This month we celebrate both our Fiftieth year as a congregation with a Gala celebration and the holiday of Thanksgiving. One comes very rarely and one is so common that our country adds a uniquely American “day of observance” to it, Black Friday. To me these two days represent two types of thankfulness, one the thankfulness for the unusual, and the other for the common place. First, a congregation that has lasted for fifty years as we have in Burbank, where there is not a large identified Jewish population, is itself a rarity. I seem to remember before Chabad came to Burbank there was a third Jewish congregation, but it failed. Further, we are not the congregation we once were.

Once the title given to us was, “alternative” congregation, because of our ‘unique’ worship style, service and leadership. But that appellation no longer fits. We have metamorphosed. Our prayer, worship and sense of community makes us, while independent, a respected part of the Liberal/ Renewal branches of Judaism, and the spiritual community of the San Fernando Valley. Our students feel comfortable whenever they travel to other congregations and we are welcome wherever we (our congregation) take part in community events such as: Mitzvah Day, The Days of Remembrance, and the Walk for Life. .

This is the shining Gold of Public Mitzvah. It has shined upon us in three locations and continues to bless us in the print and video media. We have had articles in the Daily News, the Burbank Leader and been featured on KNBC news, the last time was 5:00 PM on Yom Kippur but no body saw it because we were worshipping. This only shows that the world is not perfect.

But what of the common thanksgiving that comes regularly, that we don't have to wait for 50 years to appreciate? We at Temple Beth Emet have that, too. We have it whenever we hold a board meeting and leave the door open without fear of attack. We have it when the police use our parking lot as a way station on their patrol. We have it when in an emergency we moved the Torahs next door to First Presbyterian Church and our congregants just walked across the street to worship. We have it when we march around the building holding the Torahs on Simhat Torah and the only noise heard that we are not making are car horns honking, wishing us well.

This is that common place gold that may not appear shiny. Actually, we don't know if it's shiny or not, because we don't see it. It is the Gold of private love and caring. It is evident in the myriad of Mitzvoth that are done for one to another by our congregants and others on a daily, no, momentary base. As we have brought it to the people, they have returned it to us. As we have sought and continue to seek to make Burbank a "Jerusalem", an inheritance of Peace, the people of Burbank have sought to join us in our quest. Not all is complete, of course, but we will leave that mission for the next 50 years, and we will be thankful for what we have that is forged of Gold, and of Light. 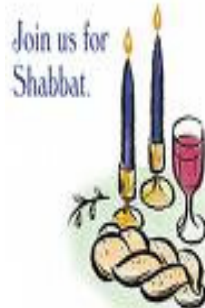

“It means the Jewish New Year and how you celebrate it is that we eat apples and honey, read special prayers and blow the shofar.”

A sin is a bad deed. We fast on Yom Kippur because we don't want to be distracted so we pray.

“Rosh Hashanna means being happy forgetting everything bad you did that year. Starting a great year with no sins and of course don't forget the best part the delicious apples and honey. Saying prayers blowing the shofar and many more good stuff.”

“A sin is a bad or wrong thing. When you fast on Yom Kippur to clean out your body so you can start everything all new. You pray. Do you know why else we fast? It's so food doesn't distract us from praying. You must pray to God to let him forgive us. Hopefully he will.”

“Rosh Hashana is a Jewish New Year where you think about the bad deeds that you did and the good deeds you did and we pray in a synagogue. We eat apples and honey and blow the shofar. I celebrate Rosh Hashanna by going to synagogue and to remember the good deeds and forget the bad deeds.”

“A sin is a bad deed. We fast because Jews want to pray and have nothing get in their way (distract them).”

“I celebrate Rosh Hashanah by having a lot of family members over and having a big dinner with special prayers and apples and honey. Rosh Hashanna is the Jewish New Year. It's when God made earth.”

“A sin is a bad deed. We fast on Yom Kippur because we don't want to be distracted from praying.”

“I think Rosh Hashanna means you go to synagogue and pray to God and forget all of the bad things you did that year. After praying to God the Rabbi blows the shofar to welcome Jews to the synagogue. ALUMINUM CANS: Don't throw that empty soda can away. Collect aluminum cans from your friends, family and neighbors and bring them to the Temple so they can be redeemed for cash. (Please rinse out)



TONER AND INK JET CARTRIDGES: Collect all your used inkjet and toner cartridges from everybody you know.

BATTERIES: Flashlight, radio, etc. (no car batteries please).
