families will be staying in Burbank, either at St. David's Church or Westminster Presbyterian Church. We will then be serving Family Promise by providing meals at either of those locations.

In closing, I would like to extend an invitation to another **Evening of Fun**. Many months ago, The Sisterhood had a Wine and Cheese Night, and with it a documentary that turned out to be quite popular. On **December 3rd**, the Temple is sponsoring an event like this one, in order to raise monies to renovate the bathrooms in the Temple. The documentary will be, "The History of the Jewish Delicatessen." It should be quite enlightening and fun just like the one the Sisterhood sponsored. I would like to invite all of you to join us at the Temple that night. Our Temple Membership Chairwoman, Barbara Bolter, has again created an **Evening of Fun**. I know she will do an exceptional job, as she always does. The Temple is opening its doors at 7:00 PM and we would appreciate the same \$10 donation. 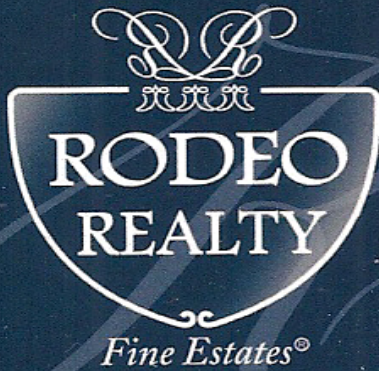
