anyone will die. How long will we hold our grudges?

If the person has passed away, our words of love may be too late to help either ourselves or our family member. Yes prayer is the answer, but, frankly, it's not the same as face to face voiced feelings!

Also, the victims of our anger are often not the person we are angry with but collateral damage. The family members who we love and who loved us before these incidents' occurred are only being loving people. We look to them to take sides with us over the hurt. How can we expect people who we love for being loving to suddenly unlove someone because of us?

How long will silent rage overtake our voices? How long will we punish them as well as the person who hurt our feelings? How long will absence be the norm and not the abnormal as it should be?

How long do hurts of the past need to enslave us. This month we celebrate Independence Day from Great Britain 243 years ago.

Freedom is not an external act of commemoration of a well written document. It is an eternal constant series of actions that provide a future for healthy living. Let us Free ourselves from the Great enslavement of 'hating another in our Heart'.

I have witnessed the first steps toward reconciliation. I have heard the words and have physically felt the relief those family members felt at being able to start the process of reloving. I, too, have felt it personally with my own family! You cannot imagine the freedom of being Independent of hatred and anger. It is not easy, so if you need a reason to remove the hatred from your heart do it in hour of this month and say" Just like the Founding Fathers, I want to Declare my Independence from the slavery of hatred".

I started using Facebook about the time our son and his generation determined that Facebook was “over” and pretty had much moved on to other social media platforms. I do not know what they are using these days, and I do not want to chase the “latest thing.”

Over the years I have joined groups that focus on things that interest me -- local interest, automobiles, cooking, and politics for example. I have also connected with cousins across the country. I have kept my “friends” count fairly small so please do not feel slighted if I fail to accept a friend request.

One of the things Facebook has allowed me to do is to reconnect with old friends I have lost touch with, especially from my college days. It is nice to see what they are up to and how their lives have unfolded. One day I got a request from Ed (names have been changed out of respect for privacy). “I don’t know if you remember me, I was only in your dorm for a quarter and then withdrew to deal with some issues” he stated. I did not remember him at all. I reached out to a couple of friends from college that similarly did not recall him, so I ignored the request. Then I got a message from Dawn, “Ed really wants to be Facebook friends with you,” she said. Since she was always one of those earnest people that saw the good in people, I went ahead and accepted Ed’s request. It turns out he has made a good life for himself in Northern California. Good job, long marriage, a couple of kids that turned out well, he was even involved in scouting and active in his church! So we share family experiences, trade health woes, and root for opposing sports teams. I have a better and more extensive relationship with him now than I ever did in college!

Years before Facebook I had already reconnected with Brian, who also lived in the dorm, and Diane and I go down to his home for Passover with his wife and kids every year. Another friend I reconnected with is Carol, who was Dawn’s roommate my freshman year and we all lived on the same floor. Diane was in our dorm for part of the year too, so we all know each other and often hung out together. Carol has battled cancer for many years, but still enjoyed rigorous outdoor activity.

The other day Brian called me. Carol had received some bad news and she is not expected to live much longer. Brian asked if I was interested in driving up to the Bay Area to see her. I hesitated. We had just gotten back from a week in Saint Louis where Diane

had a conference, and as I wrote last month, we had been in Durham, North Carolina a few weeks before. I was tired, dealing with things that had piled up while we were gone, and the prospect of a six hour drive each way sounded daunting. I called Brian and left a message that I just could not make it. Then, a few minutes later, I saw his email to me on an old email account I don't check often. "She says 'make sure Ira comes'" it said. I called him back and told him if she wants me to come, I need to do so. By then Brian had bought airline tickets, so I followed suit. Pricier but less challenging than the long drive.

Why had I hesitated to accept Ed's friend request? Why did I hesitate to say yes immediately to the road trip with Brian? I have to admit, it was just easier to say no, and I'm not proud of that. It was Facebook that had open the opportunity to reconnect with these two people, and in Carol's case, she had been part of my "dorm family." I had turned the question about the visit to Carol over in my mind for days. I felt bad initially deciding not to go. I feel much better about going, and I know that in the future, after the inevitable happens, I will be glad to have visited my friend of so long ago instead of regretting tossing away that opportunity.

Facebook truly can be a blessing or a curse. It can open your world to old and new friends, but it can also expose you to the pain of sadness and tragedy that is so often part of friendship.

Life can be a blessing or a curse too. It is important to appreciate and accept both aspects and to use the experiences to become a more complete, and hopefully better person.

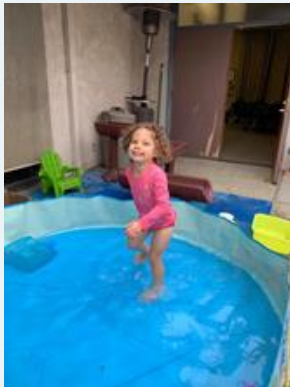


Our TBE Summer camp is off to a great start! Although the weather has not been exceptionally warm, our little ones are still enjoying a wet and wild good time!
