

Old men shall dream dreams and ... young men shall see visions "(Yoel 3:1)

In a few weeks it will be Israel Independence Day. Israel will be 74 years young. The first time I

came to Israel was to study at Tel-Aviv University. It was July 15, 1970. America was in the midst of the Vietnam War and I had just left Rutgers and the student protests. "End the war" slogans were matched with "America, Love it or Leave it". Those signs usually reflected which generation was holding them.

I remember volunteering to work on Kibbutz Mesgav Am on the Israeli Lebanese border.

Over Rosh Hashanah, an elderly gentleman came over to us, the volunteers, and asked if we would be interested in hearing his opinions on Israel. As I recall, his talk was enlightening and thought provoking. Later on that Shabbat, I learned that he was a member of Israel's Parliament, the Knesseth, and he made it is duty to come to his Kibbutz and work like one of the Kibbutzniks (members) every Shabbat, which he was, of course. How many members of the US Congress then and now go home on week-ends to work as a common person?

Out of his talk, one comment stands out. He

said, "Here there is no generation gap. It is hard for parents to lord it over their children, when both serve in Tzahal (Israel Defense Forces)". Coming out of a country so divided as America was in 1970, his commit struck home with me.

Now it is 52 years later and I see America divided again. Not only politically, but ideologically and generationally.

Here at Temple over the course of these past few months, we have organized for the school and the Temple, three major activities, the Megillah Reading, the Purim Carnival and the School Seder. Even before them, and when I have called upon our young people, they have volunteered to come forward. With great efforts, with joy and with enthusiasm, they have gone beyond what I have requested of them. Now, perhaps, I have to explain 'young people' in my lexicon. I am only 2 years younger than Israel, so any one younger than me is a younger person. Seriously, we have great cadre of teen-agers, young parents and couples and singles waiting to show there is no generation gap in loving the Temple. Some of our new members are even old Bar/Bat Mitzvahs from years gone by.

As the Israeli Knesset member spoke of common experience with regards to war and peace, please don't misunderstand, I don't ever wish for any member of our congregation or any congregation to go to war, but I wish for us to see in each other the shared love and experience that comes from placing the "Temple with a heart" in everyone's heart. On an 'Assiyah (doing) level, I have found, just asking works wonders. The asking, though, should include the words, would, and, how in it. Perhaps, "Would you like to help us do this and how do you see it working?" Is the way to go? if you involve others' ideas and thoughts, you often get their hands as well.

Please remember, Israel was built with young people like David Ben-Gurion and with the support of an oldster Ha Rav Kook. Age separated them but Visions and dreams for the future did not.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - May 2022

At the last meeting of your Board of Directors we discussed an article in a recent issue of the Jewish Journal brought to our attention by one of our board members, Herb Murez. The article, <u>Bringing Synagogues Back to Life</u>, focused on the problems many congregations, including ours, are facing, in particular declining enrollment.



The authors, Dr. Ron Wolfson and Rabbi Brett Kopin, observed:

Congregations reeling from pandemic-induced membership decline. Rabbis resigning pulpits in droves. Seminary enrollment plummeting.

These are the headlines proclaiming a crisis in synagogue life. To be sure, these are serious challenges. But, decrying the death of synagogues is going to be the death of synagogues.

The article presents three levels of engagement required to build a Jewish religious community: "(L)inking people to the totality of Jewish living; building relationships between the clergy, the staff and lay leaders and the members and guests; and connecting members with each other."

An important aspect of connecting members with each other is the recognition of the value of small groups, not so much as existing as part of the whole community, but as the requisite building blocks of the community.

Here at Temple Beth Emet, we have often thought of our Friday Night group, our Religious School group, our sub-organizations such as Sisterhood and Book Club groups, etc. We have often tried to think of ways to unite those groups, but perhaps we need to recognize the value of these seemingly separate groups as providing the intimate communities necessary to build the Temple community at large.

As the board discussed how we might go about encouraging building a stronger Temple community, it became apparent that we needed to return Temple programming that were curtailed during the pandemic. We started planning how to safely bring back Oneg Shabbats. We discussed bringing back other activities such as Pizza Night, pot luck dinners, and entertainment programs such as a talent show and movie nights. Many of these activities will by necessity wait until we get closer to the High Holidays, but we be planning some events for the summer months.

Wolfson and Kopin conclude their article by reminding us that "(p)eople will come to synagogues for programs, but they will stay for relationships." The programs we are looking to resume compliment our more structured activities such as religious services and classes, which provide the foundation and purpose for Temple Beth Emet as a religious organization. The more informal, less structured activities (which you might notice, often involve food) encourages the development of those all-important relationships and affords all of us the opportunity to get to know each other better and to welcome those who may be visiting us for the first time. Of course, to achieve these positive results, we need to participate in these programs!

What are some of the things <u>you</u> want to see happen at Temple? We need <u>your</u> new ideas as well as <u>your</u> enthusiasm and involvement. The best way for us to grow our community and ensure a positive and exciting future for Temple Beth Emet is for more people to meet YOU!


