In recent days and weeks we have seen, once again, how our enemies have no regard for innocent lives. For us, Human life is Human life, be it French, American or Lebanese.

One of the events in the Hanukkah story relates how innocent, men, women and children were attacked while hiding in caves to escape the Syrian/Greek authorities on the Sabbath. And while they refused to surrender, wisely perhaps, knowing the previous edicts of Antiochus Epiphanes, they also refused to fight.

It was, after all, the Sabbath. The Jewish patriots, responded to the Greek/Syrian soldiers, "We will all die with a clear conscience. Let heaven and earth bear witness that you are slaughtering us unjustly." (Macc.1, 2:38)

And as you can guess, "The enemy attacked them on the Sabbath and killed the men, their wives, their children, and their livestock. A thousand people died." (2:38).

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - December 2015

“So you, too, must show love to foreigners, for you were once foreigners in the land of Egypt.” Deuteronomy 10:19



In 1938, as Jews sought to escape Nazi Germany, there were those in the United States who were opposed to an influx of refugees into the country. There were economic concerns, as the nation was in the grips of the Great Depression and jobs were scarce. There were also public safety concerns. Jews were associated with ideas and actions that were an anathema to most Americans, such as Communism and violence. The State Department was concerned that among the Jewish refugees would be Nazi spies. Accordingly, Jewish refugees were carefully and thoroughly vetted before the few that were allowed entry were admitted.

America was not alone in its reluctance to admit Jewish refugees. As Anne Roiphe wrote in her Forward.com piece *How Can We Call Ourselves Jews and Bar Syrian Refugees?*, “At the Evian Conference in July 1938, the Allied countries met to decide the fate of the increasing numbers of displaced Jewish refugees. When the Canadian representative was asked how many Jews Canada would take, he said, ‘One would be too many.’” We know the result of the world’s reluctance to offer our people refuge all too well. We build memorial museums and hold “Days of Remembrance” programs to honor the memories of those who had no chance to escape the Shoah and those who might have, had other nations had the compassion and courage to take them in.

The situation of the Syrian refugees presents many similarities, and admittedly more than a few differences. As Jews and Americans, we must reconcile our concern for the security of our homeland and our natural mistrust of strangers with the compelling humanitarian story of people fleeing an oppressive government. As Jews and Americans, many of us have a suspicion of those of the Muslim faith because of the fanatical actions of a minority of that faith practiced against Jews, Western society, and even fellow Muslims. Let us not forget that many seeking refuge are fleeing because they are not Muslim.

But as Jews and Americans, we must recognize our obligation welcome the stranger. As Jews, Torah reminds us that we too were oppressed once, and left behind all we knew for a better life and a chance at freedom. As Americans, our history reminds of us the same thing.

In 1939, Eleanor Roosevelt, speaking of opposition of admitting refugees, said “We must not let ourselves be moved by fear in this country.” Mrs. Roosevelt was not advocating open borders or a mindless acceptance of all comers without caution, but she was admonishing us to hold fast to our core values of compassion and justice.

As we celebrate Hanukkah, our holiday which takes its name from the rededication of our people to the values of our faith, so must we today continue to rededicate ourselves to the values of *t’kun olam*, healing the world, and “*tzedek, tzedek tirdorf*” “justice, justice shall you pursue.” We must not let ourselves be moved by fear, or mistrust, or prejudice.

Roiphe concludes her article by observing, “Jews understand that ‘Never again!’ is not a tribal statement. It is a prayer for the safety of all peoples, everywhere. I hope that Jewish leaders will speak out and defend those in need of defending.” As Americans, how can we not “lift (the) lamp beside the golden door?”

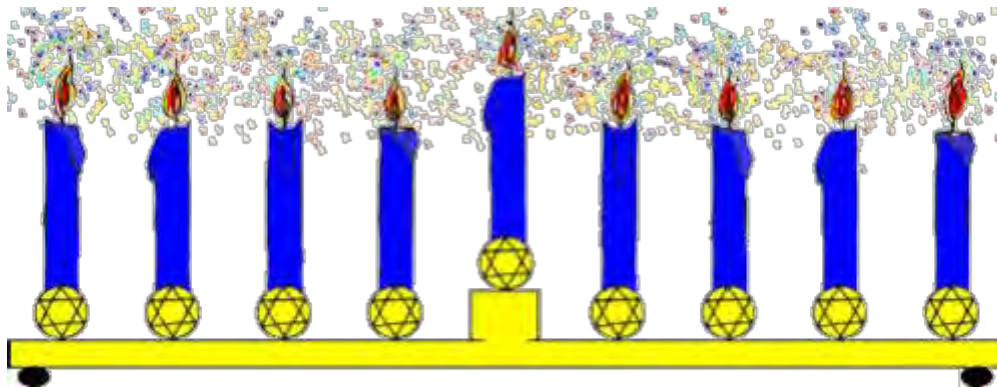
The First Book of the Maccabees continues, "When Mattathias and his friends heard the news about this, they were greatly saddened and said to one another... 'If all of us do as these other Jews have done and refuse to fight the Gentiles to defend our lives and our religion, we will soon be wiped off the face of the earth.' (2:39-40). Out of this slaughter, two ideas have become an integral part of Jewish Law. One, the necessity to be prepared to defend yourselves, even on the holiest of days. Two, the sanctity of human life.

To defend human life, any life, we must be prepared to defend ourselves and others who are innocent. A corollary to this occurred during the Holocaust. Jewish partisan units saw as their duty not only the military defeat of the Nazis, as did most partisan groups, but also the rescue and preservation of life of those who could not defend themselves. Today, once again, our lives and the life of our religion is threatened with destruction. Those who seek to kill innocent, men, women and children in the name of 'my God' do damage to those of us who correctly follow the True God, the God who teaches us "Thou Shalt not sit idly by the blood of your neighbor."(Lev.19:16) and "Love Thy neighbor as Thyself." (Lev. 19:18).

Hanukkah is a time of rededication, let us rededicate ourselves to defend the sanctity of innocent life. May we do so, to paraphrase the V'Ahavta "with our hearts, physically, our souls, spiritually, and our "veryness' uniquely." And when all "innocents" are defended then the world will say, "a great miracle happened HERE!!!!!!"

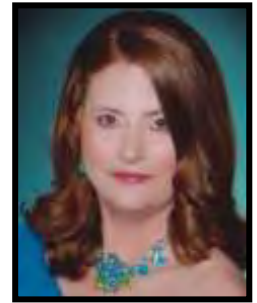

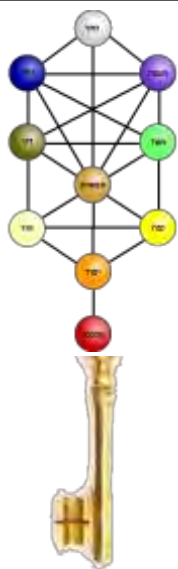
