


"Born a Jew, Always a Jew! No matter where you pray, no matter what to Judaism you do!" (Medieval Jewish Scholar, Rashi)

Rosh Hashanah means "Head of the year" but is usually translated as New Year. However, we already have a New Year celebration at Passover time, how can we have 2 New Years? The Passover New Year, corresponds to our being free from slavery, for sure, one of the greatest events in the history of our people, the Exodus from Egypt, a hugely physical event. So now Rosh Hashanah! What event or events does it commemorate? Instead of one huge physical event involving death and then freedom, Rosh Hashanah commemorates many little deaths and then one big Freedom. The deaths did not take place over 250 years or one night, ala the Angel of Death, the deaths of our spirit and hence, soul, have taken place over the past year when from others we have been abused, gossiped about insulted, lied to, treated poorly, etc. and done the same to others. The spiritual freedom comes by doing many acts of Tzedakah

(righteous behavior), especially now, going to others and directly asking their forgiveness and of course, to God, also asking to be forgiven. People often ask, if it is so important to ask people for forgiveness, why do we sit in prayer asking God for forgiveness? Because we know that God's celestial /spiritual ectoplasm flows in all of us. The term "created in the image of God" does not mean physical it means spiritual image. Because of that spirituality we capable of giving forgiveness and being forgiven. God is the glue that gives our people its uniqueness. Without the spirituality of God, what people call religion, all we are is a Hebrew/English Social club. The Community of Judaism without God makes us no better than the tribes of Neanderthals who hunted together to satisfy their animal needs.

This concept of God active and strong in our consciousness helps us appreciate God as the supernatural messenger who brings the message of forgiveness to those we cannot reach. How sad it is when someone passes away and we are mourning their passing and we say, "If only I had been kinder and more caring of that person and understood his situation". God helps us to deliver the message and for those away from us to receive the message that we need their forgiveness.

Judaism is a religion of dualities. Many of our prayers have two sides. One talks about light and darkness, one about the six days of the week, as one entity, and Shabbat. When we ask for forgiveness on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and we really mean it, God grants us the Spiritual Freedom we deserve because of our true apologies for errors that, perhaps, have embittered other people's lives.

The Spiritual side of others and ourselves is as important as the physical. While there are special restrictions on what we can eat on Passover to commemorate that freedom did not come easy, Sukkot's four species are to remind us of the 4 types of people we meet every day, the Etrog is the heart meaning learning and good deeds, the Lulav (Palm), one who does good deeds but doesn't know the spirituality of Mitzvoth, the Hadas (myrtle) who has learned much about Mitzvoth but does not put their knowledge into actions and the Arava (willow), who has not learned Mitzvoth and therefore does nothing for others. Why when we pray, do we hold all 4 species together? Because we know the world needs ALL types of people to be the wonderful spiritual lab it is.

All this spirituality comes to life when we march with and unfurl and read the Torah on Simhat Torah because we know of the great Spiritual Divinity that flows within us. I know my Godliness comes from God's image flowing through me. I pray I will be able anoint others with it!


