The reports are getting bleaker! Anti -Semitism, really anti-Jewish peopleism, is on the rise. From all corners from classical anti-Jewish

rhetoric to the Black Israelite movement, we are being attacked.

By far the most outlandish idea is that we are not true Jews but usurpers who have enslaved the true Jews, those who are Black, Brown or Native American. The other day, I was talking to a congregant who related that those anti-Jewish conspiracy theorists emphatically state that we are not the true chosen people but the people who stole the identity of others, enslaved them and then stole their identity.

I do remember when we left Egypt, some native Egyptians joined us for their chance to be free of Pharaoh, but I daresay they were nowhere near the majority so they could not have been the true children of Israel.

Maybe there is a case for Latinos being Jewish. Our people and the Muslims of Spain controlled most of the intellectual life in Spain until Queen Isabella and King Ferdinand threw us out. Many Secret Jews travelled with Cortex, Coronado, and Pizarro to the New World and when the Conquistadores left, the generals granted large tracts of land, called land grants, to the soldiers who stayed behind. Those soldiers called for women to come to the New World to marry them, most often a cousin or other relative

was asked, most definitely also a secret Jew. So it is possible that some people who identify as Latino may in fact be descendants of those Secret Jews.

What is most upsetting of course is the claim that they and only they are true Jews. We are told that we are descendants of a Tribe of Hungarians called Khazars, who converted from paganism to Judaism.

This is not new! The book "The Thirteenth Tribe" by Arthur Koestler published in 1976 described the same thing. Koestler and the new anti-Jews only talk about Ashkenazi Jews being inauthentic. They don't dare take on Sephardic Jews.

In one of my arguments with Mina, I told her that the Jews lived in Poland for 1,000 years. She responded," We Persian Jews know where Mordechai and Esther are buried!" Sephardi power! or at least truly authentic Judaism.

The "anti-Jewish people's" claim of one of the Black Israelite movement's favorite Basketball players led to his being suspended. If it wasn't so serious, it would be humorous. Where does this basketball player play his home contests? Brooklyn! When I heard what he said about us and his subsequent suspension, I was reminded of a comment by Johnny Carson, when the King of Saudi Arabia came to New York in the early 1960's and made disparaging remarks about Israel. Mr. Carson said, "Saying those things in New York City is like setting up a Ku Klux Klan field station in the Congo."


These attacks, while without merit, are scary because some people believe them.

But I appreciate those who choose not to believe the hate.

Right after, Kanye West, or Ye, whatever he calls himself, made his comments, two non- Jewish women here in Burbank, on separate occasions, called me aside and told me how much they detested Kanye's comments and his anti-Judaism in particular.

This is the key! We have allies, people who know the facts, people who know us as good solid citizens. When we talk to those who have doubts about our heritage, we deal with the facts, not just some other people's conspiracy theories. We must talk freely and truthfully about our

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - January 2023

Early in February is Tu BiShvat. The sage Hillel determined the date as the "new year of the trees." Literally, Tu BiShvat is the "fifteenth day of the month of Shvat." As with many things, Hillel's "friendly adversary" Shammai had advanced the first day of Shvat as the new year of the trees, the rabbis, however, favored Hillel's interpretation. The decision had import in determining the agricultural year and calculating the date for certain tithes. While today the distinction has become an esoteric bit of Jewish history, today Tu BiShvat has taken on meaning, especially in Israel, as a day for planting of trees and environmental-awareness programs.



I thought of this recently when a package from Amazon arrived at my house. Like many of us, I often come across something I think would be of benefit to our Temple. One late night browsing the Amazon "lightening deals" I came across some acrylic sign holders, size 81/2" x 11", perfect for displaying a flyer or sign without having to trim it to the several 8" x 10" frames we already have. The price was attractive, a two-pack for \$3.63! I ordered two sets.

They arrived in due course. What was delivered was a ridiculously large box measuring 22" x 16" x 8". Inside this box, cushioned by little plastic "pillows" were two smaller boxes. Inside each of those smaller boxes were two of the plastic frames held in place by two pieces of Styrofoam each and wrapped in a plastic bag. I dare say the packaging was worth more than the frames! Most of this packaging will end up in my recycling barrel, but really, this was an ecological disaster.

We all need to do our part to repair the world, *Tikkun Olam*. Our recycling barrel always has more in it that the solid waste barrel and here in California we are supposed to put table scraps and other kitchen waste in our "green barrels" with the grass clippings for composting. To their credit, even Amazon has begun using boxes "made with less materials" and mailers that can be recycles with other plastic bags.

Other things we can do include replacing our regular light bulbs with LED bulbs, as has been done with much of the exterior lighting at Temple. Also, in our Temple parking lot, you will see hybrid automobiles, reducing the use of fossil fuels and reducing tailpipe emissions.

There is a Midrash (interpretation) that says that when God created Adam, he took him around the Garden of Eden and said "Look at My works! How beautiful and praiseworthy they are. Everything that I have created, I created for you. Take care not to damage and destroy My world, for if you destroy it, there is no one to repair it after you."

Keep in mind also the Keynan proverb: "Treat the earth well. It was not given to you by your parents, it was loaned to you by your children."

Each of us can be mindful of our impact on the environment and hopefully make some positive change to protect it.



Tough Jews : Fathers, Sons, and Gangster Dreams, by Rich Cohen

Synopsis



In an L.A. delicatessen, a group of Brooklyn natives gets together to discuss basketball, boxing, the weather back east, and the Jewish gangsters of yesteryear. Meyer Lansky. Bugsy Siegel. Louis Lepke, the self-effacing mastermind of Murder, Inc. Red Levine, the Orthodox hit man who refused to kill on the Sabbath. Abe "Kid Twist" Reles, who looked like a mama's boy but once buried a rival alive. These are just some of the vibrant, vicious characters Rich Cohen's father reminisced about and the author evokes so pungently in Tough Jews.

Tracing a generation of Jewish gangsters from the candy stores of Brownsville to the clubhouses of the Lower East Side--and, occasionally, to suites at the Waldorf--Cohen creates a densely anecdotal and gruesomely funny history of muscle, moxie, and money. Filled with fixers and schlammers, the squeal of tires and the rattle of gunfire, his book shatters stereotypes as deftly as its subjects once shattered kneecaps.
