


"If you will it, it is no dream"-Theodore Herzl

movement was aimed not only at racial injustice but in sexual injustice, age injustice, and gender injustice. We have gained many freedoms we did not have in these past 60 years...

Martin Luther King planted the seeds of equality and like the Tu B'Shvat story, he did not live long enough to see the fruit grow from the tree but his grandchildren did.

We can make his dream our own!. We can eat from the fruits of his vision and gain the nourishment we need to plant groves of trees with even more far reaching dreams for our children and grandchildren.

But first we must clear the bullies, bigots, racists, misogynists, and anti-Semites from the land! Let us start here at Tempe Beth Emet.

Simultaneously, we will ask people to share with us their dreams for the future of our Temple, our City, and our Land.

We will start the third Friday of this month bringing back "Ask the Rabbi" but we will extend its reach to include questions about future Judaism not just contemporary Jewish ideas.

Also, two ideas have come to me I would like to share, we add a weekly evening 'Lunch with the Rabbi' type discussion group. It was pointed out to me, by one of our members, that people are busy during the day with work or other activities so evenings would be better.

We are going to hear from our young people! What better way to plant fruit growing 'trees' than to ask our young people? I am sure their way to make their dreams for the Jewish Community our country and themselves come true will differ from our own dreams for each of those topics...

We have much to think about as we leave the winter days of the Pandemic and enter the warmth of a spring of new life.

Let me leave you with a quote from Martin Luther King: "Everybody can be great...because anybody can serve. You don't have to have a college degree to serve. You don't have to make your subject and verb agree to serve. You only need a heart full of grace. A soul generated by love."

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - January 2022

I was struggling with a topic for this month's message when I came across this story by "The Love Rabbi," Yisroel Bernath, of Chabad of NDG and the Jewish Chaplain at Concordia University. It is far better than what I was working on, so I would like to cede the page to him:

In Washington DC, at a Metro Station, on a cold January morning in 2007, a man with a violin played six Bach pieces for about 45 minutes.

During that time, approximately 2000 people went through the station, most of them on their way to work.

After about four minutes, a middle-aged man noticed that there was a musician playing. He slowed his pace and stopped for a few seconds, and then he hurried on to meet his schedule.

About four minutes later, the violinist received his first dollar. A woman threw money in the hat and, without stopping, continued to walk.

At six minutes, a young man leaned against the wall to listen to him, then looked at his watch and started to walk again.

At ten minutes, a three-year old boy stopped, but his mother tugged him along hurriedly. The kid stopped to look at the violinist again, but the mother pushed hard and the child continued to walk, turning his head the whole time. This action was repeated by several other children, but every parent - without exception - forced their children to move on quickly.

At forty-five minutes: The musician played continuously. Only six people stopped and listened for a short while. About twenty gave money but continued to walk at their normal pace. The man collected a total of \$32.

After one hour: He finished playing and silence took over. No one noticed and no one applauded. There was no recognition at all.

No one knew this, but the violinist was Joshua Bell, one of the greatest musicians in the world. He played one of the most intricate pieces ever written, with a violin worth \$3.5 million dollars. Two days before, Joshua Bell sold-out a theater in Boston where the seats averaged \$100 each to sit and listen to him play the same music.

This is a true story. Joshua Bell, playing incognito in the D.C. Metro Station, was organized by the Washington Post as part of a social experiment about perception,




