Temple Beth Emet. In honor of double Chai, two lives, I want to tell you about Rabbi Kramer and myself. Rabbi William Mordechai Kramer was the Rabbi of our Temple from 1965 to 1996. He was a graduate of the Jewish Institute of Religion in New York, a professor at Hebrew Union College and California State University, Northridge formerly San Fernando Valley State College.

CSUN is how Rabbi and I met. He was the professor of my girlfriend and knowing how much I loved Judaism and Israel, she took me to meet this larger than life RABBI. We went to Rabbi's house in West LA and spent the afternoon with him, schmoozing and laughing and being a part of Rabbi's world. At the end of the day, as he was walking us to our car, he said, "Mark, I can see you are a man of many interests!"

Later, my girlfriend said, "What do you think?"

I replied, "Frankly, I'm disappointed, he could have complimented me on my knowledge of Talmud or my understanding of Middle East Politics!!!!!"

She answered me," Oh No, That is what people are saying about him. He just gave you the highest compliment!"

Out of that afternoon, I began to attend services at 3rd and Magnolia, the Home of our Temple until 1976. In fact, I was able to observe how Rabbi led the charge of cutting edge Judaism, but with a traditionalist edge, many times.

In fact, I was told on more than one occasion, that on the way to services the first Friday night,in 1965, Rabbi stopped off at Mt. Sinai Cemetery and picked up Yarmulkes for the men to wear. The then Tempe President resigned the next week.

You see Rabbi Kramer graduated for the Jewish Institute of Religion in New York, which, while officially

Reform, was much more traditional in outlook. When people call us a Reform Temple, I have to remind them that Rabbi for all his liberalness still maintained a love for tradition. He passed that ideology on to me. When my teachers ask me how to teach holidays, I tell them start with the traditional viewpoint and them explain to them what we do and why we do it.

Many of our students go on from here and join other communities that are more traditional 'than we are.

Rabbi Kramer may not have agreed with what certain groups of Jews do but he never turned his back on someone in need. He bailed many a JDL-er out of jail but if you asked him publicly about it he could deny doing anything of the sort.

He wanted Temple Beth Emet to be open and available to any who are in need. That is why, there are no steps to get into the sanctuary or the classrooms. Rabbi William Kramer, a man of many interests was a man with a degree in architecture. He had a student at CSUN who was a paraplegic. He wanted him to be able to come to services. His name was Michael and he did.

Rabbi taught me many things, some simple, some profound. Like "When you want children to be quiet, don't shoosh them, sing to them!" To this day, when I want to begin Kiddush at school, we all sing Shalom Aleichem and later, the Kiddush prayer. One helps calm them down the other subliminally teaches them one of the prayers for their Bar/ Bat Mitzvah. I have been reminded often that singing has always been a part of worship.

When I came in 1986 Rabbi made me an offer I could not refuse," If you rebuild the school and raise its numbers, I will convene a private Beit Din (Jewish Committee) and have you (Continued on page 6)

The scouts came back and reported that the land did indeed flow "with milk and honey," but 10 of the 12 concluded that we would not be able to defeat the current occupants and take the land. Two of the scouts, Caleb and Joshua, expressed that if we maintained our faith in God and planned properly we would be victorious.

At Shabbat services, I suggested that although the world today presented daunting challenges, we had the choice to be like the 10 scouts who basically were willing to give up, or the two who joined their faith with their determination and deliberation were convinced of the success of their objective.

As I begin another term as your Temple President I ask all of you to consider where we stand as a congregation. We face the familiar challenges of small membership and tight finances. We face the challenges of all religious institutions - the reduction of involvement in religious institutions in our society generally. But if the last two years have shown us anything, it had demonstrated our ability to persevere through challenging times. I believe if we have faith in God and in each other, if we put our heads and our hearts together, we can see our Temple Beth Emet community grow and thrive.

A couple of months ago I asked, "What are some of the things you want to see happen at Temple? We need your new ideas as well as your enthusiasm and involvement." I'm happy to say that we have two new directors who had already expressed interest in joining the board. That is a great beginning. What we need, however, is for more of you to step up like Caleb and Joshua and say, "We can do this." We can do new things here at



ordained in the Orthodox manner. Rabbi knew he was on strong ground as the Orthodox ordinations are made up of one orthodox rabbi approving the applicant. Rabbi had three other Rabbis with him. After I passed all my tests for ordination and was ordained in an beautiful ceremony, Rabbi called me aside and said," You need to go study with Rabbi Zalman Schachet-Shalomi.While my ordination is good in Los Angeles where I am known, Rabbi Zalman is known nationally". What an act of humbleness and kindness on Rabbi Kramer's part!

I enrolled in Reb Zalman's program and was ordained a few years later. I have been blessed to have two such wonderful Teachers!

Rabbi and I didn't always agree on the direction of the Religious School or the Temple. Once, I told him, "You are the Rabbi, if there is a controversy and a difficult decision for me to make, what should I do?"

He said, immediately," Ask me what I think and then go ahead and do what the Hell YOU think is right!!!!"

We call ourselves, the Temple with the Heart! Rabbi knew that I had come from a congregation which preached Hell, Fire and Brimstone. He reminded me that whenever I do a sermon, I must treat the congregation with love. The words, ideas and feelings must always be positive.

Rabbi Kramer was a man who walked the walk and talked the talk.

The first Friday night I was to preach was July 1, 1986. A little while before services in walked Rabbi Kramer, I knew his father had passed away that morning and I said to him," Why are you here, I thought you would be home with Betty mourning!"

He answered, "Tonight, I need to be with the people who love me and whom I love."

Rabbi Kramer taught me many things that have contributed to my life, but, by far, the most important one is that if you love your congregation and they know it, they will return the love, double. For the double Chai you have given to Rabbi William Mordechai Kramer and to Rabbi Mark Harris Sobel, THANK YOU ALL!!!
