A few months ago, I performed two funerals a week apart.

Both people lived in different cities, had different life styles and did not know each other, yet, they shared one important fact. They both died suddenly. In one case the spouse had seen and spoken to her partner a minute before, and, in the other case, the daughter had spoken to her father an hour before. Both deceased had been in fine health. The sudden shock was overwhelming. Recently, a third death occurred also within a short period of time. These events left me thinking.

Which is better, to watch someone you love slowly leaving you and have plenty of time to say good-bye or to lose someone very dear before sitting with them and expressing your love ?

My mother suffered with cancer for two years before she finally succumbed. I remember sitting with her six weeks before her death and having a heart to heart with her. We both got to talk and cry and talk. These three families did not have the same opportunity. There is a large void for

people who do not get to say good-bye! So, please let me try, and I do mean try, to fill the void.

Find a photo of the departed, place it in a quiet spot and when the need arises, speak to the photo as if the person was there as well. It even helped me relieve my stress after my mother died and even though I had said my good byes. Don't be afraid to be honest with your feelings. You will not hurt theirs! They are in a state of Godliness and cannot feel physical pain. You are speaking to their souls.

Only the body has left us and the soul remains with us for a time. From the time my father passed away until we won the Soccer Championship, he was an old Soccer player himself, I could feel his presence with me.

And if clearing the air with the soul of the departed is not enough to give you closure, dedicate an activity to the loved one who has left you.

Once again my father comes to mind. As I was walking off the field after we had won the championship, I told the reporter of the LA Times how proud my father would have been of my players. I told him he had only passed away a few weeks previously. Even though I had not openly expressed it, the reporter said that I had dedicated the game to my father. I guess I had without realizing it.

All of us have unique gifts we can give to one another, making use of that gift to honor a loved one is the highest form of 'mourning' in Judaism. Judaism's concept of mourning revolves around the word 'litzkor' (remember). The same root brings us the Yizkor service,

So create a project that you think your beloved would have liked you to do. Create with your head, your hands, your heart or your Herculean efforts something to share spiritually with your departed significant other. It does not have to be spectacular or even public, just something you want to do to honor your beloved to show how much you love them. And, of course, while you are creating with your project you will be thinking of the person and how much they meant to you. Saying aloud, I am proud to create and honor the person who created the me I am today... Then, if physically possible, place a photo of the beloved near the project and at least once tell the photo (representing the soul) how proud you are to do this in their honor.

I hope for you this will help you through the mourning process as it did me!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - February 2019

Valentine's Day is, of course, February 14. Valentine's Day is not a Jewish holiday, but what is wrong with celebrating love? Jews believe in love as much as anyone else. We can therefore just drop the "Saint" from the day and we have a perfectly acceptable excuse to lavish someone with affection, admiration, and of course, candy. Chocolate candy in particular. See's candy specifically.



Early on in our marriage we established a tradition on Valentine's Day that included my procuring and presenting See's candy to Diane. Of course, we kept the fancy heart the candy came in. This tradition continues to this day, and every year pull out the heart and head on down to the local store to refill it. Generations of See's employees have remarked on the quality of the old heart boxes and bemoan the fact that the new hearts pale by comparison. One year, many, many years ago, I had the bright idea of just purchasing a one-pound assortment and filling the heart myself. I would save considerable time and stress (Too many choices! Chocolate chip truffle or another Bordeaux? How many Scotchmllows are too many?) and I would still get my sample.

It was not a good idea. While Diane accepted the gift graciously, even that early in our marriage I could tell she was disappointed that I had not made the effort to make the collection special. I never made that mistake again.

Lesson learned - when something or someone is special to you, you do not take shortcuts. You do not do "good enough". You make the extra effort to show you care and that the thing or person is important to you. Whether it be the relationship with a person, a task at work, a garden, a home, or a synagogue, a little extra care and effort bring a much better result.

When I get the opportunity to talk with our religious school parents, I like to remind them that if they want Judaism to be important to their children, they have to show that Judaism is important to them. That means making the extra effort to learn more about their own Judaism and incorporate more Jewish observance in the family's life.

If Temple Beth Emet is special to you -- and you would not be reading this if it were not -- it means doing a little extra to make the Temple better. Maybe it is adding a little to your membership dues, or coming to an extra Shabbat service or event at Temple, or bringing someone with you to Temple to introduce them to our Temple With a Heart.

We can elevate so many of our daily experiences if we just put a little extra effort. If we do, we not only make something or someone special, we make ourselves special as well. And as a reward, we can go to a See's Candies store and get a sample.

Hello Temple Family,

We've started a fun-filled new year at Religious School. We celebrated Tu B'Shvat with fruits from Israel: the students enjoyed grapes, figs, pomegranate seeds, olives and dates. Children also sampled three types of fruits: those with edible exteriors and inedible pits, those with outer shells and edible interiors, and those that are entirely edible. According to Kabbalah, fruits with inedible shells represent the world of action: in his Tu B'Shvat Sedar, Rabbi Yonah Bookstein suggests imagining peeling away the effects of evil in our lives when we toss away the hard, outer shells of these fruits. Edible fruits with inedible pits represent the world of formation: Rabbi Yael Levy says these fruits affirm for us that our hearts, like those inner pits, are strong. Finally, fruits that are wholly edible represent the world of creation. These remind us of the wholeness of the world, according to "a Tu B'Shevat Seder" (www.milwaukeejewish.org). Parents brought a bounty of fruit of all kinds for the kids and teachers to enjoy.



Regarding our own Tu B'Shvat bounty, Rabbi Sobel exclaimed: "On behalf of our teachers, our students and myself, THANK YOU SO MUCH! [It] was so much more than we expected!"

Parents, you really came through once again and we thank you!

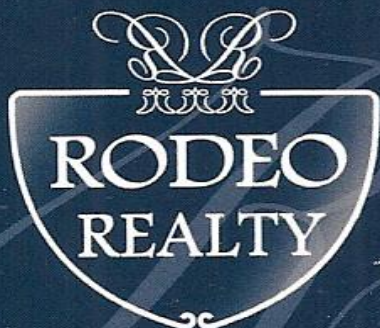
