The month of November holds two holidays that are among my favorites, one is Veteran's Day and the other is Thanksgiving Day. This year the Adult Education Series, "Jews in America: Successes. Failures and Controversies" begins on November 13 at 7 PM. We will be looking at the Historical background of both of these holidays.

Most people don't realize that the Puritans saw themselves as the modern day children of Israel and America was the Promised Land to them. Many of their customs were taken from our Tanak and they encouraged Biblical Studies. They were not the only ones who saw America's promise and strove to link it with the Hebrew Scriptures. The oldest universities in America, of which Harvard is the second, William and Mary is the first, were Theological Seminaries which became universities. Harvard in fact has Hebrew Letters on its crest attesting to the value of Hebraicism to the university's education of students. Further, my

alma mater, Rutgers University's newspaper is called the Targum, Hebrew for translation or elucidation.

Therefore, it is not a large leap of faith to see Thanksgiving as the Puritans saw it, as an American Sukkoth, America was a Sukkat Shalom to them, so they did what we are commanded to do at Sukkoth, invite guests to the Sukkah for a meal. The Puritans may have been celebrating Sukkot on an even higher level as some scholars believe the Native Americans are descendants of the 10 lost tribes. But you will have to come to class on the 13th to hear more about that.

Veterans Day is another holiday meaningful to our people. From the days of the Dutch in New Amsterdam when Asser Levy and Joseph Barsimon sought the right to stand guard duty over the citizens there, Jewish men and later women have served in all the conflicts of America, including the Alamo and the 'Bloody Kansas' Border Wars. True to the Jewish concept of Rachmanut (mercy), one Jewish Commodore sought and succeeded in ending the custom of flogging sailors for crimes on board Naval Vessels. The highest medal awarded, the Congressional Medal of Honor has been awarded to more than 27 Jewish Men and women. The first Jewish serviceman to receive it was Benjamin B. Levy of the 1st New York Volunteer infantry for his service at the Battle of Glendale on June 30 1862. The citation for his medal read: *"This soldier, a drummer boy, took the gun of a sick comrade, went into the fight, and when the color bearers were shot down, carried the colors and saved them from capture"*. He was only seventeen years old when he received this medal.

Perhaps, though, the most famous American Jewish veteran, Col. David Marcus, died in the noblest of causes, helping Establish the State of Israel. He is buried at West Point, the military Academy, who, incidentally, had a Jewish officer in its first graduating class in 1802. In acknowledgement of his patriotism to the United States and Israel, his tombstone reads, simply, "A soldier for All Humanity".

So, as we celebrate these two holidays, let us remember to be Thankful to this country for allowing us to serve it and for its being an American Sukkat Shalom, a second land of great promise for our people.

Oh, one more thing, please reach out this month and 'embrace' a veteran, by phone, by internet or by self, whichever feels best for both of you.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - November 2018

Spring forward, fall back.



On the first Sunday of this month, we will join with most of the country in the ritual of changing our clocks and watches back one hour as Daylight Savings Time ends. Next March, we will do just the opposite as Daylight Savings Time begins again. Some of our devices do us the favor of changing their clocks automatically, but at least for me, there are plenty of clocks to change, and I have to remember how to change the time on the microwave, the coffee maker, and each of the cars.

Astrological and agricultural reasons aside, it does seem apt that we "spring forward" in the Spring season. Spring is seen as a time of renewal, of new life, and new beginnings. For us, Spring brings Passover, the ultimate "new beginning" for our people.

Autumn is different. Darkness comes earlier in the day even before we change the clocks. As the days become cooler, we can lose that driving fire within us.

It is a time that we might fall back into old habits. The High Holidays are fading in the rear view mirror of time and the promises we made to ourselves and to God become remote. It is several months until the secular New Year, where resolutions are traditional.

We need to resist this natural tendency to fall back into our old ways, be it in our personal relationships, ourselves, and our spirituality (including our involvement in the Temple Beth Emet community). We need to keep our resolve to improve ourselves and our lives.

There is no reason to wait until Hanukkah next month to rededicate ourselves. We can start each day by rededicating ourselves to continue springing forward in life. We can embrace the earlier dusk of autumn as a change to reflect on where we are on the journey of our lives, where we have been and where we are going. This time of year may not have the external energy of Spring, but it can have the internal energy that will light our souls.

Let us resolve that it is only our timepieces that are falling back, not ourselves.

Two days after we change our clocks, we can do our part to change our things in our cities, state, and country. Tuesday, November 6 is election day, and even if many of the races for many of the elected offices seem not to be competitive, there are local and state ballot measures, including one proposition dealing with daylight savings time, that will impact all of us. I urge everyone to study the races and measures on the ballot and to VOTE.

Finally, the end of the month brings Thanksgiving and each of us have things to be thankful for. I am thankful for my family, of course, as well as renewed health after the scare I had earlier this year. I am thankful for our Temple and everyone involved in it -- Rabbi Mark, Victoria, our officers and directors, our Preschool Administrator Elaine Rosenfield, our teachers in our preschool and religious school, everyone who volunteers at our Temple With a Heart, everyone who participates, everyone who supports us financially, and everyone who is part of our Temple community in any manner. Thank you for being part of the Temple Beth Emet Family and a very Happy Thanksgiving to each and every one of you.

***Synopsis:**

The Color of Water: A Black Man's Tribute to His White Mother is a 1995 work of nonfiction that is part autobiography, part memoir, and part biography as James McBride, the child of an interracial marriage, writes of his growing up in the civil rights era and of the story of his mother, a Polish Jew, who in 1942 married a black man. The chapters alternately tell of James's early life and of the experiences of his mother, Rachel, who changed her name to Ruth to sound more American. James's biological father was Andrew Dennis McBride, an African-American who succumbed to cancer before James was born in 1957. Ruth and Dennis had eight children, and she later had four more with her second husband, Hunter Jordan, the only father James knew. The title of the book stems from an event early in James's life in which he proved in a science contest that water is colorless. A more poetic explanation of the title comes from Ruth's response to James when, as a boy, he asks her if God is black or white. Her response is, "God is the color of water. Water doesn't have a color." Juxtaposed in the narrative are the experiences of James growing up biracial and Ruth's trials as a white, Jewish woman married to a black man. At the heart of his story is James's realization that his self-awareness needs to be born out of an understanding of his mother's path in life.

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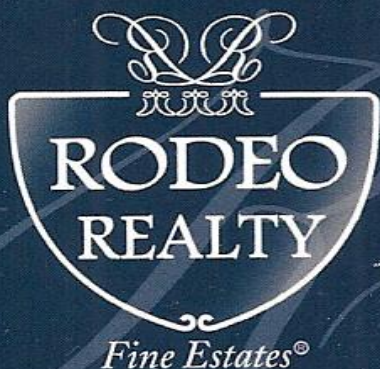
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
