course! The last time I was there, I met a young woman who was evaluating my clothes for resale. She was telling me about her experiences at Burroughs's High School. I began to laugh and told her that our congregation is just down the street. I gave her my card and asked her to join us on any Friday night she could. Sher said she wasn't into prayer so much as community. I told her I understood and to come and see how our community looks at our religion. She said she just might and took my card and placed it in her pocket.

Looking back at those two experience I realized just how important the next generation is to us!

They bring us freshness of thought and even though we may disagree with their points, it is critical to keep the discussion going. If you see Judaism as a tree of life, differences of opinions and the resulting discussions are nourishment to our 'Tree of Life'. Without them the tree withers and dies.

We are living in an age where more and more people are saying words to the effect, my way or the Highway. I find this attitude at best limiting to the discussions and at worse arrogant and insulting. The largest group of victims of this narrowness are the young people, the Millennials, and the Generation Xers. How can you say that their opinion has no value?

They are our future as a nation, America, and as a people, Jews. We need to have them join us in the discussion of our services, our Temple and our community. Then we have to do something more important. We must open the door and invite other young people in, to listen to what they say and, if need be, change our attitude! No longer is it okay to say "this is the way my father did it, so I will do it". We need to change the mantra to "this is the way our children do it, so we will do it".

Then go out and hear what they say, listen to their meanings, act in community with them. These two women, one who came to us and one I offered the opportunity to join us as well, and others like them, represent growth in our congregation and the greater Jewish Community of Burbank.

Bring the young ones to us. The fabric of Judaism needs to be repaired by those who are beginning to find their way into the threads of the great tapestry that is our heritage.

And by bringing them to us, you will enable the fabric of the cloth that is the Jewish Tapestry to be more durable, more colorful, more comforting as it gives warmth to the generations.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - September 2019

The new religious school term starts this month. Every year we try to get the religious school parents together the first day to share with them more about the Temple community and urge them to be more involved. I always tell them "if you want Judaism to be important to your children, you have to show that Judaism is important to you." When our children see us incorporating Temple activities into our lives, they see Judaism in action. It becomes something familiar and comfortable for them and being part of the Jewish community becomes part of their being.



What better way to model a commitment to Judaism than for an adult to decide to study for bar or bat mitzvah. There are many reasons an adult might not have been bar or bat mitzvah when younger. They may have grown up with a family dynamic that did not allow or encourage b'nei mitzvah or they may have come to Judaism at a later age. In any event, while a teen studying for b'nei mitzvah has a tough enough challenge, for an adult the challenge is often even greater. Our Temple family can take pride, therefore, in the accomplishment of the latest Adult B'nei Mitzvah cohort. Two members of the cohort have already been called to the Torah and the remaining member will celebrate early this month.

As we approach the High Holidays at the end of this month, we can all examine how our actions act as an example for the next generation. Are we content with just paying our dues and attending an occasional service, or do we make a real sacrifice of time and money to support our Temple? Do we do "just enough" or do we understand that "just enough" is not really enough?

A few years ago I wrote about a video produced by another synagogue that introduced "Someone Else," the person at every synagogue that did the things that needed to be done that everyone was too busy to do. What happens when so many in the Temple family say, "Let Someone Else do it," that there is nobody else? If nobody else introduces our Temple to a newcomer, membership falls. If nobody else comes to services, the sanctuary is empty. If nobody else helps with an oneg, or changes a light bulb, or comes up with a new program, the Temple stagnates, withers, and dies.

Likewise, if nobody else digs deeper to financially support the Temple, there isn't money to maintain the building, pay the bills, or meet payroll.

What happens when the children of a Jewish community see the adults do "just enough" or give "just enough?" They begin to think that "just enough" is enough, or maybe it is even too much because it won't keep the community going anyway.

But when they see us give generously of our time and money, when they see us enthusiastic about maintaining and improving our congregation and its facilities, when they see us proud of our Temple, concerned with its welfare and the welfare of its family, and when they see that Judaism is important to us, then we can be sure it will be important to them.

As we prepare for the start of the Jewish Year 5780, may we all be mindful to demonstrate to our children, as well as to each other, just how important Judaism and our Temple With a Heart are to us, and may we all be inscribed for a year of health, happiness, and peace.

On behalf of the Temple administration as well as my family and myself, I wish you "I'shanah tovah tikatevu," may it be a good and sweet year for all of us.



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
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
