Last month at the last session of the Confirmation class, I asked the students which they liked better, when we did text, specifically, Pirke Avot, the Talmudic book on Ethics or the more freewheeling, when they asked me questions, usually, more or less 'what does Judaism say about...' They chose the latter overwhelmingly!

I remember learning about the plan for Confirmation Programs done by the Reform movement so many years ago. While Bar/ Bat Mitzvahs are much older ceremonies, going back to when we were agrarians, their age related ceremonies leave much to be desired in this post-industrial world. We send our children out to the world as Jewish Adults as age 13, it was originally 12 for girls, and expect them to be able to do well in a world full of complexities. So, the question asked is," Would you send your child out to the world with only a 7<sup>th</sup> grade secular education?" Of course, the answer is, a resounding, "No". However, the Jewish non-Orthodox community does just that.

Further mis- communication has led to parents believing you had to be Bar/Bat Mitzvah by 13. No, the minimum age is 13, corresponding to the child physically being an

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## RABBI'S COLUMN (CONTINUED)

Adult. We, at Temple, long ago found that the 7<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade with all its pressures makes Bar/Bat Mitzvah training sometimes too much for the student. We have had students do both Bar/Bat Mitzvah and Confirmation studies simultaneously. The Confirmation program usually ends at age 15 or the end of 10<sup>th</sup> grade, where the child is much more mature.

Another thing that makes us unique along with our small Hebrew 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade classes and small group tutoring is we don't set a date for Bar/Bat Mitzvahs until the child completes the packet of prayers that constitute 90% of the religious service they are going to lead. It is presented to them when they enter 6<sup>th</sup> grade. When they read the prayers in the packet fluently, not quickly, but smoothly, we then ask for a minimum of 6 months to prepare the melodies, the Torah portion and the Speech. Two months before the date, I meet with them additionally, once a week in the Sanctuary so they feel 'at home' there.

Some people find this problematic, what with travel arrangements, caterers, etc. But my aim in the Child's knowledge that the Temple has his/her best interests at heart.

Let me relate an incident from before I came to Temple Beth Emet. The other synagogue where I taught had a policy that when you registered the child they gave you a Bar/ Bat Mitzvah date. Being they required a 5 year commitment, it was 5 years in the future. I had a student in my 7<sup>th</sup> grade religious school class who was called in by the Cantor. It was 6 months before his Bar mitzvah and the Cantor wanted to know how his Hebrew reading was. In a word it was terrible! So, the Cantor told the parents, who were very involved with their Temple, that their son would need strenuous tutoring. The parents, of course, agreed and the tutoring began. The son did well at his Bar Mitzvah, but what he told his parents greatly affected me.

He said, "I did this (the Bar Mitzvah training) because I am a loyal son and I love you both, BUT I AM NEVER GOING BACK TO THAT CRAZY PLACE".

I have taken his comment to heart. We all should Also!

That is why we don't set a date for the Bar/Bat Mitzvah service when the parents first register in the school. Most importantly, that is why we encourage the students to go at their own pace. Part of the Confirmation program is tutoring the 6<sup>th</sup>-7<sup>th</sup> graders. Over the years many of our former students come back to us as teachers. This year we had three. Unfortunately for us, two are leaving. Good-bye, Josh and Olivia! We will truly miss you and your efforts with our students.

Please remember, we are playing for our children's whole life! We want them to feel that this is their house, a house of Truth. We must continue to do so, or else the Truth is we will lose the next generation.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - June 2023

June is Pride Month, celebrating LGBTQ+ peoples, their culture, communities, contributions, and history. Originating as a commemoration of the Stonewall Uprising of 1969 in New York, it has grown to a world-wide assertion and celebration of human rights and an opportunity for those outside the LGBTQ+ community to support, observe, listen, and be educated, as well as to celebrate the diversity and uniqueness of all peoples.



Over the years, the visibility of Pride has grown. Until recently we might assume that the celebration of Pride was becoming more mainstreamed and accepted, as recognition of Pride grew wider in state and local governments, and major corporations even incorporated Pride into marketing and merchandising. Is there any better indication of acceptance than when a celebration becomes a cause for a sale?

But recently Pride has become a target of the "anti-woke movement." Ignorance and fear, stirred up by those who profess to support parental rights and so-called "traditional values" have manifested in boycotts and protests against corporations and confrontation at schools. In some states oppressive legislation aimed at tamping down not only acceptance and understanding of the LGBTQ+ community, but also that of minorities, immigrants, and religions that are not what they consider "mainstream Christianity."

One of the tropes the anti-Pride protesters use is "don't indoctrinate our children." The professed fear is that gay people seek to recruit children who would not otherwise be gay to become gay. This is a throwback to the hateful charge by Anita Bryant in the 1970s that "Homosexuals can't reproduce, so they have to recruit." Let's be clear, homosexuals don't recruit children, pedophiles recruit children. Sexual orientation has nothing to do with it.

Let's be clear about another thing, children of same-sex couples are under no inherent disadvantage in their psychological or academic development. There are and have been same -sex couple families in our congregation (and single parent families with straight and gay parents) and they and their children are well-adjusted, high achieving, loving, and great people.

The ignorance-fueled hate that drives "don't say gay" also fuels the fear of teaching our children uncomfortable facts of our history, the fear of people of different ethnicities, the fear of people of different religions, and the fear that people are coming to "replace" them.

I believe all people, regardless of ethnicity, sexuality, religion, culture, or color, want the same thing for themselves and their children. We want to be safe in our homes, have enough to feed and clothes our families, and to give our kids the best opportunities we can. We also want to be pretty much left alone to be who we are. If we expect these things for ourselves, we have to be willing to respect the desire for these things by others. We also have to be willing to feel a little uncomfortable until we learn, accept, and even celebrate our differences. We can take pride in ourselves while protecting the right of others to take pride in themselves and we can all take pride in our diversity and the appreciation of the value of what we bring to each other.



### Synopsis:



This book tells the full story of the first Arab-Israeli war and the birth of the State of Israel. Based largely on some 1000 interviews with participants of all nations, it describes the important military and diplomatic events of that epic war - from the struggle between Truman and Dean Rusk to the fall of Jerusalem's Jewish Quarter; from the Irgun-Stern Gang massacre at Deir Yassin to the ambush of a Hadassah hospital convoy; from the clandestine operations of the Jewish underground in the US to the secret negotiations between Jordan's King Abdullah and Moshe Dayan. Here are anecdotes and glimpses of great figures such as Weizmann, Ben-Gurion, Dayan, Abba Eban, Abdullah, Glubb Pasha, Ralph Bunche, and Nasser, and of the ordinary people who did the fighting; concentration-camp survivors, Sabras, foreign volunteers, and Arabs from throughout the Middle East. Here are all the major and minor participants and events of the great conflict that set the stage for and is crucial to the understanding of the present-day Israeli nation.
