

" May the one who brings Peace in the High Heavens" (Siddur)

In a few months it will be 51 years since my first arrival in Israel, July 15, 1970, as a college student on my Junior Year abroad at Tel-Aviv University. Going to Israel was mandatory as part of my Major Near Eastern Language and Area Study at Rutgers.

But my connection to Israel went back much further. I joined a Zionist Youth movement Young Judaea in 1965. At Young Judaea we sang, danced, and discussed Israel at our meetings, our week-end retreats our national conventions. So, when I arrived in Israel I wasn't expecting a Jewish Utopia, I was expecting a country like any other country expect Hebrew signs instead of English ones.

I have been back 6 other times, the last with a group of Temple members in 2016. My opinion of the country has not changed. It has its severe problems and sometimes magical solutions. But on a regular basis, it is people going about their business just as people in a social/capitalistic democracy do. There is one major difference! Israel is a country not only for Israelis. It is a country that has been made to represent the Jewish People. Just as the relationship of our people with other peoples in



the world through history has been complicated. Israel is like a museum revealing all the evidences of those complications. From Masada where 900 of our people held out against Rome for 3 years before committing suicide to Yad Vashem where there are exhibits of Holocaust murders to the Israel Museum with is fashions of our people worn as highly respected members of Persian and North African Society, to the Museum of the Diaspora at Tele Aviv University where miniatures of magnificent synagogues show the great wealth and power of our religion and our people, the complexity of being the Jewish state becomes apparent.

In the midst of this Jewish history pantheon, we must always remember that not all Israelis are Jewish Israelis.

Israeli Muslims and Christians make up 20% of the Israeli population. How do we include these fellow citizens into the overwhelmingly Jewish nature of Israel? Moreover, how do we include them in the concept of an Israel national idea? It is not easy and lately it has been made harder. As the world seems to be moving more towards societies based less on inclusion and more on exclusion, look at our country in the last 4+ years. The anger, hatred and arrogance of supremists of all colors is unfortunately become a fact of life throughout the world. Israel is not immune! Jewish, Muslim and Christian extremists are on both sides of the present conflict. Their rhetoric has led to armed conflict. While this is not new in the history of Israel or of our people, it seems to be spiraling out of control whether in the form of a fist, a club, a bullet, a missile, or a rocket.

What can we do here in Burbank to help Israel? First acknowledge that it has problems both internal and external. Second, contact your Congressman, your Senator, and the President and tell them your opinion. Thirdly, if you feel the reporting of the media is biased, contact them. I have done all these things. Also, arrange with a spokesperson for Israel's adversaries a debate. I, as your Rabbi, volunteer. I have been debating with Israel's adversaries since 1968 when I was a senior in High School.

One last thing, I am including the Prayer for Peace (see page 6), written by Rabbi Kramer and Jim Mattis, may they both rest in peace. Please do as I do, the Jewish thing for the Jewish State, read it every morning!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - June 2021

Our Temple is emerging from the pandemic. We have resumed in-person Shabbat services, albeit without an oneg and with masks. Our religious school has concluded its all-Zoom term and we anticipate having our students and teachers returning to actual classrooms this fall. We are even anticipating holding High Holidays at the Temple in September.



Our journey back to "normal" depends, of course, on continued progress toward beating COVID-19. To a large extent that depends on all of us, our friends, our family, and our neighbors, becoming vaccinated. It also depends on continued vigilance in preventing transmission by wearing masks where necessary, continuing to wash our hands regularly, observing social distancing where appropriate, and paying attention to trends and conditions.

Diane and I are now fully vaccinated, as is our son Jon, and although it feels liberating, there is still the nagging hesitancy to embrace the old normal. While I no longer see fellow shoppers at the supermarket at threats to my existence, I still wipe down the handle of my cart, reach back in the shelf to pick a product less likely to have been touched by other customers, and wash my hands first thing when I get home. Who knows when, if ever, these new habits will fade.

It is clear, however, that our nation, our state, and our community are reopening, and that raises the question -- where do we go from here? This question is particularly important to our Temple Beth Emet family -- where do we go from here? What now? We are fortunate and grateful that over the past year (plus) our Temple membership has continued to pay their dues, make donations, and participate in our online activities and the few occasions where we had activities at Temple, but we really had no opportunity to grow our congregation. As we move forward into "recovery" it will be incumbent on each of us to not only continue our support of our Temple, but to look for ways to revitalize and expand our Temple family. We need to restore and replace things we used to rely on. We have started to reach out to organizations that were using our facilities and providing extra revenue, but our preschool families and staff have moved on and it is unlikely we will be restarting our preschool any time soon.

So where do we go from here? As a Temple community, we should look forward and see the opportunities. People have been forced into isolation, now we need to offer friendship and togetherness. People have been fearful, now we need to offer spiritual hope and encouragement. Times have seemed dark, but I can think of no better time than now, with the coming of summer's long days and light to chase those dark feelings away and rejoice in each other at our Temple With a Heart. Where do we go from here? We look upward, we go forward!




