
Shana Tova u'metuka (Good and Sweet year). Traditional Rosh Hashanah Greeting

meetings, breakout rooms Share Screen and how to be creative. Temple members have even learned what my study looks like. They say it looks just like my office at Temple.

We continued our distance learning by sending home information packets about the Passover holiday and the State of Israel.

But the teachers felt it wasn't enough so in Mid-May we began Zoom School. It met at approximately the same time as regular religious school and the students of our school, who wanted to participate did from our first graders to our teen-agers in age appropriate classes and we made sure they had music, too. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - September 2020

What will the High Holidays look like for the Temple Beth Emet family this year? Things will be different, to be sure. We will not be worrying about where to park and we will not have to read the signs to make sure there is no street sweeping. We will not pass through our front doors and past our greeters manning the table in the foyer, waving our tickets. We will not fill our sanctuary dressed in our "Sunday best."



Some things will look and sound familiar with that intimate Temple Beth Emet feel. There will be services, complete with the *Machzor*, and Rabbi leading, Robyn chanting, and the choir singing. There will be cards for you to fill out for the Scroll of Remembrance and pledge cards. And yes, there will be a *Kol Nidre* appeal -- you didn't think you were going to get away from that, did you?

Our "new normal" for the time being has required some adjustments. We will probably be at home in our den or living room. The service is going to be recorded and uploaded to YouTube, and we will be watching on our computers or phones or tablets. If we have a "smart" television or a streaming device like Roku, Apple TV, or Fire Stick, we can use the YouTube channel to watch services on our televisions. The *Machzor* will be broken down to PDF files for each service, which we can view on our tablet or other device, or a separate window on our computer. Even the cards for the Scroll of Remembrance and the pledge cards can be completed online on our website.

So here are some questions -- are you going to dress up for the service or watch in your sweat pants and shirt? During those parts of the service where we usually stand, are you going to stand? Will you chant and read along at those parts of the service where we usually chant and read? Will you bend your knee and bow at *Alenu*?

Those of us who have been attending the Zoom and YouTube Shabbat services these past months have already had to deal with these questions, but even if you have been taking the more relaxed approach for Shabbat, are you going to up your game for the High Holidays? I know Rabbi Mark will encourage you to elevate your experience if you feel comfortable, and dress for services, stand and chant and read aloud.

To paraphrase Tevya from *Fiddler on the Roof*, you may ask, "What are you going to do, Ira?" I'll tell you... I don't know! Quite honestly, I am going to see where the spirit of the High Holidays takes me. We are, however, in the month of *Elul*, and it is supposed to be a

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








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
