

## "Thou Shalt Not Separate Thyself from the Community" Pirke Avot 1:5

On August 11th we will celebrate Tisha B' Av. It should be on the 10<sup>th</sup> but we don't fast on Shabbat, except for when Yom Kippur falls on Shabbat. Tisha B'Av commemorates, historically, the destruction of the First and Second Temples, and the final phase of the Spanish Inquisition, as well as the completed destruction of the Warsaw Ghetto, folklorically.

When I review the events of these four episodes in Jewish History, I know they have much to teach us both as a congregation as well as a part of the American Jewish nation. The book of Lamentations is read on Tisha B'Av. Chapter one cries out, "How alone she (Jerusalem) sits! The city once great with people! Like a widow she has become, once great among the nations! A princess among provinces has become a slave!" Lamentations tells that the reason Judah and, of course, Jerusalem fell was due to our sinning and denying G-d. The Second Temple fell because, as the Talmud states



we denied each other simple dignity and honor. This denial is called "Sinat Henom" (baseless hatred).

The Spanish Inquisition's final act came long after the Jews of Spain began leaving Judaism for Catholicism because they believed that socially to be Catholic in Spain would grant them social mobility. They did try to compromise by secretly remaining Jews while still outwardly acting as good Catholics. In the end those efforts failed and the 'Conversos' were either exiled or murdered.

The Warsaw Ghetto Uprising was not as successful as it could have been because the various Jewish Organizations did not agree on a unified plan. Even the different zealot groups who believed in fighting the Nazis would not coordinate their plans.

The Jewish Community in America is split on how to deal with the immigration issue. Let me talk about the Nazi era and our people for a moment. The Holocaust for our People in Germany did not begin with the Ghettos or the Camps. It began with Isolation and Alienation. The Jews who had come to Germany from other countries and lived there starting careers and families, were deported when the Government of Adolf Hitler, may his name be forever cursed, sought to make Germany 'Great again' or should I say Aryan white again.

The Inquisition was the terrible final end for the Jews, who like the Passover Haggadic son, sought to separate from their own people, our people. "What is all this to you and not to me", the son says. The Conversos said," What good is being openly Jewish? Better for me not to identify with my people!

The Baseless Hatred of one Jew for the next is seen today in the Jewish Community as well as our Temple. The detrimental effect of the attacks upon active, committed volunteers destroys the community and gives aid to our enemies. People who give of their time and energy with no apparent remuneration deserve to be lauded not lambasted.

The first Temple's destruction is spoken of in terms of a lack of adherence to G-d's Commandments. In this day and age, it is not politically correct to speak of closeness to G-d and Temple. The greatest of all Commandments and the first in Torah after the 'Shma' is to Love. How sad and dangerous, that to love has become obsolete! Instead Love has been replaced by indifference. The world has become indifferent to those who need! How soon after the indifference will come assaults on Synagogues and Temples, the sources of divine guidance. This will surely lead to community destruction. The last several scandals have involved Jewish people. How long before the entire community is in jeopardy of being harmed? Our Temple is our Community's shelter during the oncoming storm which, most definitely, is coming. We need to support this institution! Make great use of our creative talents to form that Sukkot Shalom that Tabernacle of Peace over all of us!

If Tisha B'av has taught us anything it is this: We need to pray Together, work Together, identify as Jews Together and Fight together for, if we do not, we all will be destroyed Together.

## "Come now, and let us reason together . . . . " Isaiah 1:18

As I write this column, there have been in the course of a week three mass shootings in the United States; in Gilroy, California, El Paso, Texas, and Dayton, Ohio. At least one of these shootings appears to be racially motivated. All three were committed by young men carrying what is termed in the media as "assault-type" firearms. All three are being characterized as acts of domestic terrorism.



In the past three years I've written five different columns dealing with mass shootings.

These types of events have become so common in our country that it seems we are no longer surprised by them. We can be thankful at least that we still are stunned when they happen and feel the loss of the victims. We have not become so hard as a people as to accept these horrific acts as normal.

What we do not seem to have learned to respond with meaningful action. While some call for more firearms regulation, some call for efforts to combat racial hate or hate of immigrants, some call for more efforts to combat mental illness, or anti-Semitism, or even video game violence. Some place the blame at the feet of the President and some blame the decline of the moral and religious values of the American people.

Obviously there is no single cause of this type of violence and people do seem to recognize that. It means there can be no single way to deal with the violence. So what are we to do? I don't presume to know the answer, so I'll just say we need to do everything. We need to talk about how we rein in the proliferation of firearms in our country while preserving the protections of the Second Amendment. We need to talk about hate and how it can be overcome. We need to talk about mental health, and ethics, and the glorification of violence in our entertainment, and how politicians use charged rhetoric.

And we really, really need to sit down and talk about how we talk about things.

We used to be able to hold differing viewpoints and still get along. We used to be able to have a neighborhood cookout with differing opinions and still relax, find common interests, and enjoy being part of a community. At the same gathering today you would be more likely to be speared with a flaming shish kabob. There have always been differences among us, but there were also people willing to reach across the divide. Today the divide has become so wide you have to wonder if we all still live in the same country.

In his web article, *Five Modest Suggestions to Improve Civil Discourse,* (<a href="https://thebluereview.org/five-modest-suggestions-to-improve-civil-discourse/">https://thebluereview.org/five-modest-suggestions-to-improve-civil-discourse/</a>) David Gray Adler, President of the public policy group Alturas Institute, suggests five ways to improve public discourse:

- Stop Political Labeling
- Listen
- Citizens Must Be Fair to One Another
- Avoid the Politics of Destruction

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Avoid Ideological Rigidity

As the 2020 elections draw closer, all of us can use these suggestions to evaluate the issues being discussed and the people discussing them. We can also use these suggestions to examine our own positions. If we cannot analytically defend those positions to ourselves how can we persuade others?

Americans have a lot to talk about between now and November 2020, but to have these conversations, we have to be able to talk with each other. We need to resolve to reason together.



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
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
