Children's Hospital to donate. To complete the story we went on Shabbat afternoon, were the last ones to give blood and then visited with our young actor friend. Oh yes, *Pikuach Nefesh* takes precedent over *Everything*.

Now, if you can give blood, the rule is you may donate only every two months, please do so. Children's Hospital is a great place to go but there are many other locations, American Red Cross being the other place I have donated. I propose that we arrange to send a group of us every two months to donate blood. We could car pool at the Temple and then go to Children's Hospital. And while we are there we could arrange with the Chaplain's office to visit with some children. What do you say? Just let the office know and we can go!

Truly, the concept of saving a life is not limited to the physical person only! When we went to visit the patient for whom we donated the blood, we were also doing Pikuach Nefesh. The Soul and the Body work together. We can save lives by helping the Neshama to heal. We can save lives by visiting those in the hospital, at their home or even by just picking up the phone and calling them. Rabbi Harold Kushner talks about people looking for G-d and overlooking the Godliness of the person spending time sitting, sharing, laughing and even crying with you. The person we care about according to the Talmud, is a world unto themselves. Surely, there is a topic we can talk about and share with the person we love.

Remember, we are told to love uniquely, from our uniqueness to their uniqueness.

One thing, however, and it is difficult to do, please refrain from talking about the person's illness. The person knows they are sick, don't remind them. Instead talk about everyday life almost as if there was no disease to talk about.

I learned this from a Monsignor friend of mine. He sat with a terminally ill person for one hour and all they talked about was family, friends and the English drama, <u>Upstairs</u>, <u>Downstairs</u>. It was fascinating! Especially because they were both Irish! Ha,Ha!

ALSO, use as much humor as you can. The cliché is true, "Laughter is the best medicine for an injured soul". And, saving the Neshomah is as important as saving the body.

There is a beautiful prayer that translates as, "G-d, the Neshama, (soul) you have given me, it is pure!"

As we do Pikuach Nefesh with those we care about, we are helping to make their souls and their bodies pure!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - July 2018

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights,"

Do we really believe that we are all created equal and that we are all endowed by God with certain unalienable rights? Assuming we do, are we being faithful to that belief? In recent weeks, we have seen children separated from their parents at our border. As of this writing, some 2,000 children have been removed from their mothers and fathers and placed in haphazard detention centers. The children and their parents have done nothing wrong other than seek a better life in a country that is a beacon of freedom and opportunity. Many of these families are entering the United States in violation of immigration law, but some are legitimately seeking asylum. None are afforded any sort of hearing or due process before the families are divided.

It is difficult to imagine the trauma and anguish experienced by these children of all ages as they are ripped away from their parents and placed in a strange facility in a strange land by strangers. It is also difficult to imagine the trauma and anguish experienced by parents, who have their children taken away from them to go who knows where for who knows how long, with no certainty they will even be reunited. The Attorney General of the United States justifies this policy with reference to the (Christian) Bible. "I would cite you to the Apostle Paul and his clear and wise command in Romans 13 to obey the laws of the government because God has ordained them for the purpose of order." But as Shakespeare wrote, "The devil can cite Scripture for his purpose. An evil soul producing holy witness is like a villain with a smiling cheek, a goodly apple rotten at the heart."

The Bible, however, also admonishes us in Exodus 23:9, "You shall not oppress a stranger, since you yourselves know the feelings of a stranger, for you also were strangers in the land of Egypt." Again, in Leviticus 19:33-34, "When a stranger resides with you in your land, you shall not do him wrong. The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt; I am the Lord your God." Over and over again, in Torah and later writings, we are admonished not only to refrain from harming the stranger, but to embrace them. There are those who will say, "But they are breaking the law!" I would remind them that the immigration laws of the United States are circumstantial, and are often based on ignorance and bigotry. Witness the Chinese Exclusion laws of 1882. Remember the quotas during World War II that shut the door to Jews seeking to escape the Holocaust. Understand the words of Emma Lazerus, "Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!"

A Jewish immigrant from Russia, Irving Berlin, wrote the song "God Bless America." The song is much loved and the words "God Bless America" have become a traditional and expected part of any closing to a speech by any politician. As we celebrate Independence Day, may we be reminded that if we expect God to continue to bless America, America must be worthy of that blessing in our actions and attitudes. And taking children away from parents and parents away from

children, all in the name of the law, does not demonstrate that.



No American city was more important to the Nazis than Los Angeles, home to Hollywood, the greatest propaganda machine in the world. The Nazis plotted to kill the city's Jews and to sabotage the nation's military installations: plans existed for hanging twenty prominent Hollywood figures such as Al Jolson, Charlie Chaplin, and Samuel Goldwyn; for driving through Boyle Heights and machine-gunning as many Jews as possible; and for blowing up defense installations and seizing munitions from National Guard armories along the Pacific Coast.

U.S. law enforcement agencies were not paying close attention--preferring to monitor Reds rather than Nazis--and only Leon Lewis and his daring ring of spies stood in the way. From 1933 until the end of World War II, attorney Leon Lewis, the man Nazis would come to call "the most dangerous Jew in Los Angeles," ran a spy operation comprised of military veterans and their wives who infiltrated every Nazi and fascist group in Los Angeles. Often rising to leadership positions, this daring ring of spies uncovered and foiled the Nazi's disturbing plans for death and destruction.

Featuring a large cast of Nazis, undercover agents, and colorful supporting players, <u>Hitler in Los Angeles</u>, by acclaimed historian Steven J. Ross, tells the story of Lewis's daring spy network in a time when hate groups had moved from the margins to the mainstream.


