We have become deaf to the pleas of those in need. As a result, we are retreating from becoming the loving people we strive to become. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Inaugural Speech of 1933, during the dark days of the Great Depression, which many have compared to the economic effects of the Pandemic, says:

"The only thing we have to fear is fear itself-nameless, unreasoning, unjustified terror which paralyzes needed efforts to convert retreat into advance".

What does it say to others when you wear a mask in public? It says you care about someone other than yourself. You care about your neighbors. You care about perfect strangers. You care about the clerks at the grocery store. And you care about the people they all know.

I came across a *brucha* for donning a face mask, which I have reproduced in this column. In Judaism is seems there is a blessing for everything. In *Fiddler on the Roof*, the rabbi is asked "Is there a proper blessing for the tsar?" The rabbi responds "A blessing for the tsar?" Of course . . . May God bless and keep the tsar . . . far away from us!"

creature has (and usually takes for granted) and raise them to a level of holiness." The point is that we can raise the meaning and spirituality of mundane tasks by stopping to think about our actions, and a brucha is one way to help us do that.

We are living in tense and difficult times. Many of us are on edge out of anxiety of the illness, some because of worry about finances, others are upset over the disruption of what was once our "normal" lives. When we stop and say a brucha or even just to give a thought about why we wear a mask outside of the home, the act

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becomes less of a requirement and more of an opportunity. We are making the world a better place and taking care of one another.

There are other ways we can express our care for others during this stressful times. The simple act of saying thank you to the grocery clerk is one. Diane is particularly good at looking at the name tag of store employees and thanking them by name (and I am working on getting better at that). On social media, I see local people sharing backyard produce, offering to shop for others, even sharing which market has what in stock.

In this time of affliction, there is so much each of us can do protect and sustain life, to increase holiness, and to repair the world. We only need to open our eyes and hearts! Stay well!

EDUCATION MATTERS - RSPA President, CHERIE RYE

Hello Temple Family,

Religious School has resumed via Zoom. I did a brief interview with my son to get the low-down on a typical day. At 9:30 am, students and teachers begin with a meet-and-greet. The Rabbi may give a talk to the kids, or simply allow everyone to visit. Afterwards, kids go into "break out" rooms with their teachers according to grade. My son is in the bar/bat mitzvah class, and they have social studies class with Ms. Robyn. Around 10:30, the



kids take a half hour break. They grabs snacks or drinks, or show off a pet over Zoom, or may tease a sibling. Pets, by the way, are often great over Zoom! Class resumes again at 11am. Once more, they start with a meet and greet. They return to a break out rooms with a different teacher. The bar/bat mitzvah class has Hebrew with Rabbi during their second hour. The school day ends with a gathering of students and teachers together. The Rabbi says a few closing words. Everyone has an opportunity to visit and say good-bye until next Sunday.

For our teachers and Rabbi, they now have an opportunity to discuss parts of the Torah and religious holidays, like Shavuot, which often occur during the summer, when Religious School has normally ended. Shavuot commemorates the giving of the Torah to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai, so it seems particularly poignant now, during a time when we've been asked to stay at home, that we remember this awesome gift from G-d.

Also take a moment to remember how the Jewish people came to receive the Torah: they had left behind the injustice of slavery. Rabbi Ullman estimates they traveled for about seven weeks after the Exodus, so the memory of slavery's terrors was still fresh on their minds when they received this great gift. Recently, the streets of downtown Los Angeles, along with other cities, have been filled with the voices of protest over an awful and an unnecessary death. We should recognize that slavery in this country has left an ugly legacy of poverty, racism and violence.

The Torah teaches us to stand up for justice. It also teaches us compassion. As a society, we need those lessons now more than ever.

We sincerely hope you are able to stay healthy and sane during this time, and are able to enjoy the time with your families. If you live alone, please reach out over the phone, or video chat, to family and friends. If you have friends or relatives who you know live alone, resolve today to call them. If you can, pick a date or time, and call once a week until the pandemic is over. Set an alarm on your phone to remind you to make that call. One simple call from you can brighten the day of someone feeling isolated. Let's do our best to support each other during this time.

Remember, too, that your Temple community is also here for you.

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
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
