


"The friend of my friend is my friend, the friend of my enemy is my enemy, the enemy of my enemy is my friend" - Socrates

Normally, we have our own 'event' at the City Council meeting, so I was curious why both communities were being honored together.

It seems that there had been several anti-Armenian flyers posted in Glendale supposedly authored by Jews with the signature "Rabbi" and the BHRC wanted a joint acceptance where our two communities would speak in unity.

At the Council meeting, Mr. Sarkis Simonian, co-chairman of the Armenian National Committee and I spoke together:

In light of the anti-Armenian fliers that have recently appeared in the Cities of Glendale and Beverly Hills and the anti-Semitic flyers that have appeared in Burbank, it is the responsibility of us all to take a stand by overpowering hate, one act of common decency at a time.

As two ancient peoples with rich histories, the Armenian and Jewish communities share a common bond of resilience and strength in the face of extreme adversity. Our peoples have both experienced tremendous hardships and tragedies throughout our respective histories, but we have also demonstrated incredible resilience and determination in overcoming them.

We stand together as allies and friends, committed to building a brighter future for all people. We understand the importance of recognizing and honoring each other's struggles.

Let us continue to work together to promote understanding, justice, tolerance, and peace between all communities.

May our shared values of perseverance and hope guide us in our efforts towards a better future for all".

Since that night of unity for our two communities, I have seen the 'Glendale' flyer. If you want to see it, please contact me. It is not here because but I don't want the Chai Times to be a vehicle for free publicity for hate.

But, I want to give some background to why, I believe, the flyer says what it says. Since the Azerbaijani-Armenian war of 2021, where Israel supported Azerbaijan, there has been a great deal of sensitivity and, even hurt, on the part of the Armenian community.

We supporters of Israel here in the US are caught in the middle between the Armenian disappointment and Israeli foreign policy. Israel has had a policy of encircling its adversaries since the 1960's. It was the cornerstone of the policy that led to its positive relations with Kenya, Ethiopia, and, until 1976, Uganda. Azerbaijan is a Muslim country that borders Iran along with Georgia, the UAE and Bahrain. Azerbaijan has a large presence of Israeli troops, overtly and not so overtly. In fact, Saudi Arabia and Israel share intelligence, especially about Iran!

The poster in question, in a feeble attempt to blame Israel, used a term 'Azeri-Turk brothers' that could confuse people, as it seems to be referring to the population of Azerbaijan. The term Azeri-Turk refers to an Iranian ethnic group in the northwest of Iran. They do share a common ancestry with some Azerbaijani's, but do not represent the people of Azerbaijan.

So, it is my humble opinion that the poster is a device of Iranians who seek to drive a wedge between our people and the Armenian community.

What we can do is to thank the leadership of Burbank and the BHRC for bringing our communities together to fight Anti-Semitism and Anti-Armenian hate. Plus, let our Armenian neighbors and friends know that we would never condone any positive mention of the Armenian Genocide just as we would hate for anyone to speak positively of our own Genocide. We can explain that Iran is both our enemy and the enemy of Armenia as it strives and strikes out to conquer the world with its brand of Religio-Political Terrorism and will not stop at bold face lies to achieve its goals.

Please, if I personally am needed to speak to anyone about Israel or Middle East History or Politics, it was after all, my undergraduate major in college, please contact the Temple office so I can arrange a meeting with whomever needs to speak with me.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - May 2023

Last month we took a short trip to the Raleigh/Durham, North Carolina area. The occasion was my sister-in-law Sheila's 75th birthday. It was a bittersweet occasion as her husband, my oldest brother Don, passed away in September. Don and Sheila's daughter Debbie, her husband Steve, and their two children Avery and Hanna live in Durham. Their son Ari, his wife Allyson, and baby Hugo were down from upstate New York.



The trip was also an occasion to spend some time with my other brother Bob, and his wife Liz, who traveled from Florida for the occasion. His son Aaron, daughter-in-law Natalie, and two-year-old granddaughter Aubrey, had moved to the area a few months prior. The day before the birthday dinner just happened to be Bob's birthday, and we got to celebrate with him and his family as well. It was a wonderful opportunity to spend time with family. A bonus event was a visit to the area's mikvah for the completion of Hugo's conversion.

Bob and Liz recently moved, and during dinner one night he told us how being new in the community, he had called the local Reform congregation to see if they had a community Seder. They told him that they were all sold out, but maybe they could attend Shabbat services sometime. Apparently, they didn't even bother to take his name!

This really disturbed me. I know that when we were putting on a community Seder we sometimes reached the occupancy limit of our facility and the limit of our human resources, but we always tried to accommodate people. My mother always said, "You can always add another cup of water to the soup," and doesn't the Haggadah say, "Whoever is hungry, come and eat. Whoever is needy, come and celebrate Passover?"

I don't think this congregation meant to be dismissive, but it was a clumsy way to handle the situation. I know we at Temple Beth Emet have had our share of missteps dealing with new people who contact us. Given the fact that involvement in all religious institution, including synagogues, has been on the decline, it is important that each person who shows an interest in participating is embraced with open arms. It is called "welcoming the stranger" and there are several basic strategies involved. The first involves lowering barriers, making it easier for the newcomer to tip their toe past the threshold. For synagogues, this includes being careful using Hebrew terms a newcomer may not be familiar with -- for example, saying "Friday Night Services" instead of *Kabbalat Shabbat* (welcoming the Sabbath). It also involves collecting contact information and following up with people. Barbara Bolter, of blessed memory, was a master at that! Also important is for all of us to take note of new people in our midst, introducing ourselves and showing them how glad we are to meet them.

We have a few months before the return of the High Holidays, when we always have people checking us out, looking for a religious school, a synagogue to join, or just a place to for High Holiday services. That is plenty of time for all of us to hone our welcoming skills! We are all members of the Welcoming Committee. Each of us can show just how true it is that we are "The Temple With a Heart."
