

to the Tournament in which my team was involved. As I approached the team, two things happened, one of my team captains handed me a sympathy card signed by all the members of the team and their parents. Then one of my player's father came to me and said," I, too, know what it is like to lose a father. Please, if I can help you with your grief, just call on me."

Hanukkah is called the "**Holiday of Dedication**" taken from the Maccabees return to Jerusalem, cleaning the Great Temple and dedicating it to G-d. Theirs is a fine example of dedication to community and, of course, Judaism. To me, Hanukkah means personal dedication.

What is a "dedicated' present?" Is it a sweater with one's name on it? Perhaps? Or a set of monogrammed socks? Also perhaps.

But I know the greatest gifts I have ever given were not the gifts themselves, but the dedication I put into finding out what gift gives the particular person great joy.

And, truly, over the years some of the greatest gifts I have ever received were not the most expensive, the largest or the fanciest. They were the ones that people gave me, who put effort into finding out what would make me happy. The act of finding out what someone really likes is not easy, it takes listening to the person, remembering what they say and how they say it. (Enthusiasm verses Apathy.)

Someone once asked Rabbi Kramer how a person could handle the December Dilemma. He said, "If you are strong in your Judaism the other 11 months of the year, you will not have a December Dilemma." I feel the same way about giving. If, during the rest of the year, you dedicate yourself to listening, watching and remembering, and then give a person something that you know they will like, because you dedicated yourself to learning about their likes and dislikes, you won't have a dilemma in December.

Please do not forget, the greatest gift each of us has to offer others is ourselves. When we create something with our own loving actions, like a sympathy card from the team with personal feelings or the heartfelt caring of fellow victim of loss, it is priceless. So is; an unsolicited compliment during a bad day, a loving hug during a time of grief, a joke told specifically for and to the person to make them laugh during a time of stress, these are at the highest levels of gift giving.

On the next highest level is the creation of the hands; its value is "far beyond that of rubies."

On the next level is when we purchase something with the knowledge that this item will touch the soul of the person we love.

All three levels of dedication encompass the fruits of love, care and true giving.

Let us paraphrase Mattathias, "All who are for G-d and giving of themselves, follow me."

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - December 2017

How many times have we, when faced with something unpleasant, assumed the worst? It happened to me last month. It was my last day in Memphis for a family reunion. I had checked out of my hotel and had a few hours to spend before heading to the airport for the flight home. Thunderstorms had preempted any plans for outdoor exploration I had, so I decided to head over to the mall. The drive to the mall was through some pretty astounding rain, but it subsided as I arrived.



Shortly after I entered the mall, I came upon the food court and thought it might be a good idea to grab a quick lunch as my flight would include a stop, but no layover, in Dallas before heading to Phoenix, where it would be well past dinner time when I arrived. Instinctively I tapped the pocket where I kept my credit cards. They weren't there. Immediately, panic set in. I must have left them in the room when I checked out. Who knows where they could be now. I called the hotel and explained the situation and was transferred to "housekeeping lost and found." I encountered a voice mail system advising me leave my name and number and they would get back to me in 24 to 48 hours!

Thankfully, the weather had cleared as I rushed back to the hotel to speak with a real person. On the way I kept rolling over in my mind what replacing all those cards would entail, how I would pay to fill up the rental car and how unpleasant all this was going to be. How could this have happened? How did I become one of THOSE people who lost a wallet or credit cards or such?

The nice woman at the hotel went right away to check with housekeeping, noting the room had not been re-let yet. As I was waiting, I began going over and over in my mind how I could have left the cards in the room. I visualized them on the night stand with my wallet and keys, remembering getting dressed to leave.

Then I had a thought. Yesterday's pants! I had thrown on yesterday's pants to go down for breakfast before showering and dressing to leave! I rushed to the car, opened my suitcase, and there they were, safe in yesterday's pants! In my panic, I had forgotten how often I have left things in the pants I had worn the day before. My credit cards have even gone through the wash several times. I tell Diane it is my attempt to keep our credit clean, but she just rolls her eyes. I had jumped right to the worst-case scenario and in doing so spoiled a nice afternoon and the opportunity for lunch before a long flight. A side note to anyone traveling to Memphis – they are renovating and past security there is nowhere to eat.

Many of us are Jewish mothers and fathers and we have been conditioned to jump to the worst-case scenario when the kid's do not check in on time, or when we hear a siren, or when we call a loved one on the phone and there is no answer.

When we think the worst we act in the extreme. We jump to remedies and solutions that are often out of proportion to the problem. Or maybe we avoid finding a solution because we think the problem is overwhelming. Recently, I worried about the extent of a home repair item 11 months before spending 20 minutes to fix it.

We need to learn to stop, take a deep breath, and try to approach things calmly. Odds are the kids are just being forgetful, the firefighters are on their way to help, or our loved ones are just not near the phone. Things are usually not always as bad as we first imagine. If we have faith in our kids, our loved ones, ourselves, and our God, perhaps we will have the presence of mind not to think the worst, but to remember yesterday's pants.

Wishing each and every one of you a very Happy Hanukkah and a wonderful 2018.
















TEMPLE BETH EMET SISTERHOOD - FRAN BOURNE-JOHNSON

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
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
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
