

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - March 2024

Tuesday, March 5 was Super Tuesday, when 15 states, including California, held presidential primary elections. While there will be additional primary elections in other states, it is clear now who the nominees of the Democratic and Republican parties for president will be.

It used to be that presidential campaigns did not start in earnest until after Labor Day in September. That isn't the case this year. It is going to be a long ordeal until November. We can expect to be bombarded with media coverage both serious and outlandish, with advertising that will be crushing both sensorily and physically. Our mailboxes will explode with smiling faces of candidates and the glaring visages of their opponents. Our email will balloon with requests for contributions and support. We're just getting over the primary election deluge! We can't expect to get much of a break.

In addition to electing a president, we will also be electing a new senator, congressional representatives, state senators and Assembly members, county and city officials, and judges. There are also at this time 11 state propositions to consider.

I'm a bit of a political junkie, but I have to admit, it is overwhelming.

Elections have consequences, and we, the electorate, are the authors of those consequences. It is incumbent upon each of us, therefore, to make informed and considered choices in November. How do we do this? First and foremost, make sure you are registered to vote. Then, I suggest that we educate ourselves on the role each of these elective positions play in our American society. We give ourselves a refresher civics course.

In evaluating candidates, we should examine the values each of them espouses and how those values comport with our own. What purpose do they see for their desired position? What is their vision for the future of our city, county, state, or nation? What is the main thrust of their argument for their own election? Are we comfortable with the way they speak about those who disagree with them -- not only their opponents, but their opponents' supporters. Do they reassure us or make us anxious?

When evaluating propositions, I encourage you to look closely at who is supporting or opposing each one. Not just the names of the organizations, which can be misleading, but look at who is behind those organizations and particularly where the money is coming from. Some of this information will be in the Voter Information Guide from the California Secretary of State.

Finally, take in the opinion of those around you. Here in Southern California we have two daily newspapers with very different political positions. Many of us are on social media and follow groups whose values mirror our own. We shouldn't allow these opinions to determine our voting choices, but rather to allow them to inform our choices.

It is going to be a long election season, but we only need look at some other countries to realize just how fortunate we are to be able to freely reach our own conclusions and register by ballot our own choices.



My Live

by Golda Meir

Synopsis:

Golda Meir was without doubt one of the most incredible women of her - and any - time. Born in 1898 in Kyiv, she was the daughter of an impoverished carpenter - and became the first (and only) female Prime Minister of Israel. Meir's earliest memory is of her father boarding up the front door in response to rumours of an imminent pogrom. The family emigrated to the US and for a while Meir lived with her sister, where she was exposed to debates on Zionism, women's suffrage, literature and socialism. She became a teacher, and after her marriage emigrated again to Palestine, settling on a kibbutz.

Always politically active, she became Israel's first envoy to Moscow; was promoted to Foreign Minister and ultimately elected as Prime Minister, leader of Israel. In her autobiography she wrote: 'To me, being Jewish means and has always meant being proud to be part of a people that has maintained its distinct identity for more than 2,000 years, with all the pain and torment that has been inflicted upon it'.


