The above quote is usually taken to refer to G-d in Mordechai's frustration with Queen Esther's fears to help our people. She is more worried about how Ahasuerus will react if she goes to him unannounced. She also thought she would be free from death because she was the queen of Shushan (Persia). Both the positive and the negative feelings of Mordechai and Esther serve us here at Temple because we so strongly believe in the team spirit.


The past few days have been cold and rainy and, because I drive a lot from home to Temple, rather dangerous. Californians don't drive well in rain!



He had strong hopes she would come to her senses and speak to the King. She did help, showing great courage.

We need to help also. There are many things at Temple that need our doing. Money isn't enough, besides the joy you get when you are part of a team is greater than just giving cash. Don't mis-understand cash helps to do the things we can't. You don't want me fooling around with the air conditioner. But I believe people have talents they don't advertise. I have a friend who is a member of the Recording Academy, He also, for a while, was my barber. He is also a licensed plumber. Who knew? I believe that people have hidden talents that are waiting to be discovered. People also have potential to develop talents in areas they never thought of. I knew a person who became an art restorer. He learned many ways to bring paintings, sculptures and other works of art to life. What killed it for him was that his boss didn't pay him. To this day he still has a love for Art restoration!

I was reminded recently about a situation years ago at Services. In the days when I was Rabbi Kramer's assistant, we would do the Kiddush in the Sanctuary. A child was seated in the back who was shy and did not want to come up front to get some grape juice. The challah was done in Blum Hall. Rabbi said to me," Go bring the grape juice to the little boy". I looked at him with the look of, "Why? I am the Assistant Rabbi!" Rabbi said, "We will talk, later!" And talk we did! He reminded me that no job was too small to do if it benefitted the Temple. And, of course, no one is more beneficial to the Temple than a child.

Helping the Temple really means helping others. The more restored the Temple is the more people's confidence in the Temple is restored. When you do for Temple you do for others. Also, I know when you do for others you gain royal feelings, because you have taken your G-d given attributes and altered someone's life.

But it is hard to get people to do the little things that are necessary to make the Big Thing (the Temple) to run. Don't feel singled out! The Rabbis in Pirke Avot said it too. "Be as careful with a minor mitzvah as with a major one, for you cannot know the rewards of the mitzvoth." (2:1) We need help! We want to improve the Temple and there are jobs that need to be done that are mundane, and thankless, but necessary. Let's do them together.

I am not going to guilt you like Mordechai. I know you will show courage and we will repair the Temple. Let us work together to save our Temple and hence the small part of our people known as Temple Beth Emet. As Esther and Mordechai showed courage to rescue our people in ancient Shushan, let us do the same in modern Burbank.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - March 2019

The previous editor of the Chai Times, Barbara Lux, often had to push me to get my column in. She would send me an email asking if I was going to get her something or should she just re-run a previous column. That was enough to break my writer's block. I think I've only re-run a column once, and that was because it was particularly relevant.



I'm going to run the better part of my March 2014 column, but with a new ending:

Daylight Savings Time begins this year on March 10, (date corrected) when we advance our clocks one hour. Many of us bemoan the fact that we are "losing" an hour of sleep that day, but I think we should instead look at what we gain during Daylight Savings Time.

We gain an extra hour of sunlight at the end of our workday. For those of us who work regular hours, that means it won't be dark when it is time to head home. When we get home, there is still daylight to enjoy some extra time outdoors with the children, in the garden (hint: it's time to plant tomatoes), or maybe a stroll in the neighborhood.

With March comes spring, and with spring comes renewal and deliverance from the darkness of winter. We celebrate this deliverance first this month with Purim, being the deliverance of a community, and next month with Passover, being the deliverance of our people. In both stories, our people were not merely the beneficiaries of the efforts of others. In Purim, after Esther and Mordecai foil the plans of Haman, the Jews of Persia had to stand up and fight their enemies, as the earlier royal decree allowing for the destruction of the Jews could not be countermanded, an additional decree was issued allowing the Jews to defend themselves. In Passover, the Israelites had to stand up, pack up, and leave everything familiar to them and march out into the desert. In neither case was success assured until the people took action.

Here at Temple Beth Emet our survival as a community also depends on the actions of all of our people, not just Rabbi Mark or the Temple lay leadership. Just as the Jews of Persia had to answer the call of Esther and Mordecai, just as the Israelites had to answer the call of God and His prophet Moses, the people of the Temple Beth Emet family need to answer the call to support the Temple with their "wisdom, wampum, or work."

So here is the new ending:

Most of us remember George Davis and know how important Temple Beth Emet was to him. We know George was a talented woodworker, and worked his magic to turn an old drafting table into a beautiful and unique Torah reading table. Not content with that, he also crafted the Cantor's podium and a Torah stand. The Davis family has continued giving to the Temple in many ways. The family made a gift of matching funds during the High Holiday appeal, and George's son Phil has become involved in Temple life, including taking on some much needed repairs.

Last month, he tackled a folding divider in Blum Hall that was falling apart. Since it was beyond repair, it was decided that one of the other dividers that we never use would be swapped with the damaged divider. These things are <u>very</u> heavy, so a crew of volunteers was assembled and together the job was done. The next task to be conquered is to repair the lights in Blum Hall.

The Family: Three Journeys into the Heart of the Twentieth Century, by

David Laskin

Every writer, established or aspiring, has at one time or another looked around and decided, "My life would make a great book." Some of them are sadly mistaken. But journalist David Laskin's life--or rather that of his forbears, three generations of a Russian Jewish family originally named HaKoen--has made a fantastic book. Despite its name, The Family is not about the Mafia, or the Mansons, but really about one particular, ordinary/extraordinary twentieth century shtetl clan. But you don't have to be Jewish to be fascinated by the six children of a Torah scribe on the western fringe of the Russian empire; they, like people everywhere, were buffeted by political and social and economic upheavals of their times. One branch of the family ended up in America as the prosperous founders of Maidenform lingerie; another repatriated to Israel; the third suffered the Holocaust. While I tended to favor the stories about the American branch (how can you not love a 4' 11" Russian revolutionary, who, with her husband Wolf, invented the brassiere in 1924 and got filthy rich in ladies underwear in the depression?), the other HaKoens-turned-Cohens provided plenty of educational entertainment as well. You think you know about the Russian revolution? Try seeing it through Laskin's ancestors' eyes. Likewise, WWII and Zionism. This is a great, big-hearted book about how time and place modifies family, whatever or wherever its roots

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
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
