

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - March 2022

It is March, and in my household our thoughts turn to corned beef. Diane is at least one-quarter Irish, so naturally we have corned beef and cabbage for St. Patrick's Day. In preparation we buy not one, but two corned beef flats. One to cook for St. Patrick's Day, the other to prepare for later for corned beef on rye. There are advantages to being an interfaith family. We get to celebrate two sets of holidays - Hanukkah and Christmas, Passover and Easter, and St. Patrick's Day and, well, corned beef on rye.



We in the United States assume corned beef and cabbage is an Irish tradition. It is not. In fact, historically the Irish did not eat a lot of beef. In Gaelic Ireland cows were considered a symbol of wealth and somewhat sacred. Irish farm families relied on their cows for milk, often made into butter. Only when the cow became too old to work or produce was it slaughtered. The primary red meats eaten in Ireland were pork, lamb, and mutton. The traditional Feast of Saint Patrick usually featured a type of bacon, similar to Canadian bacon.

When large numbers of Irish immigrated to the United States they were faced with the same type of prejudices that faced other immigrant groups. As a protection, they tended to settle together, primarily in urban areas such as New York's lower east side.

As with many new arrivals, the Irish adapted as best they could, including finding substitutes for traditional foods not found in America. Living side by side with other ethnic communities, traditional cuisines began to include locally available foods. Irish bacon was not found in America, but the Irish often bought their meat from the Kosher butcher shops of their Jewish neighbors. There they found something that was similar to their traditional bacon and was affordable, the cured brisket we know as corned beef.

So St. Patrick's Day is celebrated in America with a quintessentially Jewish protein. But can Jews celebrate any part of St. Patrick's Day, a Catholic holiday? Ruth Abusch-Magder in myjewishlearning.com observes:

In many ways, the American celebration of St. Patrick's Day fits easily with Jewish life. Though its origins are clearly religious, St. Patrick's Day as it is celebrated in the United States is a largely ethnic diasporic holiday, which helps those living at a distance affirm a commitment to homeland, that may exist only in realm of longing not in the realm of experience. The ability to gather and celebrate a common heritage, to recall the place from which one originates, is common to both Jews and Irish living outside their homelands.

So go ahead, enjoy your corned beef and cabbage, but leave some room for hamantashen because St. Patricks day falls on Purim this year!


