That is why the Jewish people have always advocated unlimited discussion. The Talmud, the great books of Jewish law gave both the majority opinion and the minority opinion. The honesty of those Scholars coming at a time when Europe was going through the dark ages always makes me smile. Judaism even in its worst times did not seek to keep our people illiterate and ignorant.

The leaders sought ideas to do Judaism. The fruit of their learning was the building of a people full of creativity. Mixing Sephard and Askenaz was like a fruit tree makes a nectarine from a peach and an apricot.

But how do we take the Biblical roots, the Talmudic trunk and the modern branches of Judaism and make our lives showing reverence for the past and the present as we look to build the future for our children. The seeds we have planted will someday grow. But how will they grow? Wil they be nourished as we were or will other forces stunt their growth?

The writers of the Tanak and the Talmud saw trees as representing us and how we should act towards one another. When you feed someone spiritually you help them grow and hopefully the fruit that comes from their thankfulness is sweet and gives you nutrition back.

We must always remember that people protect us. Like a tree, another person gives you shade from the harshness of the elements.

Now the beauty of people is not in the sameness but in the differences. Like a tree, the more people travel in their own ways the better society comes.

It is not by accident that we are to put natural branches called "schock" on the roofs of our sukkot. People will tell you that is so we can see the sun when it is time to go and harvest or the moon to find our way in the darkness.

The roof of branches is really there so that we look up to the natural vegetation and know how important to our lives is being honest, truthful and natural.

The word tree appears in the TaNaK 145 times. In Hebrew that corresponds to the Hebrew word, KAMAH, 'she grew.

Let us grow like the trees with strong roots, a robust trunk and many beautiful branches. For then the Future of Judaism will continue to bear fruit for all of people kind.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - October 2022

This month I ask your indulgence to allow me to share something very personal. On September 10 my oldest brother, Donald Goldstein, passed away from the effects Type 1 Diabetes. He was diagnosed at 18 and was 74 when he passed. He led a full, productive, and successful life by any measure.

I am youngest of three brothers, Don, Bob, and me. We often referred to ourselves as "the Three Amigos." I would like to share some thoughts about my big brother Don.

Don was an obedient son to our parents. When he was little and the family was staying at a hotel with an elevator, our father became concerned about Don getting caught in the doors. He told Don, "Now when the doors open, you hurry and run right out." Don did exactly as he was told. The doors opened, he ran right out. Unfortunately, it was the wrong floor and the doors closed with our parents inside the cab. Presumably they were reunited.

Don was resourceful and quick-thinking too. When he was older he went to work to help our father in our sewing machine and vacuum cleaner concession in a discount store. Money was always tight and our father filled out the shelf of used vacuum cleaners for sale with some that had no motors in them. Don was demonstrating one of them to a customer and had inadvertently chosen one without a motor. The customer exclaimed, "It's so quiet!" Recovering, Don said "Yes! But let me show you one with better suction!"

Our parents were proud when Don started college, something nether one of them were able to do. He started at UCLA, then went to Crown College, a new residential college at UC Santa Cruz. When he graduated our family went to the ceremony. I thought the campus was so beautiful that I made the decision to go there too, and I did. I met my wife, Diane there, so I have Don to thank for that.

After Don's sophomore year at Santa Cruz he had the opportunity to study a year in Israel, where he met Sheila. They fell in love and got married after Don finished at Santa Cruz the following year.

Don then went to Harvard and one summer I got to visit him and Sheila. Don took me to many of the historic sites in the area, a couple of wonderful restaurants, and let me help him cross-check some references in the library for his dissertation using the card catalog, now a lost art.

Don loved his family and took great pride and satisfaction in them. His wife Sheila is a saint. His daughter Debbie and son Ari are brilliant professionals. Their spouses Steve and Allison are the most wonderful people, real gems. His grandchildren Avery, Hannah, and Hugo, are the smartest kids in the world. You could just ask him and he would tell you so, and support his assertion with specific examples. At length!

Don always knew that his diabetes would likely limit his lifespan, but he refused to let it limit his life. He took to heart the words of Psalm 90:12 "So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom." Don's intellectual appetite included intelligence, energy policy, and cyber-security, which he put to use in his professional work to keep our

Losing my brother Don leaves a great emptiness in my soul and in the soul of all who knew him, but we can fill that space with his love of faith, of country, and most of all, of family.


