Rabbi Says:

And the work of righteousness shall be peace and the effect of righteousness quietness and confidence for ever” (Serviceman’s Prayer book El Molei Rachamim)



Last November, at our 50th Anniversary Celebration, Maj. Gen. John Harrel and Col. Linda Harrel presented me with The California Commendation Medal, for the times I have served the men and women of the California Army National Guard starting with Shabbat services during the Los Angeles Riots of 1992. My memories of my times with the National Guard always revolve about young people engaged in activities full of commitment, professionalism, courage and most of all honor.


So, when Memorial Day comes to me, as it does for the rest of America, I think of young men and women who have made great sacrifices for our country. Ethnically speaking, I have been blessed enough to teach about members of our people who have served in the defense of America from the days of the first immigrants to New Amsterdam (New York) who requested “to be permitted to keep guard with other burghers.” Their request was granted, namely, “Asher Levy...keeps watch and ward like other Burghers”.

But more importantly, I am reminded of friends my grandfather lost during World War I, my father lost during World War II, I have lost due to the Vietnam War, and we, as a nation, have lost in all wars. Please remember, my congregation, warfare changed in the second half of the 20th century, some of these deaths are slower and more insidious than in prior wars. Service people returning home from these conflicts need our support, our care

President's message

Dear friends and fellow temple members,



We have just had the privilege of celebrating Pesach, an opportunity to gather with family and friends. On that night, once again we told how Moses led our people out of oppression and into freedom. Yet underlying this adventure story is a valuable concept about another type of freedom, the freedom to do what is right, regardless of the consequences, and not be held down by greed, pettiness, or selfishness. Pesach is a time for us, as individuals, to re-dedicate ourselves to the ethics that make us who we are.

If more of the Exodus were to be told in the Seder, we would recall how Moses surely reached the "peak" of his career when he received the Ten Commandments on Mt. Sinai and how disappointed he must have been when he descended and found his people worshipping a golden calf. I have always suspected there is a reason for these two points to happen so close together in both time and geography. It's a lesson to remind us that it is easier to fall back on self-serving habits and tangible rewards than to accept a code of ethical behavior based on faith but promising no earthly compensation. And like the people awaiting Moses' return, every day we are offered the same two choices: the easy path of doing what we want regardless of its affect on others or the whole community, and the more difficult path of doing right for its own sake, regardless of our personal desires or gains.

and our diligent observation of their conditions. We did not do that during the Vietnam War, but we need to do that now. Even if we don't agree with our government's handling of wars and warfare, the soldier, sailor, airperson or marine who serves our country is obeying the law and carrying out his or her duty as he/she seems fit. As we know, emotional and spiritual death can be as complete and as devastating as physical death. We can do no less in our performance of our religious duty to "choose life, not death" (Deuteronomy 30:19), than to serve our living veterans.

As Memorial Day approaches, let us promise to remember to do the following for our veterans, living and dead: Visit the graves of our fallen heroes; recite the Kaddish or place a flag there or just say, "Thank you for your sacrifice". And, when those actions of the heart are done, telephone, text message or say to a living veteran, "Thank you for what you have done for our country" and when that is done, do a Tzadakah activity for veterans, whether it is creating hats for those with cancer or contributing to veterans' support funds or just going and sitting with a service person and talking. Share with them why you love OUR country. It will make your time with them and their time with you MEMOR(ial)ABLE.

Edward G. Robinson. Oscar-winning tough guy actor.

Born Emanuel Goldenberg on December 12, 1893 in Bucharest, Romania, Robinson came to the United States as a child. In July 1918, armed with a letter of introduction from George M. Cohan, Robinson enlisted in the U.S. Navy with the hope of working for naval intelligence.

After seamanship training at Pelham Bay, Robinson spent his time in traditional military pursuits like KP and "shovel details." He turned down opportunities to join entertainment units because he wanted to make a significant contribution to the war effort. He still hoped for a transfer to naval intelligence.

Robinson's transfer to intelligence came through shortly before the war ended on November 11, 1918. With the war over, he hoped to be swiftly demobilized but was to be disappointed. Miserable with the boredom of the peacetime navy, Robinson accepted invitations to entertain troops at camps and hospitals. It was his experiences in the burn and casualty wards that gave Robinson his real introduction to war. "What I saw made me hate war with every fiber of my being," he recalled. He was discharged from the navy in 1919.

I have become very aware of these ethical choices. Recently, someone informed me that one or some members of the congregation refuse to support our temple as long as a particular individual with whom they disagree is also a part of this community. As I understand it, our ethics call for us to treat each person fairly and to help our community whether or not we agree with everyone in it. Therefore, this individual or individuals is, in essence, like the child who threatens to hold her breath until she gets her way. It is much harder for someone to look past differences in opinion and behave in an ethical way. To choose the self-centered path and allow personal prejudices to overshadow the good of the whole is a type of attitude I find not only blatantly selfish, but also divisive to the community. We must not forget that our people have survived through centuries of oppression by putting aside petty differences for the sake of the community.

As a leader, I will always try to make decisions based on what is ethical rather than be swayed by what is most popular. Pesach reminds us: we accepted the Ten Commandments (not the Ten Suggestions) and we define ourselves as a people who have chosen to live ethically!



Italian Jews Aid World War II Saviors Hit By Quake

More than 64 years after villagers provided shelter to Italian Jews fleeing from the Nazis, a group of those who evaded capture rushed to repay that sacrifice in rural communities hard-hit by an earthquake.

A delegation of around 20 elderly Jews and their descendants – as well as community leaders – made their way to makeshift camps in the area around the mountain city of L'Aquila on Monday, peering into tents in a bid to find their saviors.

"I wouldn't be here if it weren't for these people," said Alberto Di Consiglio, whose parents were sheltered in the small hamlets of Fossa and Casentino during the war. "We have to help them."

More than 100 tent cities have been built around L'Aquila and the 26 towns and villages affected by the 6.3 magnitude quake, which struck central Italy on April 6.

Blintz Soufflé

- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 12 frozen cheese blintzes
- 1 1/2 cup sour cream
- 6 eggs
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. Vanilla..
- Cinnamon
- 1/4 cup orange juice or 2 tabl. orange juice concentrate

Preheat oven to 350°. Melt butter in a 9X13 inch pan. Line blintzes in one layer in the pan. In a bowl, beat eggs. Add sour cream, sugar, vanilla and orange juice. Pour egg mixture over the blintzes. Sprinkle lightly with cinnamon. Bake, uncovered, for 45 minutes or until golden brown on top.

He also served **Bugs Bunny**. Oscar-winning rabbit.

Born at Warner Brothers studio in Burbank, California, Bugs made his first appearance in the cartoon *A Wild Hare* in July 1940. Like most major stars, he did his bit for war bonds, starring in *Any Bonds Today?*, made in a record three weeks and released on December 15, a week after Pearl Harbor.

It was during WWII that Bugs Bunny cartoons passed Disney in popularity for the first time, as GI's could identify with the rabbit with a Brooklyn accent.

Bugs adorned bombers and PT boats, served as a mascot for the 385th Air Service Squadron and the 5th Parachute Battalion as well as the hospital ship USS Comfort. He was given an official service record in the U.S. Marine Corps.

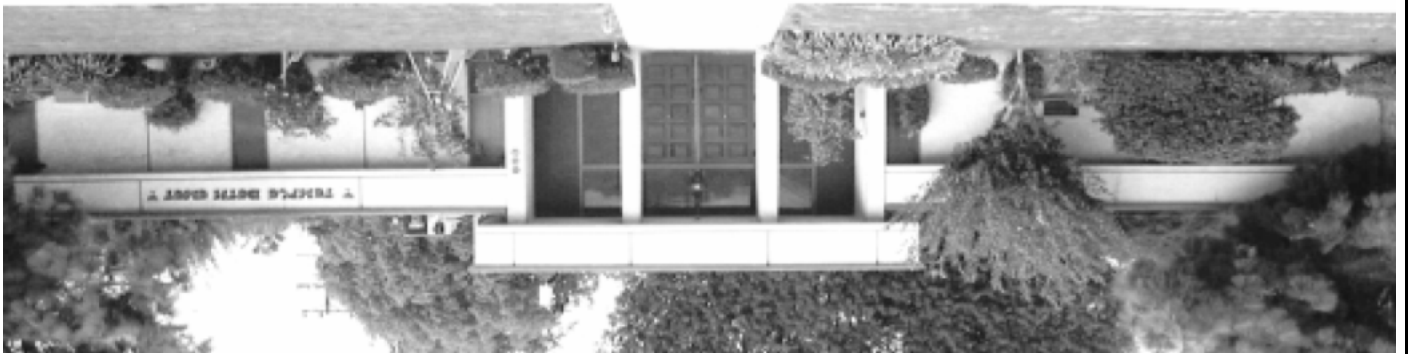
